THE ROSE THAT BLOOMED EIGHTEEN YEARS IN A BABY'S COFFIN.—[Cynthiana (Ky.) Democrat, November 21.]—Mr. William Whitehead, who resided near Claysville, in this county, died in June, 1870. Early in that year he made a will and bequeathed the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars for the purpose of moving the bodies of the deceased members of his family, and to improve the grounds, to one burying-ground near the mouth of Beaver creek, in this county. The executor, Mr. N. K. Whitehead, proceeded to discharge the duties by employing Mr. John B. Hamilton to remove them, improve the grounds, and erect head and foot-stones at their graves.

Among those to be removed was a child of Dr. Will Curran, of Claysville. On Monday week, the 10th inst., Mr. H. disinterred the child, who was buried in a metallic case, on the 6th day of July, 1855, in the Whitehead burying-ground in Claysville, and being unable to remove the screws in the face-plate of the case, was compelled to saw it off. Upon removing the face-plate a sight was revealed that struck them dumb with astonishment. Instead of finding, as they expected, a few bones as the remains of their household pet, that had been buried eighteen years and four months, they beheld, as it were, a sleeping infant. The child looked as natural as life, and was in a perfect state of preservation, with the exception of the nose, which was gone. The doctor being present, immediately carried it to his home, where, nineteen years ago, it was the joy of the household.

This was indeed a great curiosity, and many of the citizens of Claysville and vicinity came to the doctor's office, where the body remained until Saturday, to see it. On Saturday the doctor brought it from Claysville to this city, and took it to the residence of Mrs. M. Shumate, where hundreds of our citizens flocked to see it. But the strangest part is not told. The child, which was two years old when it died, was very fond of flowers, and more especially of the damask rose, and when taken by its grandmother, with whom it was a great pet, it would go to this rose bush.

When the child was dying its grandmother pulled two damask rose buds, not yet bursted, gave them to the child and it died with them in its hand. After preparing the body for burial the rose buds were placed upon its breast and removed from the case, and when brought to this city, the roses were not only in a perfect state, but the leaves were as green as ever, and instead of being buds, as they were when placed upon the child's breast, had become full blown roses. This is the most remarkable case of preservation we have ever heard of.

A FRESH M. C.—One of the Republican members from the Empire State, (who, of course, is an extremely fresh and green fellow, and will soon learn more,) made a very ludicrous answer to a constituent who applied to him last evening to see the President in his behalf for a small favor. The constituent had materially aided the present temporary success of this retired merchant, and presenting a letter from a fellow-member from New York city introducing him, asked the M. "Yes, sir," retorted the green one, "but I don't know you personally, except by this letter."

"From a fellow member," interrupted the constituent.

"Yes, I know, but I don't know the President."

"Well, it's d-d easy for you to know him," said the constituent; "call upon him and hand in your card. He'll know you then, and that's all sufficient."

"But I don't know you, sir!"

"Ah, yes," replied the misguided voter, "just so! I didn't know you at election either, when I worked for you and had others working for you, and if I had known you, sir, between you and me, I don't think I would have worked quite so hard for such a stick! Good night!" and the constituent walked away.

MR. THOMAS W. DAVIES, of California, ought to turn his attention to prospecting for the precious metals, as he is better than a witch-hazel at finding treasure. In October last, as he was going to his home from San Diego he found on the way the treasure box of Wells, Fargo & Co., which had either been lost from the stage or removed by robbers who meant to return and open it. Mr. Davies placed the safe in his wagon, carried it home, and stood guard over it all night for fear of thieves, and the next day carried it into San Diego, where he delivered it to the express agent, with a bill of \$10 for his services. The bill was promptly honored, and subsequently Wells, Fargo & Co. sent to the finder a costly gold watch and chain. The publication of these facts has reminded the Cleveland Herald that in 1840, the same Mr. Davies, then a resident of Ohio, while he was out shooting, found a wallet in which was contained the year's taxes of Huron county, in bank bills, which the treasurer had dropped while on his way to deposit them at the county seat. What amount of cash and other valuables Mr. Davies found lying around those between 1840 and his recent find in California, has never been recorded.
