**On the Preservation of Health.**  
At this season hints on the preservation of health are perhaps the most acceptable service we can render our readers, whether in country or city.

The New York Scientific American vouches for the efficacy of the following remedy, the editors having seen it effectually tested during the rage of the cholera in that city some years ago. It was known as the "Sun Cholera Mixture," and was given to the public by the most eminent physicians of the day. It is not to be mixed with liquor, and may be compounded without professional skill. Dose 10 to 20 drops. It is:

"Tinct. opii, capsici, rhei co., menth, pip. campho."  
"Mix the above in equal parts; dose 10 to 20 drops. In plain terms, take equal parts tincture opium, red pepper, rhubarb, pepper, and camphor, and mix them for use. In case of diarrhoea, take a dose of 10 or 20 drops in 3 or 4 teaspoonfuls of water. No one who has this by him and takes it in time will ever have the cholera. We commend it to our friends, and hope that the recipe will be published. Even when cholera is anticipated, it is an excellent remedy for ordinary summer complaint. It can be carried about the person in a small vial."

Don't keep a solitary parlor, into which you go but once a month, with your person, special guests or sewing society. Make your living-room the house. Let the place be such that when your boy has gone to distant lands, or even when, perhaps, he clings to a single plank in the waters of the wide ocean, the thought of the old homestead shall come to him in his desolation, bringing always light, hope and love. Have no dungeon about your house—no room never open—no blinds that are always shut.

In the name of oxygen, which is the great life principle of the animal body, let us beg you to give the sick person a full and constant supply of fresh air. If you keep him well covered he can never take cold by having the windows open day and night. If the wind blows upon him, rub his face and neck with your soaked hands frequently, and there you need never be a mischievous impression made. Remember that although a well man may live in a room with imperfect ventilation, a sick one must have the help of a pure tonic atmosphere. Remember that when typhoid fever attacks an army, and there is a deficiency of hospital accommodations, those who lie in an open shed or exposed to the dews and storms do much better than those who enjoy the average hospital facilities.

These escape contagious and infectious diseases, says the Cincinnati Commercial, whose bodies are in the best condition to resist their attacks. Cleanliness of person is one of the things needful, but bathing ought not to be carried to excess, or so far as to weaken the system. The diet should be nourishing, and not rife and fresh. But it is a mistake to exclude them altogether from the table. Very little change should be made in the diet at any time and only such articles avoided as are known by experience not to agree with the individual. With the body kept high toned and vigorous, and the mind calm and hopeful one may walk safely where the pestilence wasteth at noonday and not fear attack.

An engine crowded to its utmost possible capacity, and run day after day without oiling will last but a little while. No more can a man crowd the work of a week into a single day, and still retain his health and strength. Physical laws are not always immediately enforced. Sometimes the penalty does not follow the transgression for years. But one thing is certain, sooner or later it will come. The man who is careless of his health, is sowing the seeds of disease the fruit of which he will reap. It may come soon or it may be delayed for years, but in either case it will make him wish that he had been more careful. In the education of our children in the common schools, there is great lack of instruction in the laws of health. No child, however humble his circumstance, ought to finish his school course without a thorough knowledge of physiology and hygiene. It is no use to educate a boy in arithmetic and geography, and languages, and leave him in such ignorance of the laws of health, that he will die before he is twenty years old, of sickness which he might just as well have avoided. And among young and old knowledge in this department of science, is one of the greatest needs of our times.
