And were there not refinements in those days,  
And elegant luxuries of domestic life?  
I read the answer in the precious things  
Whereof these clustering cabinets are rife.

What can we show so beautiful in art?  
What new of ours can match their wondrous  
old—  
This fragile porcelain—this Venetian glass—  
This delicate necklace of Etruscan gold?

And was there not religion, when the Church  
Was one—a common mother—loved and  
feared?  
When haughty souls rejoiced to bear her yoke—  
When all those grand mosaicic piles were  
reared?

And were there not some preachers—Chryso-  
stoms,  
Whose golden words still linger, like a chime  
Of falling echoes in lone Alpine glens,  
Amongst the sonorous voices of our time?

And soldiers—heroes? Do we shame them  
much?  
Have we not seen them in days of  
yore?  
Are they more jealous for their manhood now—  
Do they respect and honor women more?

Are they more noble than those good old  
knights,  
Who scorned to strike a foe, save in the face;  
Who reckoned gold as dross to gallant deeds,  
And counted death far happier than disgrace?

Is life more grand with us, who bask at ease,  
And count that only excellent which pays,  
Than 'twas to the stout hearts that wore the  
steel  
In those dark, turbulent, fearless, fighting  
days?

—Good Words.  
HENRY WARD BEECHER, in his Yale College  
course of lectures on Preaching (now attracting  
much attention) has some remarkable passages:  
"Most revivalists that I have known are men  
with immense bellies and immense chests and  
big under-heads. They are men that carry a  
great deal of personal magnetism with them,  
a sensuous magnetism, too, and they have a  
great power of addressing the under mind; and  
they will set feelings undulating like waves,  
and will carry men on them. I do not believe  
you could preach with effect to the boatmen  
and the gamblers of Arkansas and to all the  
riff raff of the community, those who really  
live down in the cellar of their heads, unless  
you brought the motive of fear to bear upon  
them. If you could in any way bring the higher  
or feeling in their natures to act in and of itself  
upon the lower ones, there would be regenera-  
tion in that direction. But, ordinarily, men  
that work among those classes are men of largely  
of the earth, blessed with vigorous circulation and  
force of throwing out sympathetic influences  
upon men; and because they preach largely  
to the under-class, men who are moved by these  
science and by nothing else, they preach these  
seer and terrific doctrines, and preach them  
with all the imagery that has come down to us  
from the mediæval times, with hoofs and horses,  
and all manner of exaggerated statements. I  
have heard a revivalist in my pulpit make  
statements to my congregation that, if I  
believed them to be true, would make me  
abandon the Christian ministry—I  
was going to say, abandon do it society and  
forsake my race! The thing was so hideous!  
He stood there—and afterward, when I was  
with him, it appeared that he had no com-  
punction—and he began to do it society and  
that the mind was capable of infinite develop-  
ment and increase of capacity. Well, that is  
pure supposition to start with. But, assuming  
that, he went on to say that it would go on in-  
creasing forever in power of thought, and power  
of susceptibility, and power of enjoyment, and  
power of suffering. That being granted, he  
went on to say that if men go to hell they will  
increase forever and ever; and when he came  
to the application, it was this: "I have no  
doubt," said he, and his great white eye  
glinted as he rolled it around the audience,  
"that there are men sitting before me who will  
by and by be in hell, and will have grown and  
grown and grown in the power of suffering un-  
til they will have reached a point at which  
they will suffer more in a single minute than  
all the suffering of all the damned from the be-  
ginning of creation to the present hour!"—  
There was his logical inference; and then he  
multiplied it and went on, saying that there  
would be multitudes and multitudes of them  
there, while angels were singing glory to God,  
and while God was looking over into the pit  
and seeing that terrific scene, enjoying himself;  
he wanted me to believe that, and then worship  
God! Now, where you deal with men in com-  
munities in that way, it is you who are to  
blame; for the reactions are sometimes very  
terrible in revivals."
