DEATH FROM Glanders.—A glandered horse owned by Roswell C. Miner, of Steuben, N. Y., in blowing his nostrils, threw a drop of the infectious matter into one of Mr. Miner's eyes. He immediately wiped it out, as he supposed, but in a short time (within twenty-four hours) his eyes began to swell and pain him. Medical aid was procured, and his case pronounced by able physicians a hopeless one; that the glandered matter had so permeated his system that he could not recover. His flesh turned purple and was pronounced poisonous. He lingered in agony about twenty days before expiring. His friends were compelled to bury him early the next morning, and with him the entire bed and bedding on which he had lain.—New York News.

REMARKABLE CURIOSITY.—The New Orleans Times says "a gentleman just returned from wanderings Northward has shown us a remarkable geological curiosity, which was picked up at Wolf Creek, in Blaine county, Va. It is a specimen of flexible freestone, of a yellowish or orange color, and can be bent with as much facility as sponge cake. In our geological researches we never met with anything of the kind before. The basis of the formation is yellow sand, but the adhesive elements seem wholly unlike those which unite the particles in ordinary sandstone."

He is over thirty years old; was born blind, and educated at the Deaf, Dumb and Blind Asylum at Raleigh.
