MYSTERIES OF FEMALE TOILET.—They have a bright, golden way of doing everything in the Land of Ophir. Witness a scene which occurred recently in San Francisco during a corner's investigation, and which is thus described by the happy local of the Chronicle newspaper of that city:

At this juncture the Coroner desired to show to the jury the course taken by the ball, and for this purpose produced the corset worn by Mrs. Burkhardt at the time of the tragedy.—"You see," said he—and here he drew the corset around his waist with the lace in front:—"the ball must have gone in here from behind. No, that can't be either, for the Doctor says the ball went in in front. Confound it I've got it on wrong. Ah! this way." (Here the corner put the corset on up-side down.)—"Now you see," pointing to the hole in the garment, which rested directly over the hip—the ball must have gone in here. No that can't be either.

Here Mr. Mather, the handsomest man on the jury, broke in. "Dr. Stillman," said he, "you've got the corset on wrong." Here Dr. Stillman blushed like a poppy. "Well," said he, "I've been married twice and I ought to know how to rig a corset." "Yes," said Mather, "but you don't. You had it right in the first place. The strings go in front, and the ladies clasp them together in the back. Don't I know? I think I ought to; I've been married. If you doubt, look here (pointing to the fullness in the top.) How do you suppose that it is going to be filled up unless you put it on as I suggest?" "That said Dr. Stillman:—"why that goes over the hips." "No, it don't," said Mr. Mather, "that fullness goes somewhere else—this way," and here he indicated where he thought the fullness ought to go.

At this a pale-faced young man with a voice like a robin, and a note book under his arm, said he thought the ladies always clasped their corsets on the side. The pale-faced young man said this very innocently, as if he wished to convey the impression that he knew nothing whatever of the matter. The jury laughed the pale-faced young man to scorn, and one of them intimated that he thought the young man was not half so green about women's dress as he tried to appear. The young man was a reporter and it is therefore exceedingly probable that his knowledge was fully as limited as was apparent from his suggestion, the jurymen to the contrary notwithstanding.

Here another jurymen discovered that Dr. Stillman had the corset on bottom side up.—"Doctor," said he, "put it on the other way." Then the Doctor put it on in reverse order, with the laces in front. This brought the bullet-hole directly over the tails of his coat.—"I don't think," said Mather, "that the bullet went in there, Doctor."—"No, I don't think it did," was the reply.—"Confound it, its mighty funny—six married men in this room and not one knows how to put on a lady's corset."

Here the Chronicle reporter, who keeps his eyes open, advanced and convinced Dr. Stillman and the rest, after much argument, that the laces of a corset go behind, and that the garment is clasped in front. After this explanation the course of the bullet was readily traced, and found to bear out the explanation afforded by the two physicians.

STUDENTS' DUEL IN HEIDELBERG.—A letter to the Chicago Tribune from Heidelberg contains the following:

The largest corps student that ever appeared in Heidelberg was an American, who came an average sized man, and went away something wonderful to behold, and having the honor of being the best drinker, and also the best duelist in Heidelberg. So you see America bears the palm here as everywhere else. He fought something like a hundred duels, and never got defeated till nearly the last one he fought, when he got his nose almost cut off; but nothing daunted, he stepped up to his adversary, holding his nose with his hands, and challenged him to another duel, which was accepted. They fought, and the indomitable American, the hero of a hundred duels, came out ahead, to the great gratification of all his admiring friends. He is considered to have been the greatest man in Heidelberg, (which he certainly was as regards size,) and his name will probably be handed down from generation to generation, and looked up to as something superior, something almost immortal, by the students.

The house which they used for their duels is situated a short distance out of town, and when a duel is going on sentinels are placed communicating from the house to the town; but this is entirely unnecessary for, although the duels are against the law, yet they are winked at by the authorities; in fact, the inhabitants are rather proud of them than otherwise, and would be very sorry if they were put a stop to. The student who took me to see the duels and myself started about half-past ten in the morning and walked for about fifteen minutes. We arrived at the house, and after introducing me to all the corps we sat down by a table, and talked and drank beer, and waited for the duel to commence.

The duels are arranged so that there are duels on three days of the week, whether a provocation is given or not. The way of it is this. The director of the duels takes the names of the members of the corps in regular order, and pairs them off, and they are compelled to fight, although they may be the very best friends in the world, or, perhaps, relations. So you see that when a fellow goes into one of these corps, he is compelled to fight, although he may be a very peaceable fellow; for, as I said before, they don't wait for a provocation, but fight anyway. The swords that they fight with are made of a long and very thin piece of steel, which bends very easily, and is as sharp as a razor, so that the least touch leaves a mark. The students here are cut up horribly, and some of them are really disgusting to look at, their faces are so frightfully scarred.

Last Friday I saw four duels. Each pair fought for a quarter of an hour, unless the doctor declared one of them too badly hurt to fight it out for that length of time, when, of course the opposite party was declared victor. When a student got cut, the students all walked up and examined it in the most unconcerned manner possible. The director wrote down in his book how long a cut it was, and also how deep it was, [the longer and deeper it was, the more the sufferer was thought of;] and the doctor washed it out and sewed it up, and the duel continued, unless the student that was declared to be unable to do so, when he was declared out to be the loser; and the next duel went on in the same manner. All this reminded me very much of the barber shop, with the barber cutting out "Next," when the chair is empty.
