FALLS CHURCH ITEMS.—A letter in the Washington Republican of this morning from Falls Church says:

REANEXATION.—It is understood that as every other scheme for the reanexation of Alexandria to the District of Columbia has failed, the supporters of that pernicious project have determined to agitate it further by availing themselves of the case of a colored man named William Jackson, sentenced to be hung here on the 31st inst. for the murder of his wife, and for whom, without the slightest regard to whose interest, they will apply to Judge Carter, of Washington, for a writ of habeas corpus, provided his application to the Court of Appeals of Virginia for a new trial should fail.

CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, January 11, 1873. SENATE.

The Senate was not in session today.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The House of Representatives was engaged with amendments to the Legislative Appropriation bill.

The attendance was small.

During the course of the debate on the bill, a clause being under consideration for paying certain persons for cotton, &c., unlawfully taken, in accordance with a decree of the Supreme Court of the United States,

Mr. Smith, of New York, objected to payments to men disloyal and said he would appeal from the Supreme Court to the people.

Mr. Harris, of Virginia, explained that there was now over \$30,000,000 in the Treasury of the United States which the Supreme Court had declared to be a trust fund subject to lien of Southern claimants.

He was amazed to hear from a gentleman of standing and education, who had sworn to support a constitution that made the Supreme Court a branch of the Government coordinate with Congress, the declaration that he would appeal from that Court to the people. This was rebellion.

The debate was continued after 4 o'clock.

The Late Ex-Emperor.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The Prince and Princess of Wales will remain in strict retirement at their country seat at Sandringham for one week, as a mark of respect to the memory of Napoleon.

Princess Napoleon, his wife, the Princess Clothilde, Prince Mathilde, M. Paul Cassagne and a number of other Bonapartists, have arrived at Chislehurst where an important conference on the course to be pursued is expected to take place.

Napoleon left two wills, one of which is in London and the other in Paris.

MADRID, Jan. 11.—Countess d'Artois, mother of the ex-Emperor Eugenie, has left here for Chislehurst.

PARIS, Jan. 11.—The Garibais this morning says the only officers of the French army who were permitted to attend the funeral of Napoleon, will be those who were attached to the household of the ex-Emperor during his reign in France.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The remains of Napoleon will probably be buried Tuesday under the seat of the family in the church of the Roman Catholic Chapel at Chislehurst.

Straw Paper.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—The Journal of Commerce editorially calls the attention of the press of the country to a covert attempt to again revive the patent straw paper swindle in Congress.

The dodge now attempted is in a proposed amendment to patent laws now before Congress, in which is the following clause:—"And no extension granted prior to the passage of this act shall be held invalid, by reason of the fact that the certificate of extension was not annexed before the expiration of such patent."

The Journal of Commerce says there is no other case to which this amendment will apply except to revive the old French miller patent straw paper swindle, defunct five years ago. This amendment has been read twice, and in a few days will be put upon its passage.

The effect of its passage will be to add one cent to every pound of paper purchased by newspaper publishers.

From New York.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—The bill of exceptions in favor of Stokes has been completed and will be soon argued before Judge Bardman.

If he does not grant a new trial the bill will be argued before every one of the thirty-one judges of the Supreme Court. Stokes was much dejected yesterday.

The Evangelical Alliance prayer meeting yesterday devoted its time to praying for the purity of the press.

Governor Dix was on a train yesterday afternoon which ran off the track opposite Albany the engine, tender and baggage car of which were smashed. No passengers were hurt.

Stove-in by the Ice.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 11.—The British iron screw steamer Potomac, which cleared yesterday with a full cargo of grain and produce for Liverpool, had her bow-plates stove in by ice in the Horsehoe. She returned to port and is now in the dock.

Her cargo will have to be discharged preparatory to repairs at Craun's ship-yards at Kensington.

Rate of Money.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—30 p. m.—The rate for money at the Stock Exchange on government securities is lower than the Bank of England rate by one per cent.
