SCENE IN A CHURCH.—On Sunday night, at the close of the sermon, Rev. John Taylor, of the Charlotte-St. African M. E. Church, N. W. corner of the square, had a prayer meeting. Mrs. Frances, leader of the female prayer meeting, Mr. Newman, a church trustee, sprang up and excitedly objected to the appointment. He said that it was the duty of trustees, not of the pastor, to make this appointment. A dozen angry voices were heard in favor of the pastor or against him. Mr. Taylor attempted to read the law, which gave him the power to make the appointment, but was unable to do so on account of the confusion. While the excitement was at its height, a steward of the church, one Caray, threw off his coat, ran up the aisle, jumped the railing, and mounting the pulpit stairs, attempted to strike Mr. Taylor. The latter stood quietly in his place. A woman screamed to him to shoot Caray, and as he was preparing to defend himself, three men dragged his assailant away. The confusion continued several minutes, and Mr. Taylor was escorted to his home by a number of friends. The trouble had its origin in animosity to Mr. Taylor.—New York Sun.

LUCEA'S BREAKFAST DRESS.—One of Lucea's prettiest toilets is thus described: It consisted of a white cashmere Dolman, superbly embroidered in white silk, and trimmed with a knotted fringe of the same. This was worn at home and at breakfast. It was accompanied by a skirt of pale-lavender cashmere, with bands of velvet of the same shade, and slippers of velvet matching the dress. The arched throat of the fair skin was decorated with bracelets, and a necklace of plain gold bearing a rich locket set with pearls; but her hair was perfectly simple in its arrangement, not even an ornamental comb being visible.

White is greatly affected by the charming prima donna, whose youthful face and child-like manner seem to suit her white vestments; and any one seeing the delicate head with its sweet facial features and plainly-arranged hair, must have been fascinated by the suitability of pure simplicity to beauty, and of beauty to pure simplicity. Lucea—in a white cambrie morning wrap over pink silk, and with hair loose—is as pretty a picture as ever an artist's eye would care to dwell upon.

A ROW.—A startling episode, which came near ending in a tragedy, occurred in Milwaukee on Thursday, in connection with the marriage of Mr. J. B. Gregg, a worthy business man, and Miss Augusta Sherman, daughter of Mr. James P. Sherman, a wealthy private banker. Mr. J. P. Sherman, a brother of the bridegroom, remonstrated against the bans, and his parents refusing to listen to him, he became violent and made threats. When the wedding party arrived at the residence of the bridegroom, the young man rushed to his room. Mr. Sherman, the elder, and his son-in-law, Levi Blossom, followed the young man quickly and found him armed with a loaded shot gun, which he leveled at his father. As he pulled the trigger Mr. Blossom threw up the barrel of the gun, and the murderous charge shattered a mirror in the room. Young Sherman then produced a revolver, but before he could make use of it he was bound hand and foot and conveyed to the county jail, where he still remains. The marriage ceremony was then performed without further molestation.

THE KENNETT ART SALE IN NEW YORK was a remarkable one. All the pictures—most of them painted by the late Mr. Kennett—brought fair prices. The bidding was at times very spirited, and the bidders represented the best of art, not only in New York, but from Baltimore, Chicago, Philadelphia and Boston. The sale continued for six evenings, and the lowest aggregate sum realized on any one of these evenings was, in round numbers, eight thousand dollars, and the highest thirty-four thousand. The total amount obtained for the whole collection was one hundred and thirty-seven thousand dollars. This is one of the most striking instances of the growing appreciation of American art that it has been our pleasure to notice. The high rank Mr. Kennett held as a painter, was, of course, an attraction, and the value of the pictures sold, even when they were not from his hand, was guaranteed by the known excellence of his taste and by his acknowledged sound judgment.

ROY STURM.—A young man named George Warren, whose parents reside at Beloit, Wis., committed suicide at the Fulton, Illinois Military School, on the evening of the 25th of March. He was 16 years old, but being larger than his usual age at that age, and usually in his bearing, many persons believed he was really nineteen or twenty. For some time past he has been exerting young ladies to parties, taking them out riding, spending considerable money and contracting debts. His father was informed of his conduct, which was censurable for nothing but extravagance, and determined to take him home. He came here for the purpose of attending school for the purpose of seeing him. He was in his room talking to some of his classmates, and when told by his father, in their presence, that he had done wrong, drew a revolver from his pocket, placed the muzzle to his forehead and blew out his brains.

VIRGINIA BIBLE SOCIETY.—The report of the Board of the Managers of the Virginia Bible Society, shows a great revival in the Bible cause. In no history of the Bible Societies of the world has so much been done in the way of printing and circulating the Holy Scriptures. A liberal estimate places the work of the different societies and private publishing houses at 8,000,000 copies, embracing 252 different languages and dialects, and reaching in the aggregate 40,000,000 souls. In the field assigned the Virginia Bible Society, the work has been well and thoroughly done, and the laborers in the cause have been generally successful in their appeals for aid. Much destitution, however, is still reported, and laborers in the vineyard are still wanted. The receipts last year from all sources were \$10,512.35, and were unprecedented. The ensuing year is entered upon with the most encouraging prospects.
