**DOOR-KNOCKERS.**—Is there any particular reason, we wonder, why those sensibly contrived, thoroughly effective, generally interesting, and often extremely quaint and artistic old-fashioned door-knockers have gone so entirely out of use? Why should the inelegant and complicated modern door-bell have so certainly usurped its place in this country? Certainly the knocker was serviceable. There could never be any doubt about there being some one at the door when a big brass or iron knocker was pounding away. Not only the girl (presumably in the kitchen could hear it, but every one in the house could hear it. Therein was the knocker's hospitality; it announced to all the household the coming of a visitor. But perhaps now-a-days the household does not want to know. But why not? The whole family need not go to the door. And a bell, unless it is centrally placed in the house is often wonderfully ineffective. How well we all know that—us who have shivered on brown-stone steps and white marble front steps in winter, and scorched and steamed upon them in summer, while Bridget or Dinah (who didn't happen to be in the kitchen, and therefore didn't hear the bell) kept us waiting for the welcome opening of the door. But with a knocker, how different! If Biddy was indoors and neither deaf nor dead, she must hear the rapping, no matter in what part of the house she had secluded herself. And, more than that, she could not pretend she did not hear it. The bell may be in a measure to her a private annunciator ringing out its call to her alone, and depending upon her alone for its answer. Not so the knocker. Like a public voice, it calls aloud to everybody in general, and if one person in particular (Biddy) does not do her duty, everybody in general will know it.—*Scribner's Magazine.*

**LIFE IN NEW YORK.**—Despite the personal and pecuniary perils that environ the traveler therein, New York is certainly begirt with fascinations which will always make it a centre of attraction, unapproached by any other city on the continent. Things, good and bad, are done there, which are never dreamed of in any place else, and there is no possible phase of pleasure or pain that does not find a daily illustration in its midst. One of its peculiar features—particularly at this season of the year—is the ball, which, as there instituted, is, we imagine quite as varied in its innocent amusement, or questionable morality, as are the same popular entertainments in the French Capital. The cotillion ball shoots folly as it rises in every city, from the highest to the lowest. The light chases away the winged hours. The political club has its annual reunion, where the embryo statesman forgets his dreams of ambition in the tripping of the light fantastic toe. The motor, the hotel, clerk, the car-conductor, the mustered, "the butcher, and baker, and candlestick maker," and hundreds of others, in every station of life and branch of industry, all dance, and, once a year, at least, lay aside their daily toils and labors and worship at the shrine of Terpsichore. Queer names, and sometimes queer doings, mark these festive assemblies. A few nights ago one of them "came off" which presented a unique and entirely novel feature. At "the Staudley ball" a prize of a silver cup was offered for "the handsomest and best dressed man" in the assemblage, and the successful competitor was none other than Mr. John C. Heenan, whom our readers will remember, in days gone by, as a successful master of "the manly art of self-defence." The manner in which the committee performed its laborious duties in awarding the prize is duly set forth, together with the faultless costume, general appearance, and gallant bearing of the muscular gentleman aforesaid.—*Balt. **A TEST OF THE EXTINCTION OF LIFE.**—In view of the uncertainty regarding the final extinction of life that occasionally arises, Dr. Magnus proposes the following test for the decision of the matter. If a limb of the body (a finger is best for the purpose) be constructed by a strong ligature quite tightly, there will, if the subject is yet alive, be a reddening of the constricted member. First the part in question becomes red, and then the red color becomes darker and darker, and deeper in hue, until it is finally converted into a bluish-red, the whole limb being from its tip to the ligature (that at nerve) of a uniform color, except there it is the region immediately round the ligature, which is not bluish-red, but white. Though there may be slight discoloration after death, the doctor has satisfied himself by experiment that this cannot be confounded with the complete discoloration that attends the performance of the test on a living limb.—*Scribner.*

**CAPTAIN JACK and his band** of Modoc Indians are making a brave fight of it. He will be the last probably of his race who will remind us of stories of Indian war that we all thought belonged to the past—to the Florida glades, or the forest of Kentucky. Not only has Captain Jack defeated the troops, but there is a fear now, ungrounded we trust, that he will wage an aggressive war on the white settlements. He has captured guns and ammunition, and only the rear guard of Oregon volunteers prevented the wounded man, the howitzers, and the camp equipage from falling into his hands. The worst of it is that the longer the struggle is protracted the stronger this band will become. Vagabond Indians from far and near will flock to it, renegade white men will join it, and, at last, the United States will have a protracted and expensive war upon its hands.—*Baltimore Gazette.*
