**A SHOVEL SAVES A MAN'S LIFE.**—The Litchfield (Minn.) Ledger says: About two weeks ago a Swede by the name of Torgilerson who resides in Swift county, was proceeding to a neighbor's, some three miles distant from his own home, carrying a shovel on his shoulder, which he was returning to his neighbor, from whom he had borrowed it. He had accomplished about half his journey and was passing through a small grove when he heard a crashing in the underbrush, and, turning round, saw a stalwart deer, of the buck persuasion, making for him with every demonstration of hostile intentions.

There was but one course to pursue, and that was to fight for his life, and, being a powerful man, he anticipated an easy conquest. Mistaken man! The deer charged with antlers lowered even as an enraged bull would lower his head when dashing at his foe. Nels, grasped his shovel and stood stoutly on the defensive. As the enraged buck neared him he aimed a desperate blow with his shovel full at his head.

It struck one of his antlers with such force as to break it, but the concussion was so strong that it forced Nels backward several feet, and hurled him breathless against a tree. Just how the fight went after that Nels, don't remember, but he knows that he fought with all the strength of desperation, and at last the deer and himself both fell to the ground, and Nels, lost all consciousness for a time.

When he came "round to his soul again," the deer was lying stark dead near by him, and he could barely crawl away. His clothes were in rags, his left cheek torn open, a gash on the right side, where the deer had inserted one of the prongs of his antlers, and three fingers of his left hand jammed up. The shovel was a total wreck, and the carcass of the deer was pretty well hacked around the head and shoulders.

The blow that caused the animal's death was inflicted by a sharp corner of the shovel remaining on the handle after most of the blade had been broken off. The wounded man succeeded in crawling back to his home, which he reached in a terribly exhausted condition. It is thought that he will survive his wounds.

NEVADA is a land of singularities, of perpetual surprises, of unexpected natural phenomena. The last freak of this queer and astonishing region is reported by the Enterprise of Virginia City. It occurred near the works of the celebrated Ophir mines. The whole city was startled one night this month by observing a full column of flame sixty feet high issue from an old shaft which had been abandoned. It was thought the timbers were on fire. Men rushed to the opening. On reaching the shaft, however, they found that there was no smell of smoke, and also that the supposed fire was a light unlike anything they had ever before seen, in its weird whiteness and the strange oscillations of its component particles. In the light the faces of the men wore a look of corpse-like pallor. Two or three of those present were miners returning from work with dinner pails in their hands, and it was observed that the tin appeared of a brilliant steel-blue color. The light came up the full size of the large square shaft, and seen at a distance as it rose up through the falling snow, closely resembled one of the shooting spires seen in the aurora borealis, and it seemed to have something of the same waving and inconsistent motion. Although the men felt creeping over them a sort of superstitious awe, they still had sufficient courage to approach the shaft and gaze into it. A strange sight was there seen. The whole interior of the shaft seemed to be at a white heat and glowed like a furnace. The timbers on the sides were particularly brilliant, and each splinter, excrescence, or bit of fungus seemed darting dazzling rays that streamed steadily out in all directions. A warm, steamy current of air steadily ascended from the sweltering regions below, and there was observed a sickening, musty smell. The occurrence is attributed to an extensive caving in the interior of the mine, forcing out the confined gases.

CONDITION OF AFFAIRS IN ALABAMA.—Advises received from Alabama represent that this year has been one of unprecedented calamity and disaster. The failure of the cotton crop has been intensified by the monetary crash, and the farmers being unable to subsist the negroes or to borrow money, as formerly, are under an absolute necessity of curtailing their scale of operations, and the negroes are forced to seek food and shelter in Mississippi. Dallas, Perry, Hale and Marengo will lose one-third of their negro laborers this Fall and Winter, and it is thought that at least 15,000 negroes will leave the State, and that many farmers will be without hands next year. This exodus of the laboring population has unsettled and deranged everything, and land can hardly be sold or rented for a fair price in the black lands. Mules and horses will be in little or no demand in Alabama this Winter or next Spring. Indeed, the agricultural change so long and earnestly wished for by many is about to be realized—the surrendering of cotton as the prime crop. Land owners must now abandon cotton and devote themselves to small grain and stock; small farms will be the rule, and white labor must take the place of that heretofore employed in the cotton fields.—Balt. Amer.

WILL OF A MILLIONAIRE RECORDED.—We learn from the Spirit of Jefferson published in Charleston, Jefferson county, West Va., that week before last, the will of the late, Samuel Miller, of Lynchburg, Va., was entered of record in the Clerk's office of the County Court of Jefferson county by N. M. Page, surviving executor. This will covers property to the amount of nearly \$2,000,000; it was made in 1859, admitted to probate in Virginia in 1869, and has since been recorded in two States—Virginia and West Virginia—disposing of property belonging to the testator in Ohio and the two States above named. By this will \$140,500 is given to establish a female orphan asylum at Lynchburg, \$20,000 to the city of Lynchburg for water improvements, 60 acres of land in Campbell county, Va., for the erection thereon of a manual labor school, besides a number of smaller legacies. Three executors are named in the document—Messrs. Samuel McCorkle, and N. M. Page, of Albemarle county, and Chiswell Dabney, of Lynchburg, Va.—and no security required of any of them. Of the three but one—Mr. Page—now survives to execute the will. One thousand dollars worth of revenue stamps appear upon the document.
