Agricultural. The following article clipped from the published proceedings of the New York Farmer's Club commends itself to the special attention of every farmer in Virginia. The long continued drought has almost entirely ruined the hay crop, and the only substitute is straw, corn stalks, and turps. Good wheat straw this season is worth from \$15 to \$20 a ton, and every pound should be carefully stacked or put into tams and sheels. No farm is complete without a first-class straw cutter; one large enough to cut corn stalks fine as well as straw. Thus provided with a good machine, and by following the directions given below, our farmers will have fat cattle in the Spring instead of raw-bones and stub-tails. PROGRESS:

Feed for Stock.—Eastern and Southern farms suffer for want of richer manure, which can only be made by feeding more cattle. Eastern markets are in a state of chronic want of meat, and their demands are not nearly supplied by Western stock raisers. Besides, the quality of Western beef generally is not up to the standard required for a great bulk of the Eastern consumers. The way out of the difficulty, felt by both farmers and meat consumers in the Eastern States lies, in a great measure, if not wholly, through a better use of straw. Straw itself cannot be relied upon as a fodder for cattle, and yet such a bulky and comparatively unnutritious food is demanded to a great extent by stock. When used in conjunction with Western corn the whole need of the case is met. Let Eastern and Southern farmers, as soon as they can provide stock to consume all their coarse products, straw, pea hain, bean hain, corn stalks, and as many roots as they can possibly raise, and purchase corn to feed with it to furnish the nutritious matter, which needs a large amount of bulky matter to be fed with it to make it most completely digestible. A ton of straw fed with a third of a ton of corn meal and a ton of roots, would make a combined feed which could be used very profitably for fattening cattle. A ton of straw, 30 pounds of corn meal, or all or cotton seed meal, would soon bring an ordinary steer into market condition. For heavier or grade shorthorn stock the proportion of roots and meal could very well be increased but still the heaviest feeders would fatten readily on this mixed diet. At the same time the farm would receive the benefit of the extra value of the manure made by this purchased food. The nitrogen contained in the articles named is mainly left in the manure and would become a most valuable acquisition to the soil and would soon help to produce largely increased crops of grain and coarse feed. Cattle so fed within 500 miles of the great Atlantic cities could be put into market quite profitably in competition with Western fed stock, and by their superior quality of beef would help to enlarge the ability to sustain the competition. We do not need to have our cattle fed on the plains of Texas altogether; there are hundreds of farms within 100 miles of the eastern coast on which stock could be raised and fattened for market in every way profitably. It is done in other countries, and if our farmers will but follow foreign methods, it may be done here; and of those methods the most primary one is to feed every ton of coarse fodder with a ton of concentrated food to use with it, with the double purpose we have pointed out.
