Y. M.—Because you did not ask me, and I told you you'd be sorry for it. Conductor (furiously.)—Then go inside the car. Y. M.—Oh, no! you're good enough company for me out here.

At this juncture a portly German emerges from the car, and angrily says, "Mine Gott! you fellow, where is mine trunk?"

Young Man.—My friend, I think that is your trunk down on the avenue there.

German.—Who puts him off? I have de monish to pay him. I will see about that. The car was stopped, and shortly afterwards the conductor was seen to come sweating up with the trunk on his back—a part of the performance he did not enjoy half as well as did the passengers.—Washington Star.

OUR PUBLIC MEN.—The calibre and character of the public men of this country afford an unerring indication of the national demoralization. There is no surer way of testing the condition of a republic than the use they make of the privilege of suffrage. If they choose wise and virtuous men to administer their affairs it demonstrates their own intelligence and integrity. If they permit demagogues and imbeciles to hold places of trust and honor, it shows that they are incapable of self government.

In the early days of the Republic only the best men were placed in control of the country. Such chieftains of the human race as Washington, Jefferson, Adams, Madison filled the Executive chair. Such names as Alexander Hamilton and John Marshall illustrated other departments of the government. Virginia alone furnished a constellation of worthies in both the State and Federal governments which shed an imperishable lustre upon the political firmament. Indeed, every State put its best men forward for public office. They accepted official station often at the sacrifice of their private interests,—never to put money in their purses. Their ambition was honorable and lofty, worthy of great minds. What a magnificent House was once the Senate of the United States! Look at it now! Look at the whole government from the President down to the lowest scamp that fleeces the people in the service of the Internal Revenue. Look at the Congress, and at the Legislatures. Instead of the best men being chosen for public station, the best men are kept out. The best men in the North don't want to enter public life, and could not, if they did. Many of the best men of the South are disfranchised. It is as if some gallant ship was seized by the worthless part of her crew, and her officers and best seamen put under hatches, and hand cuffed, unable to help the ship even though the winds and waves should send her to the bottom.—Lynch News.

AN UNDERGROUND LAKE.—A few weeks ago, we noticed the finding of what was supposed to be a considerable stream of running water at the bottom of a well recently sunk on the premises of Mr. C. R. Paxson, near town. The water, however, receded from the base of the well, and an exploration last week by Messrs. Head and Norris, revealed a cave, the ceiling of which is about six feet high. At a distance of some eight or ten feet from the bottom of the well, in a northerly direction, they encountered a lake of water, supposed to cover an area of about 15x25 feet—and indicating a considerable depth. The water is said to be very clear, and cold. Other openings were discovered in the rocks, but the presence of the water, with no means of navigating it, prevented a more thorough exploration. The well is over 70 feet in depth. The explorers give it as their opinion that no difficulty need be encountered in supplying the well from this lake, with an abundant supply of the purest and best of water.—London Mirror.

A TONGUE DOG OR A TONGUE STORY.—Mr. Cleveland Plamdealer tells the following: "On Wednesday a large dog at the Industrial School bit one of the children. Application was made at the police station to have the dog shot, and an officer was detailed to do the work. He shot the dog twice and left it for dead. This morning the cause was hunting around for rations and another policeman was sent over who shot the canine seven times and then beat it with a club till he thought he had killed it. A short time after the Superintendent of the school appeared at police headquarters and mildly suggested that it might be well to send an officer to drown the brute, as it was still alive and demonstrative. A third policeman was sent over and put two more bullets in the beast. Perhaps some one had better take a contract to shoot the dog all summer."
