THE NEW RAILROAD BRIDGE ACROSS THE POTOMAC.—The new bridge across the Potomac river, on the site of the old Long Bridge, is now receiving the finishing touches. It is already open to public travel, and in use for the accommodation of pedestrians and equestrians, as well as railroad trains. The new structure is one of the most substantial railroad bridges in the country, and reflects credit upon the engineer, Mr. J. A. Partridge, and others who took part in its construction. The Baltimore and Potomac railroad company obtained possession of the old bridge under an act of Congress about a year and a half ago, and immediately thereafter Mr. Partridge prepared his plans, which were approved, and the work was commenced. The entire structure is nearly a mile in length, with an average width of over 400 feet. It is composed of two kinds of work—the Howe truss and the causeway. The latter is on the site of the old causeway, which was entirely removed; but the new is five feet higher than the old work. The truss work is also higher than the old wood-work. The causeway is 1,963 feet in length, the walls being of solid masonry 24 feet thick, rip-rapped on both sides 14 feet above low water. The space between the walls and rip-rapping is filled with earth, which, having been allowed to settle as the work progressed, is very compact. It is covered with the best quality of gravel, 12 inches deep, which makes a very smooth roadway for vehicles. On the side of the causeway is a plank footwalk, resting on oak brackets projecting over the wall. The brackets are made fast to the coping. A neat railing is on the side next the water. This makes a width of 44 feet, the causeway proper being 40 feet. The work consists of 29 piers besides the two large circular draw piers, 4 abutments, 2 retaining walls, 1,963 feet in length of causeway, 2 spans of 8-foot Howe truss, 2 draws aggregating 266 feet long, and 16 spans (2,675 feet aggregate length) of 21 foot Howe truss. An 11-foot board fence is built the length of the causeway, to keep horses from being frightened by the trains. Some idea of the amount of piling which is used in the work is obtained when we state that it is estimated that if the piles used to support each draw were placed in a straight line they would extend a distance of five miles. During the work on this bridge the company have had at times as many as 500 hands employed, besides those at the quarries, and the work has gone regularly on during all sorts of weather. The masonry was done by Campbell Brothers, of Pennsylvania, well known railroad contractors, and they completed it inside of twelve months. The Howe truss was erected by the Keystone bridge company—Mr. Brooks, superintendent. The immense timbers, before being put in place, were all fitted together on the Virginia shore. The remainder of the work, including the pile-driving, was done by the company. Since the bridge was opened, the travel over it has been immense, especially during fine afternoons.—*Wash. Star.*

DEAD NEWSPAPERS.—The rise and fall of newspapers is very little appreciated, and in this country, where journals spring up like mushrooms and are cut down like toadstools, do the people least of all understand the pecuniary perils of publishing a paper. Facts are, however, more stubborn than reasoning, and we quote from the "American Newspaper Directory" to show how disastrous has been the efforts of American ambition to indulge in the vanity of occupying the editorial chair and rule the political destinies of a chosen people.

In a number of the above named directory we find in a list of seventeen States and the District of Columbia, that no less than five hundred newspapers, which were in existence on New Year's day of 1871, failed and passed out of business before the October.

The reader will bear in mind that this list does not include newspaper failures in the great States of Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania, and fifteen or eighteen more States and Territories in the Union.

This is a fearful mortality, not only of hope, but of capital, for averaging the investment in each of these papers, only as weeklies, at \$3,000, which is a low estimate, we arrive at an absorption of over one million and a half of dollars. When we consider, as before explained, that this is a statement embracing losses in seventeen States only, and that we may fairly put six or seven hundred more papers down to the debtor side of profit and loss, for the remaining States and Territories, and then the losses will make an aggregate exhibit of at least two millions and a quarter lost to the individuals, which, if put into crops would have multiplied itself fifty fold, at least in ten years.

The eleven or twelve hundred papers whose decrease is here chronicled scarcely extend beyond the class of weeklies. A much more interesting and suggestive statement, if we had full data at hand, could be made about dead and dying dailies. New York city has seen no less than fifty-six give up the ghost in a short time, and it owns to-day a score of others in a moribund condition, for no city daily can be said to be alive and healthy unless it has existed eight or ten years and consumed the capital of three or four sets of publishers and proprietors.—*St. Louis Dispatch.*

The Philadelphia Ledger has at last been obliged to resort to supplementary sheets to accommodate its embarrassing amount of advertising. The difficulty with the Ledger, heretofore, in the way of seeking relief by supplements, has been how to print and fold the supplementary sheets with the enormous regular edition in season to supply subscribers and newsmen, but Mr. Childs seems to have hit upon some means of accomplishing it. The remarkable success of the Ledger, conducted without a particle of sensation "enterprise," or rather clap trap, is a wholesome lesson, showing that readers and advertisers alike prefer a newspaper that is run on straightforward business principles.—*Wash. Star.*

It is reported that Brigham Young has sold his interest in the Utah Central railroad to William Jennings and Bishop Sharp, for the purpose of taking a greater interest in the construction of the Utah Southern road.
