PAGANINI upon one occasion was journeying from London to Paris, when his famous Guarnerius met with an accident, the case in which it was carried having fallen down with so violent a concussion as to unglue one of the inner blocks of the instrument. On reaching Paris he took it to the best and most celebrated maker he could find, to whom he related, in the greatest distress, what had happened, and that his violin, in consequence, had lost its tone. The gentleman applied to inform the disconsolate performer that, in order to ascertain the precise amount of mischief, it would be necessary to open the instrument, but that Paganini would by no means consent, unless the operation was performed at his own house and under his own eyes; and he seemed, indeed, to be suffering from the pangs of martyrdom, and absolutely writhed in his chair at each crack caused by the breaking away of the glue at the action of the knife. The success achieved by the operator in removing the body of the violin induced him, however, to intrust him with it for the space of three whole days, at the end of which his violin was returned to him perfectly restored. A few days afterward, meeting the musical doctor who had by his skill effected so complete a cure of the internal injury, the grateful violinist took him by the arm, and saying, "Thank you, my dear friend, it is as good as before" he drew from his waistcoat pocket a little red morocco box, which he presented to him, with the observation: "I have had two pins made, the one for the doctor of my body, the other for the doctor of my violin." When the recipient of the latter gift opened the little box it was found to contain a pin set with twenty-three diamonds, in the form of the letter P.—*Domestic Magazine.*

CARELESSNESS IN DRESS.—Many women who before their marriage make it their study to please the man they wish to marry, lose their affection after marrying by carelessness in dress. Men are fastidious in this matter.—Even those who are careless in regard to their own appearance take delight in seeing their wives neat in appearance. They miss those coquettish garments and neatly dressed hair and the thousand tasty and fanciful little articles with which young women adorn themselves more than they would be willing to allow. The neatness and order which charmed them too often give place to a slovenly morning gown, frowsy hair, slippers and unlaced shoes and the like. Men reason that they should have the same desire to please the man they have chosen after marriage as before it. The last new song loses its charm, coming from the lips of a slattern. The poetry loses its brightness. THE FIRST BLOOD SHED IN THE REVOLUTION.—The "First Albany of the Revolution" has been commonly supposed to have been shed at Lexington, April 19, 1775, but Westminster, Vt., files a prior claim in favor of one William French, who, it is asserted, was killed on the night of March 13, 1775, at the King's Court House, in what is now Westminster. At that time Vermont was a part of New York, and the King's court officers, together with a body of troops, were sent on to Westminster to hold the usual session of the Court. The people, however, were exasperated, and assembled in the Court House to resist. A little before midnight the troops of George the Third advanced and fired indiscriminately upon the crowd, instantly killing William French, whose head was placed in a musket ball. He was buried in the churchyard, and a stone erected to his memory, with this quaint inscription:  
"In Memory of William French, Who Was Shot at Westminster March ye 13th, 1775, by the hand of the Cruel Ministerial tools of George ye 3rd at the Court House at 11 o'clock at Night in the 23d year of his age."  
"Here William French his Body lies,  
For Mariner his Blood for Vengeance Cries,  
King George the Third his Tory crew  
With a tawl his head Shot threw;  
For Liberty and his Country Good  
He Lost his Life his Dearest Good."

THE IRON MASK.—A Paris letter to the Times has an interesting account of a new book which gives a novel solution of an ancient mystery. It says:  
"One more the truth about the 'Man in the Iron Mask' has been revealed, and with equal plausibility and force. In addition, we have documents never before published, and which go to support the writer's theory. Moreover, I am more inclined to trust the latest version, for the critical ability of our age is very remarkable, and our means for forming correct conclusions are much more numerous. The time has passed for throwing out proof which tells against the Church, or which may be used in arguments against French Christianity. Now, you, a staff officer in the French Army, now a young man appears to prove—that it is well in these times not to swear to anything—that the 'Man of Iron Mask' was not the important personage he was supposed to be, but merely the Chevalier Kifenbach, who called himself in France the Chevalier des Harpocrates. He was a native of Lorraine, and a pure gentleman, to use a phrase which had great meaning in his time. He was, in other words, of noble birth, of excellent education, and a man of courtly manners. He was thrown into prison by the Minister Louvois, who, for his own ends, desired the papers which the Chevalier had in his possession, and which were very compromising to the minister's enemies.
