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Order of Patrons of Husbandry.
[From the Baltimore American.]

The western farmers' movement with its accompanying granges, is attracting great attention on account of its political significance. As information upon the subject becomes more full, the importance of the subject is magnified, for it is shown that these associations are not a mere outgrowth of people impelled by casual emotion, but parts of an organized system, possessing vast influence and capable of concerted action. It seems that the "Order of Patrons of Husbandry," as it is called, did not originate in the West, but the idea was first born from an association that had existed for many years in a community of Scotch farmers in North Carolina. It is said to be nothing more than a secret, cooperative, industrial, and literary association. In the winter of 1867, while several of the leading agriculturists of the West were in Washington on business concerning the farmers' interests, the character of this society became known to them. The idea was taken up, and elaborated so as to serve for the purposes of a large and influential Order, and in the spring of 1868 the Order was introduced by the institution of a grange at Itasca, Minn. From this beginning it spread gradually through Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Illinois, so that about the beginning of 1872 the number of members in those four States were estimated at about 75,000. Later occurrences gave a great impetus to the movement, so that the membership in the four States is now estimated at 450,000.

From a western paper we glean some account of the Order. It is a secret society, with regular degrees; women as well as men are admitted in the subordinate granges, but females cannot get beyond the fourth degree. The members of the first degree are designated respectively as Laborer and Maid; in the second degree as Cultivator and Shepherdess; in the third degree as Harvester and Gleaner; and in the fourth degree as Husbandman and Matron. The other higher degrees are conferred upon men only, and belong to the higher grades, or granges, as they are styled. The seventh degree is the highest that can be attained, and is only conferred upon officials of the next highest order. The supreme executive authority in the Order is lodged in the Master of the National Grange, but each subordinate grange elects its own officers. The lower granges meet at least once a month; State granges once a year, and the National Grange every two years.

The Order is somewhat beneficial in its character, as it exercises a supervision of its members and assists those who are unfortunate. The granges appoint agents of their own for the sale of agricultural implements. In some places they have purchased or leased grain elevators; in Iowa they have built an agricultural implement factory of large capacity, and similar enterprises are projected there and elsewhere.

The political significance of such an organization can hardly be over-estimated. A body of such thorough organization is a formidable instrument in the hands of able men, and the Order comprises many such. The growth of such associations cannot but powerfully affect the politics of the whole nation and effect permanent changes in legislation.

REV. MR. SPURGEON AND HIS AMERICAN OFFER.—It appears from a statement made by the Rev. C. H. Spurgeon at the Metropolitan Tabernacle that he has had a tempting offer to visit America. The following is his version of the matter: "I will just tell you one little thing that happened to me this afternoon. I had a letter from a gentleman well-known in America giving me this offer: \$25,000 for twenty-five lectures—that is, \$200 for each lecture. On these terms the twenty-five nights would give me \$5,000, and in a hundred nights I should have \$20,000. Besides this, I should be allowed to lecture as many more nights as I chose, so that I might in the course of a year be worth \$50,000, and no doubt the persons who undertake this would earn ten times the amount. I have nothing to do but to leave you for a year and come home with \$20,000 or \$40,000; while if I stay here I shall have nothing like that. What do you suppose was my answer to this offer? I wrote, 'If you were to multiply that offer by one hundred times, and again a hundred times, I should feel it as easy to decline as I do now, when I say that I cannot cross the ocean to lecture upon any subject whatever. I am a minister of the Gospel, and never lectured for money, and do not intend to do so now; and if my people cannot support me it is a pity.' Some people will say, 'Why not go over to America and get the money to build the college?' I shall not do so because I would not do one thing to degrade myself nor disgrace you. I shall not make any appeal to another country to do what you can and ought to do. There are two brothers here to whom you have received offers from America. Each man can lecture as well as preach, and there is no harm in their having \$500 and a month's holiday. If I were in their position I should do the same thing, but as I am I cannot leave you. I cannot leave the college nor the orphanage, nor if my house were filled with silver and gold from top to bottom. There are two things which I should feel if I went to America. The first is that I should go not to preach the Gospel, but to lecture; and I cannot do that, not for the national debt."—*Liverpool Athlete*, April 10.

AN ILLINOIS WOMAN has discovered that while she has acquired certain rights under the new laws in that State, she has also incurred corresponding liabilities. A Mrs. Martin was recently slandered by a Mrs. Robin, and brought suit against the husband of the slanderer, setting a verdict. The case was appealed, however, and the Supreme Court reversed the decision, holding that as wives could now hold property and do business independently of their husbands, the husband should not be held responsible for their wives' misdoings. In consequence of the decision, the Judge said: "The chains of the past have been broken by the progression of the present and she may now enter upon the stern conflicts of life untrammelled. She no longer clings to and depends upon man, but has the legal right and aspires to battle with him in the contest of the forum; to outvie him in the healing art; to climb with him in the steps of fame, and to share with him in every occupation. Her brain, hands and tongue are her own, and she should be responsible for slander uttered by herself."
