A CUBAN HOAX.—In the "Want" column of one of the city morning papers yesterday appeared an advertisement headed "Notice. (Who must and shall be free!)" The "notice" further stated that "three hundred men were wanted to go to Cuba." Applicants were told to apply at the establishment of a well-known cigar and tobacco manufacturer on Centre Market space, the proprietor of which is also somewhat of a politician, and resides in the Sixth Ward. Of course, the whole statement in the advertisement was a hoax. Yesterday morning the place of business of the gentleman mentioned was invaded by large crowds of men, all of whom were willing and anxious to enlist in the cause of the Cuban patriots. The street in front of the premises was at one time blocked up by the applicants, and it is estimated five hundred persons called upon the supposed Cuban colonel that was to be. These and the crowds of lookers-on at what was believed to be a genuine warlike demonstration in Market space made a thorough nuisance to make matters pretty lively for some time. The people were only dispersed after the intervention of the police. The gentleman thus imposed upon became naturally very indignant, and believing the author of the advertisement to be an officer in the Criminal Court, he applied to Judge Gilmer to redress his grievances. The Judge will, it is supposed, investigate the matter. It was, however, demonstrated by this humorous affair that volunteers for Cuba will be forthcoming by thousands in Baltimore when wanted.—*Balt. American.*

"A PEPPING TOM."—For fatuity, genuine and thick, give us a later "Peppin Tom of Coventry" of Newark. He annoyed a respectable family by persistently peeping through their windows. Upon complaint being made, he was found at the rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association and arrested. The reason for acting as he did was—

that a young lady lived in the house, to whom he desired an introduction. He wanted to see if any other young man was keeping company with her. To show that he was respectable, he offered to bring to Congressmen to testify to his character. He was so thoroughly scared that Justice Mills, after cautioning him not to repeat the offense, discharged him from custody.

The idea of bringing two Congressmen to testify to character!! Who would testify to the character of the Congressmen? It would be like an advertisement which once appeared in the London Punch, "Wanted—A new police force—to watch the present one." Speculation has a wide scope as to who these two Congressmen were, whose testimony as to character would be more valuable than that of ordinary men. Ben Butler? Morton? THE LADIES' CAR.—The "ladies' car" is a vicious fashion, and fosters the art of lying. There goes a young man at the heels of a lady whom he never saw before or spoke to in his life, and he is carrying a spick-and-span hand-box. My word for it, it is as empty as a church contribution box on Saturday afternoon. He bought that box for precisely that purpose. The lady ascends the platform. So does the hand box. The brakeman opens the door, and the young man slips unquestioned, and secures a comfortable seat. There is an air of confidence. He appears to be a good man. You are sure he is, and he stands where the brakeman can see him, and he touches his hat to a window of the car where nobody is sitting and then with a little smiling affectionate haste, he skips up the steps and says, "Please let me in a moment?" and in he goes. That unfortunate man never beheld a face in that car in all his life. The more you think of it, the more vicious the fashion seems. It does not benefit the ribbons, and is a positive damage to the whiskers. Pen men up together, and if they do not act like cattle, it will be in spite of the pen! Women sprinkled through the cars keep the train upon its honor, if not upon the track, and elevate the lumbering thing from a common carriage to an educator.

A WORKMAN'S TOWN.—We find in the Daily Graphic the following account of Lord Shaftesbury's town of Wandsworth, in England. The land consists of forty acres and upon it are built three hundred and fifty houses, known as "the workman's city." Eight hundred more houses are now building. They are of four grades of five, six, seven, and eight rooms respectively, which rent from about two dollars up to four dollars a week, or, if purchased, they are sold for from seven hundred dollars to fifteen hundred— the purchaser paying down a certain sum at once and the remainder in weekly or monthly installments. The little town is said to be a model. In the rear of all the houses are spacious yards, and in front of each house there is a fine court with an ornamental railing. The streets are planted with trees forming miniature boulevards. Three acres are reserved in the centre of the city for a park; and a gymnasium and schools, baths, a library, a co-operative store, a lecture hall, and workmen's institute have been established. No public houses are allowed within the municipal limits. Altogether it is exclusively a workman's city, and, so far, has been a decided success.

CARE OF HORSES AT NIGHT.—Few men who handle horses give proper attention to the feet and legs. Especially is this the case on farms. Much time is spent of a morning in rubbing, brushing and smoothing the hairs on the side and hips, but at no time are the feet examined and properly cared for. Now it is known that the feet of a horse require more care than the body. They need ten times as much, for in one respect they are almost the entire horse. All the grooming that can be done won't avail anything if the horse is forced to stand where his feet will be filthy. In this case the feet will become disordered, and then the legs will get badly out of fix; and with bad feet and legs, there is not much else of the horse fit for anything. Stable prisons are generally severe on the feet and legs of horses; and unless the buildings can afford a dry room, where a horse can walk around, lie down or roll over, they are not half so healthy and comfortable to the horse as the pasture, and should be avoided by all good hostlers in the country.—*North British Review.*
