A FACTORY GIRL'S EXPERIENCES.—Writing from Boston to the Chicago Journal, a correspondent relates the story of such mutations in life as may be considered characteristic of American experiences. In 1865 there came to the metropolis of New England, from Penobscot, in Maine, a young orphan girl, who, after vainly striving to maintain herself comfortably at home, by school teaching, had decided to essay the fortunes of a factory girl in a larger city. Butting the hoop skirt manufactory of a private firm in Boston, she devoted all her energies to a mastery of the business, that her confinement to mere drudgery might not be long protracted, and to this effect that in a year's time she was promoted to the position of saleswoman.

In two years more her superior mental capacity and practical tact made her the chief saleswoman of the establishment, and through this last position she was brought to the acquaintance of a certain rich California merchant, buying goods for his store in San Francisco. The acquaintance matured into a mutual regard of a graver nature. The girl, well as she was doing, had a woman's natural yearning for woman's domestic kingdom, and when the Californian closed his business account for the time by asking the saleswoman to go back to San Francisco with him as his wife she yielded a graceful assent. After a quiet wedding the two departed together for the Pacific coast, where the ensuing four years were passed in all the harmony and prosperity requisite for the smoothest progress of married life.

The wife, now of a rich man, and the possessor of abilities and personal comeliness to grace a high social station, the former factory girl assumed a commanding position in the society of her new home and became a leader in matters of aristocratic taste and fashion. After four years the Americanism of her destiny found tragic demonstration. Some months ago her husband was tempted into one of those extravagant mining speculations which are the bane of California, and entered too deep to be able to withdraw before the collapse and crash. In a few hours of sinking values he was dragged down from wealth to poverty, and revenged himself upon fortune by committing suicide. The sound of the fatal pistol shot awakened the bereaved wife from her four years' dream of happiness and plenty to the old reality of her girlish homeliness and want. The expenses of the self-destructor's burial left her with barely enough remaining from recent wealth to secure her return to Boston, where she is once more working for a livelihood as though the California episode had never brightened her existence.

A BOSTON SENSATION.—A Boston correspondent of the Portsmouth Times has the following story of the exploits of a female forger, and says that the source of his information is a reliable one. The lady is the wife of a well-known Bostonian, and by a bold forgery she succeeded in obtaining a large sum of money from one of the banks in that city. The particulars, without going into detail, are as follows: About two months ago a very beautiful, lady-like and accomplished woman arrived in San Francisco by the overland railroad and booked her name at one of the fashionable hotels as Mrs. Geraldine, from Boston, Massachusetts. She had a large amount of baggage, and was supposed to be the wife of a millionaire, as she represented that she had expected to meet her husband in San Francisco, who had been a successful merchant in China for several years.—She stated that although he had not met her as she expected, she had received letters from him informing her that business delays had prevented his coming to her, and that he had instructed her to enjoy herself until his arrival, as he became her fortune. She attended balls and parties and received very polite attention from some of the "first families."

Things went on humbly until a few days ago, when a detective made his appearance upon the scene, and informed her that he had a warrant for the arrest of Mrs.—, of Boston, and that she, the pretended Mrs. Geraldine, was the identical person he was after. He told her that it was his duty to arrest her for the crime of forgery. She stoutly denied the soft impeachment, but when she was informed that her husband had instructed the officer, if she would quietly go to Boston with him and return the money, she should not be exposed, she admitted that she had obtained \$8,000 on a check to which she had forged her husband's name, and had fled to California to meet a lover who had been in China. She gave the officer \$7,500, which she had in her trunk, and returned to her eastern home. It is said she is now very repentant and with tears asks to be forgiven.

THE POWELL EXPEDITION.—Clement Powell, writing to the Chicago Tribune from Windsor Castle, Utah, April 5, says: "Fourteen hundred miles of a tortuous and almost inaccessible river have been mapped by the civil engineers. A continuous sketch of the left wall of the Colorado and Green has been made. The minerals of the country traversed have been examined and specimens obtained. The most important are silver, copper and coal. Gold is also found in small quantities. Much new information will be added, and studies in geological geology completed. Fossils of bones, plants, fishes and corals have been shipped in large quantities. We find evidences of large fresh water lakes, remains of curious animals, forests turned to stone. Silicified tree trunks, eighty feet long and two or three feet in circumference, are scattered over the desert, drifted over by sand, reminding one of the broken columns of the Nile. The plants of Utah have been gathered and classified. Mrs. Thompson has over two hundred varieties.

Major Powell has given special attention to Indian lore. He has made vocabularies of the Ute tongue, learned their traditions, religious rites and tribal laws. He speaks the gibberish of the various tribes, and probably is the most thorough student of their jargon of any white man now living. Specimens of the implements of war and husbandry, products of the industry and skill of American Indians, from the Mound builders and Aztecs to the Utes and Navajoes, are being collected in as complete sets as possible.
