THE FINANCIAL CONDITION.

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 23.--Twenty deaths occurred in Shreveport yesterday. The disease is spreading in the suburbs and is attacking acclimated persons and blacks, who are generally exempt. Superintendent L. Homedjian reports that the destruction is becoming nearly as alarming as the pestilence.

The Union Trust Company. The papers were forwarded to Judge Blatford, who is at Newport. The petition is filed by depositors, but their names could not be ascertained.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

A boat page from Washington to Fort Foote and return came off to-day. At 11:30 a. m. the boats passed here on their way down in the following order: Fannie Bell, Gertrude, J. E. Givens. As they passed here on their return the Gertrude and Fannie Bell were side by side and the J. E. Givens close behind.

The loss on the southwest corner of the intersection of Duke and Water streets caught fire yesterday evening from a defective chimney, but the flames were extinguished by the neighbors without raising an alarm.

Some of the late residents of Madison alley, who after their flight from that famed locality established themselves on the opposite side of the canal locks, gave a ball yesterday, at which there was a revival of the disturbances and disorderly proceedings to which they were accustomed.

Col. S. King Shay, who has been in feeble health for some time past was suddenly taken ill on the street this morning. He was assisted to his home by Rev. Mr. McKim and Mr. W. C. Bantz, and his numerous friends will be glad to learn that since then his condition has improved considerably.

Since the late raids upon the Italian padroni in the northern cities, Alexandria has been visited by more of the olive complexioned children of the sunny land than formerly, and the sounds of the lute and harp strings are becoming familiar on the streets of the city.

Two cattle trains on the W. C. V. M. & G. S. R. R., one following the other, collided yesterday while rounding a curve between Clifton and Fairfax stations, but no damage was done save slight injuries to the caboose of the train in front and the tender of the one behind.

Two additional sets of arches are in progress of erection at the Aqueduct bridge of the Alexandria Canal. They are within the truss, on either side of the water trough, and are being erected for the purpose of strengthening the supports of that trough.

The exhibition given by Lent's Circus last night was attended by an immense crowd--so large that a countryman while coming away from it after the performance was over, was heard to say that he "didn't think there were so many people in Alexandria."

The last excursion of the season will be made to Carlin's Springs on Thursday next. Among the prizes to be given on the occasion will be a handsome carriage to the best looking baby on the grounds; and a valuable gold ring to the winner of the ladies' sack race.

The schooner Prince William while coming into the Queen street dock this morning ran her bowsprit into the engine house on the end of the Hampshire and Baltimore Company's coal wharf and smashed up steam pipes and other things generally.

Many Episcopal clergymen, who are to attend the Jubilee of the Alumni of the Virginia Theological Seminary which will commence to-morrow, have already arrived here, but many more are expected to reach here by this evening's and to-morrow morning's trains.

Benjamin Paul, conductor of a freight train on the Manassas branch of the W. C. V. M. & G. S. R. R., was caught between two cars at Salem yesterday and badly hurt. He was brought to this city on the passenger train last evening.

In giving the above notice, I desire to append the following remarks: A custom has obtained in the collection of gas bills, which has almost become law, of granting indulgence to consumers, by which much money has been lost to the Works, and when attempt is made to collect after the amount has accumulated, unpleasant feelings have been engendered, rendering my position anything but pleasant.
