**Anecdotes of Gen. Lee.**  
A correspondent of the Courier-Journal, writing from Lexington, recalls these reminiscences of Lee:

While in command of the Virginia forces in the early spring of 1861 he was visited by a prominent citizen who carried his little boy, with a beautiful copy of the Scriptures which he wished to present to General Lee. The General received the gift with evident pleasure and cordial thanks, saying that he "could not have received a more acceptable gift than so beautiful a copy of the Holy Bible;" and had the little fellow on his knee entertaining him in that inimitable manner which won the hearts of all the children with whom he came in contact, when the father asked: "Henry, what is General Lee going to do with General Scott?" The little fellow, who had caught some of the slang of the streets, at once replied: "He is going to whip him out of his boots!" General Lee's whole countenance and manner instantly changed, and putting Henry down from his lap, and looking him steadily in the eye, he said: "My dear little boy, you should not talk in that way. General Scott is a great and good man, and no one knows how this war will terminate."

After the war his spirit of forbearance towards the Government and people of the North seemed to have deepened and grown in strength along with the beautiful Christian character which shone out so brightly during these last years of his life.

Soon after Underwood's Grand Jury found against him an indictment for "treason and rebellion" (in violation of the terms of his surrender, as Gen. Grant himself insisted), a distinguished clergyman of his Church called to see him, and in the course of the conversation expressed some very vindictive sentiments towards the United States authorities and the people of the North. There were others present and they were all pleasantly turned on the conversation. When the clergyman took his leave General Lee followed him out of the room, and warmly taking him by the hand said: "Doctor, there is a good old book which I read and you preach from which says: 'Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you and persecute you.' Do you think that your remarks this evening were quite in the spirit of that teaching?"

To the explanations and apologies of the clergyman General Lee replied, with a good deal of feeling:—"I fought against the people of the North because I believed that they were seeking to wrest from the South her dearest rights. But I can truly say that I have never cherished towards them vindictive feelings, and have never seen the day when I did not pray for them."

The world's history affords few sublimer examples than this of the minister of the "Gospel of Peace" sitting at the feet of the stern warrior to learn lessons on the duty of love to enemies.

On one occasion in Lexington a certain distinguished orator made an address, in which he used some very harsh expressions concerning the Northern people. After the address was over General Lee came to your correspondent and said: "I saw you taking notes during the address. If you propose to publish a report of it, I suggest that you leave out all of those bitter expressions. They will do you no good, and are, I think, undignified and unbecoming."

**BUFFALO HIDES.**—The New York Daily Bulletin says:—"Some eight or ten months ago a few enterprising New Yorkers conceived the idea that the buffalo hides might be tanned for leather, so they went West and procured all the hides they could, and sent them to New York city and Baltimore to have their exact value ascertained. These hides were sent to several of the more prominent tanners, who experimented upon them in various ways, but they met with no success. Either from want of knowledge or a lack of proper materials, they were unable to render the hides soft or pliable, and therefore they were of no use to them. Under these circumstances several barrels of these hides were sent to England, where they were readily taken up, and orders were immediately sent to this country for 10,000 additional hides. These orders were filled, and since then the trade has continued uninterruptedly."

These hides are collected in the West by the agents of Eastern houses; they are simply dried and then forwarded to either New York or Baltimore for export. The dealer realizes but a small profit, for the excessive cost of railroad transportation, and the cost of hauling them in many instances to the railroad for shipment reduces the margin materially. The low price that these goods have reached on the English market, and the prospect of a still further decline, may in time put an end to this trade; but at present the hides are hunted for vigorously, and if it continues, it will take but a few years to wipe the herds out of existence. The hides of the animals killed at this season of the year are almost worthless, but still the killing goes on, and thus for a very small profit the Indians are robbed of their food.

**A SCHOOL FOR PRINTERS.**—A German letter in the Trade Courier gives a most interesting account of the schools for printers which are established in Stuttgart and throughout Germany, designed to instruct apprentices in the theory and practice of printing not only, but to impart a general knowledge of foreign languages and an accurate acquaintance with the type of all languages. The superiority of German printers is such that many English books are sent to Germany to be set up, although they are returned to England for binding. More interesting still is the report of the book-sellers' school at Leipzig, whose purpose is to thoroughly train young men for their trade by attending to the literary as well as the practical side of the business. A three year's course is marked out, embracing the study of all the prominent languages, ancient and modern, and their literature, mathematics, geography, commerce, history, natural sciences, drawing and writing, aesthetics, bibliography, statistics, and business management.
