VOICES OF THE NIGHT.—Mention has been made in our columns of a "cat infirmary," rumored to have been endowed by an eccentric gentleman who lately died in Columbus, Ohio. Whether this feline hospital is built or not depends, says the story, on whether the will can be contested upon the ground of insanity; but this is by no means the first "institution" of the kind reported to have been so endowed. Now, most of these stories are, of course, hoaxes; but we believe there have been cases of genuine bequests of money in trust for the uses of cats by friends of these warblers. On the other hand, if there are philanthropists, or cat lovers, in the world, there are also philanthropists, or cat haters, and in this latter class are probably included most persons who pass their summer nights in the city. A will on this subject lately came from Edinburgh, through a correspondent of the Scotsman, who, declaring that the city is at the mercy of wandering cats left behind by the pleasure seekers who have gone to the country, says: "People shut up their houses and rush off to the seaside or the moors, to Norway or Switzerland or Iceland, and leave their domestic pets, adorned with pretty ribbons, to starve and suffer, if not to die in their absence. Have they no thought or care that see, whose fate it is to be left behind, are deprived of rest and peace and made positively miserable by their thoughtless inhumanity in leaving their cats unprovided for to prow and cry and murder our sleep?" He even insists on legal remedies for this municipal evil, declaring that "the astounding of cats in too many cases emaciated, ravenous, savage and vociferous in their wailings by night and by day, is such a nuisance and such a distress to feeling hearts, both masculine and feminine, as really to demand the attention of the authorities, and a prompt, vigorous and effective remedy." We are hardly prepared to take such high ground for the suppression of this nocturnal evil, but it is certainly amusing to observe the vigor of the protest, and to imagine the rage of the Edinburgh victim when he reads the views on the cat question said to be taken by the gentleman in Columbus.—*Philadelphia Record.*

A NOVAL FOOT-RACE, for fun, took place on Court street yesterday at noon. The contestants were Mr. James Stywarter, of Manchester, and Mr. James E. Diggs, of Portsmouth, each of whom uses a solid wooden leg. The course of the race extended from South street to High, a distance of four squares and by the terms of the contest two squares were a walking match and two squares a running match. After two attempts the parties got off, Portsmouth ahead, and the walking match was a vigorous struggle to County street, where a brief halt was made. This was a victory for Portsmouth. The two then started on the "home run." Manchester promptly going ahead. At King street the Portsmouth man gained distance rapidly, but suddenly broke down in consequence of losing the rubber attachment of his leg. Manchester kept bravely on to High street, and won the race by about forty yards. There was nothing wagered. The novelty of the contest and the awkward movements of the participants excited a good deal of merriment among the crowd assembled to witness it. The temperature at the time was fully one hundred and ten in the sun, but the contestants seemed but little worried by it.—*Norfolk (Va.) Journal.*

NORFOLK MARKETS.—There was a tempting display of edibles in our domestic market Saturday. The vegetable market was an unusually large one, and the supply was larger than we have ever seen there before. We give below the prices of the leading articles: Watermelons, 25 to 30¢ each; cantaloupes, 1 to 7¢ each; peaches, 25¢ half peck for choice; pears, 5 to 10¢ per quart; apples, 3 to 5¢ per quart; whortleberries, 10¢ per quart; blackberries, 5¢ per quart; cabbages, 2 to 5¢ per head; tomatoes 25¢ per quart; arbor beans, 20¢ per quart; snap beans, 10¢ per quart; cyminals, 10¢ per dozen; cucumbers, 8¢ per dozen; green corn, 10 to 25¢ per dozen; beans 5¢ per bush; onions 5¢ per bush; eggs, 18¢ per dozen; spring chickens, 16 to 30¢ apiece; grown chickens, 80¢ to \$1 apiece; fish (fresh) 10 to 20¢ per dozen, fresh beef, 16¢ per pound; corned beef, 12¢ per pound; dried beef, 25 to 30¢ per pound; mutton, 15¢ per pound; lamb, 16¢ per pound; fresh pork, 12¢ per pound; corned pork, 10 to 12¢ per pound; hams, 16 to 18¢ per pound; middling, 10 to 12¢ per pound; shoulders, 12¢ per pound; veal, 16¢ per pound; butter 38¢ per pound.

SALE OF CHILDREN IN JAPAN.—The detestable practice appears to be prevalent in Japan of purchasing and selling young children. From this still more horrible practice has grown up, trifling sums, purchased young girls of their parents. To so great an extent has this practice been conducted that the following rather mild notification has been issued from the Japanese Foreign Office: "You came to our country for the purpose of trading only, and expecting great privileges; but we are informed that some Chinese have bought Japanese children, and sent them to China for the purpose of making them slaves. As no one likes to sell his own child, it is certain that other people's children have been stolen. We regret this, and are very angry about it. You have resided a long time in this country under the government protection, but instead of doing good for our country you have done much evil. If any such wrong doing occurs again, the government will not spare. B-warc, Chinese. GAIMUSHO."
