AMERICAN OYSTERS IN ENGLAND.—The London Times of the 18th ult. gives the following report of the arrival of a cargo of American oysters:—"On Monday above a million of American oysters were dropped at the Cleethorpes oyster beds at the mouth of the Humber. These oysters, which filled 850 barrels were brought over by steam to Liverpool, and forwarded by railway to Grimsby, making twenty-two truck loads. They can be sold at a profit at from 5s. to 6s. per 120, whereas the price of the Cleethorpes oysters, of which there is a scarcity, has been lately 8s. per 120."

SENSATIONAL.—There is a noted preacher who is making a great sensation in Dubuque, Iowa, his name being Rev. E. P. Hammond. His ways are eccentric. The other day he mounted a fiery steed, and, cantering through the streets of the city, cried out, at the top of his voice, "Come to Jesus." Mrs. Imogen Brown may be taken for Providence for the possession of a fine, very high priced voice—the highest, indeed, in the church choir way yet known in Episcopal annals either here or abroad. Mrs. Imogen Brown has been engaged to sing forenoon and afternoon on Sundays at St. Bartholomew's Church, New York, at \$3,000 a year. In the evening she is to sing in Christ Church for another \$1,000, thus realizing from her beautiful voice and culture about \$80 a Sunday.
