DIED OF THE FRYING PAN.—Wherever you  
go, in the Southern country, the ever-present  
frying-pan is to be found, and three times a  
day it is called into service. The most whole-  
some and nourishing food, by its use, is made  
indigestible, its most nourishing portions uterly  
destroyed, and rendered tough, indigestible,  
and fit only to beget dyspepsia and all its at-  
tendant ills, to say nothing of the waste and  
extravagance consequent upon its use.

Compare the class spoken of above with its  
own class in France or any European country.  
The foreigner fresh, healthy, cheerful and vig-  
orous; the other lean, lank, sallow and sad.  
The one enjoying the sports of his great-grand-  
children, and the other either filling a  
premature grave, or lingering out a tiresome,  
premature old age at fifty years.

Compare the mode of life, and the cause is  
plain to any observant man. The French wo-  
man goes to market, and for a few sous buys a  
small piece of meat—a joint perhaps, which  
our "crackers" would throw to his dogs—a few  
vegetables and a few herbs added, and a gallon  
of good soup is made, which, with a little cold  
bread, makes a good, wholesome, nourishing  
dinner for a family. Another day a chicken is  
bought, again boiled with herbs, rice, flour or  
meal, and a good soup is made; while the fowl  
carefully cut and seasoned, a little flour made  
into dough, and a pot pie or a baked pie, af-  
fords wholesome and sufficient food for a family.  
Now visit our parchment-faced friend. His  
staple food is a piece of bacon fried; his fat  
taken and with flour meal mixed into a heavy  
mass and consigned to the inevitable frying  
pan, and our comes a lump of leathery looking  
something which the stomach of an ostrich could  
not digest. Give him a chicken, and what does  
he do with it? Cuts it up, and into the frying-  
pan it goes; after slowly simmered  
until hard, it is put into a deep dish and the  
grease poured over it, and what fat is not soaked  
up in the chicken is made away with by soak-  
ing his frying pan bread in it. Give him a  
rich, juicy steak, and into the frying pan it  
goes, and is slowly simmered and simmered  
and simmered until no knife can cut it, and  
then eaten with heavy bread soaked in the re-  
maining fat; and thus good and wholesome  
food in quantity sufficient to afford a whole-  
some meal for a French artisan's family, is by  
the frying pan process rendered not only barely  
enough for one man, but converted into a slow  
poison and fruitful source of disease.

Scarcely a day passes but some poor sufferer  
applies to me for relief from the "Frying-Pan  
disease," which relief I am unable to give,  
without an entire change in his or her habits;  
and unless such change is effected, whose ap-  
propriate epithet will be "Died of a Frying-  
Pan."—Columbus (Ga.) Enquirer.

VALUE OF LAND IN LONDON.—A recent  
number of the London Times contains the fol-  
lowing items of city intelligence, as showing  
the value of business property in that city:  
"The freehold plot of land, No. 24, Lombard  
street, containing an area of 1,530 square feet,  
with the modern banking premises thereon,  
has been disposed of by Messrs. Mackenzie,  
Trinder & Co., Old Broad street, for the sum  
of £50,000, to Baron Grant, of the firm of  
Grant Brothers & Co., in whose occupation  
they are. This averages, exclusive of the bank  
premises, over £32 per square foot.

It will give an approximate notion of the re-  
lative prices of the best business property in the  
two cities, if we say that the Crosby Opera  
House property, for instance, in this city,  
which is, we believe, offered at about \$1,800  
per front foot, would, at the price of the Lon-  
don lot above mentioned, come to \$28,600 per  
front foot. The locations in each city proba-  
bly correspond in character as nearly as any  
two that could be mentioned, and show, that  
the average price of such property in nearly  
sixteen times as much in London as in Chicago.
