Letter from Sir Samuel Baker.
NEW YORK, August 25.—The Fall Mail
Gazette, of August 13, published a letter from
Sir Samuel Baker, dated Khartoum, July 7,
in which he says: "The news of Livingston's
discovery is most cheering; but I am
satisfied that an examination of the
north end of Tanganyika, that there does
not appear to be any connection with the
Albert Nyanza. Since I wrote to Sir Roderick
Murchison, the King of Uganda, M. Tese, to
send me the search for Livingston, I
sent messengers to me at Fatiko, saying that
his men had been to Ujiji, and declared that
Livingstone had left that place long ago for
the west side of Tanganyika, since which
nothing was known of him. They also reported
that three white men had been to Ujiji, but had
returned. I sent one of my men with M. Tese,
to remain with him as my agent.
This man, Selim, was one of Speke's faithfuls,
who, having got drunk in Alexandria, was
seized by the police and made a soldier. Thus
his destiny brought him into my service."
I wrote a letter to Livingston, which will
certainly reach him if he comes north, and the
King of Uganda will receive him kindly and
forward him to the Government station. I
established a station opposite Riogang island, on
the Victoria Nile, north latitude 3° 10'. My
next station is Fatiko, north latitude 3° 10',
at which place he will find himself at home
should he reach them. The envoys sent by M.
Tese all assured me that Tanganyika is the
Albert Nyanza, and that Ujiji is on the eastern
border; that you can travel by boat from Ujiji
to the north end of the Albert lake, but you
must have a guide, as some portions are very
narrow and intricate. By my experience of the
high water grass I should expect islands and
floating vegetation in the narrow passages
described. I am by no means fond of geographical
theories, but the natives' descriptions were so
clear that I accepted as a fact that the Tanganyika
and Albert lakes are one sheet of water,
with marshy, narrow straits overgrown with
water grass, through which you require a guide.

CAPE SCENE IN MILAN.—There is no spot
on earth, says the correspondent of the London
Times, where the principle of life and let live
is more consistently acted upon than at Milan.
There are no professional mendicants in this city,
and no unprofessional beggars; the name is
legion, and these exist for the simple reason that
their fellow-citizens patronize them, and like to
have them about them. It would be hardly
possible to believe under what a variety of
branches of industry beggary and vagrancy
continue to thrive among these easy-going Milanese.
Prowling around and even under the cafe
tables are swarms of children, ill-combed and
dirty, but by no means tattered; their
appearance is to be patiently for the stump of
your halfpenny Cavour cigar, but they look you
fully in the face as the foul weed is growing
small by degrees and beautifully less, and if
you look they think you good-natured, they
are for a lump of sugar out of your coffee
tray. These urchins the cafe customer has
always on his right and left, and even under
his legs; the waiters, uneasy about stray
coppers, or even about Christoffe spoons,
sudden and fierce razzias among them;
but to what purpose if the customers look
benevolently on the little Arabs—young Barab-
basses, they call them—and if the cigar stump
and the sugar lump, with an occasional un-
solicited copper, are sooner or later forthcoming?

These upon the heels of this juvenile gang
a boy of flower-girls, flower-women, and even
flower-women are sitting from bench to
bench, with slovenly, long-trailing garments,
sweeping over you with a breeze that is meant
for a smile, trusting a faded pink into your
buttonhole before you are aware of their intentions.
Next comes a band of hawkers and
itinerant vendors of cheap wares, stationery,
fan-blades, alabaster and marble works,
pamphlets, photographs, books, papers,
pencil matches, blue spectacles and umbrellas,
fans and warning-pans, every article in or out
of season; the pushing peddler, opening his
pack or lifting the lid of his box under your
nose, eager for a bargain, offering a free choice,
and inviting you to name the price. And, all
the time, above the talk of the tables, the
call of the waiters, the screaming of the children,
the rattle of the hawkers, the chaff and banter
of the crowd, there arose the squeak of the
skiddle, the strumming of the guitar, and the
sawing of two, three or more itinerant com-
panions of musicians, besetting the threshold.

A ROMANTIC STORY.—The following story
is told by the Galveston (Texas) Commercial
Advertiser, who was sent to the penitentiary of that
State a week ago: "He is a German of noble
birth. His uncles and brothers distinguished
themselves in the late Franco-German war;
they were high in rank and lived in princely
palaces. Yet this brother, perhaps of morals as
good as the best of his family, will for two years
live in the Texas penitentiary. This young
man seems to have been the favorite of his mother,
but he hated his father. He was sent
to the first schools of Germany, and is proficient
in ancient and modern languages; but he was
indolent and spent money at random, being taught
nothing that is useful. When of age he was
given a few thousands and sent to this country.
He was so proud that while the young man
was neither crazed nor a fool, he does lack that
which is called gumption. He married a woman
who after a season deserted him. From
the time of his desertion he became a wanderer.
He was sick he returned to Germany, and was
cared for by his family to the most celebrated springs
of the country, and when he was fully restored
he returned to this country with sufficient
money to have established him in a small business,
but he wasted all—and it is strange that he
does not appear to be addicted
to any of the money eating vices. Reduced to
poverty, he walked from Mobile to New York
seeking employment. Then he got back to
Alexandria. Here he acted as scullion in a
board-house, waiting on the table
and cleaning knives. While engaged in this
work he stole two watches worth \$7, and on
being charged with it he confessed the offence
and begged the Recorder to send him to the
penitentiary, that he might learn a trade and be
able to support himself. He told the Recorder
that he was not sent to the penitentiary,
and he could learn a trade, he would go out
of there. He was the most anxious man to get
out of there we ever saw. We hope that his resi-
dence at Hutsville will be productive of all
the good he anticipates from it and that when
he is freed he will be a self supporting, respect-
able citizen."
