IRELAND—THE "GEM OF THE SEA."—As seen by the tourist, it is a most beautiful country, possessing every variety of surface and soil, from rugged mountains to lovely valleys and expansive plains. The streams are everywhere bright and clear, and generally swift running. For so small a territory there are remarkably large rivers and lakes. With the exception of one or two in Switzerland there are larger lakes in Ireland than can be found elsewhere in Europe. The Shannon is a larger river than any in Great Britain, and navigable for a longer distance. The climate is remarkably temperate and equable. Many plants which can only flourish in hot-houses in England, flourish in the open air in Ireland, while the great moisture which prevails is so favorable to vegetation that the country is carpeted in almost perpetual green. This verdure extends to the mountain tops where there is a particle of earth, and on the sea shores right down to where the ocean breakers dash against the rocks. From what I had heard before visiting Ireland I supposed it was nearly a treeless country. But such is not the case. Every rod square almost, which is unfit for cultivation, is covered with trees. Trees abound on the mountains and on the steep hill-sides, and along many of the roads and lanes; and they may be seen anywhere standing singly or in clumps. Where one tree is seen in Illinois from the windows of the train, fifty may be seen in Ireland. The hedge-rows add greatly to the beauty of the landscape. The foliage of the thorn is very dark green, and those live fences can be distinguished for long distances, subdividing the face of the country into squares like those on a chess-board.—*Joe Medill in Ireland.*

DESTRUCTION OF SHEEP BY DOGS.—We shall appeal to the Legislature, and we hope every farmer in the State may do the same to pass some sort of a law to protect the raising of sheep. There is not a State in the Union better adapted to sheep raising than Virginia, and there is not a State we are sure, more cursed with worthless dogs than Virginia. Every negro but in the State has a supply of from two to half a dozen half starved raw-boned curs. These worthless whelps starved by day, make their mid night marauding expeditions on the sheep-fold of a neighboring farmer; killing and crippling more sheep than would pay for feeding the owner of the worthless brutes for twelve months. What farmers want [not those who make a living by hunting] is a law passed to protect them in a most honorable and profitable industry, and one which will do as much to build up the resources of the State as any other one branch of business. It seems to us that the members of the Legislature and the representatives of the people, and hence interested in the material welfare of the State, should see the necessity of passing laws to protect the farming interest. A law was passed by the last Legislature giving the Board of Supervisors authority to levy a tax on dogs, the tax to be applied to put to school purposes. This law proved to be unsatisfactory and was repealed by the last session of the same body that passed it. A general law should be passed to tax dogs, and the proceeds be used to pay for losses to owners who have their sheep destroyed by dogs, and if there is a remainder of tax, let it go into the school-fund. The law should be so framed that if the tax on a dog is not paid that such dog shall be killed by an officer, and the officer be paid for so doing out of the dog tax. Let a law of this sort be passed and it will be popular with the people, and worthless dogs will decrease and mutton and wool will multiply.—*Manassas Gazette.*

THE CHAMPION HOG.—[From the Troy Press, Nov. 15.]—We have on one or two occasions given an account of the extraordinary feats of the famous eater employed in the brewery of Fitzgerald Brothers, of this city. The first feat of which public notice was taken was his consumption, for a bet of \$25, of an eleven pound boiled ham, four pounds of corned beef, two loaves of bread, a dozen cups of coffee, and three pies, which feat he accomplished in an hour and a half before partaking of his usual dinner. He afterwards offered a challenge, to any man in the States of Massachusetts, Vermont, Connecticut, and New York to eat more of any kind of food for a bet of \$200, but had no one to take him up with the exception of a man in Southern Massachusetts, who boasted that he could eat twice as much as the brewery man, and afterwards swallow our home champion besides; but this Massachusetts man never made his appearance.

The brewery man now offers to eclipse all his former efforts by the following feat: There will be a double wedding party from North Adams at the Mansion House on the 17th inst., and the champion offers to wager \$100 that he can eat, at one sitting, the food prepared on that occasion for the entire party!

INFERNAL MACHINES.—It was once thought that the governments called "Imperial" enjoyed a monopoly of the threats of "infernal machines." The two Napoleons were repeatedly in danger from conspiracies that used machinery to kill them, and were willing, if the prime object could be achieved, to risk any number of incidental murders. But in these latter days the infernal machine comes into use against individuals as well as princes, for New York was but the other day excited over the discovery that a loaded box, filled with powder and armed with friction matches and emery paper, and pistol cartridges, had been sent to Mr. Green, comptroller of finances, and would probably have been opened but for the caution of a subordinate in that official's office, who soaked it in water first and then opened it. Mr. Green has long been known as a powerful enemy of the ring whose chief has been sentenced to Blackwell's Island.—*Norfolk Virginian.*

A CHECK.—The conditional recruiting for Cuba, which has been going on for some days at a saloon on West Baltimore street, near Calhoun street, has come to an abrupt termination. On Thanksgiving eve a disturbance occurred between one of the Cuba volunteers and three outsiders, necessitating a retreat in disorder by the volunteer. The landlord of the public house not relishing any warlike rehearsals on his premises, shut up the recruiting office and ordered an evacuation of the premises. The Cuba flag which had been floating in the breeze in front of the establishment was hauled down, and the surrender was completed.—*Balt. Sun.*
