SUIT IN WASHINGTON, D. C.—A suit, designed to attract no little attention, was brought yesterday afternoon, in the Circuit Court, by Godfrey & Goell, restaurant keepers, in the neighborhood of the Legislative Hall, against Peter Campbell, late Speaker of the House of Delegates of the District, upon whose requisition, it is alleged, the articles for the price of which the suit is brought were furnished at the recent session of the Legislative Assembly of the District. It is said that it was expected that the bill would have been paid out of the contingent fund of the House, but prior claims exhausted the funds. The declaration in this case is an ordinary one in assumption. The bill of particulars, which begins the 28th of April and closes the 25th of June, foots up \$1,019.65, and is exclusively for refreshments, cigars, &c. A few days' charges may be cited as a sample of the bill:

April, 28th, fifty sandwiches \$5, six spring chickens, \$5, four dozen fried oysters \$2.20, two plates of fish 75 cents, six deviled crabs 90 cents, small drinks \$1.20, nine bottles of wine \$36, cigars \$6.80. May 5th, six bottles of whiskey, \$9, six whiskey glasses \$1.50, one box cigars \$10, thirty sandwiches \$3, cigars 25 cents, small drinks 75 cents. May 6th, bottle Holland gin \$1.50. May 7th, two bottles champagne \$8. May 8th, two dozen fried oysters \$1.50, bottle old whiskey \$1.50, and after this fashion the items go on sometimes, "fine old brandy \$6," and occasionally small items like "tobacco 20 cents." On the 17th of June there is a "supper for our committee," six chickens \$7.50, wine \$32. Many suppers and dinners enter into the account, but a single "breakfast 95 cents," is charged June 20th. On an occasion a "check from table" is put down at 40 cents, and then a "check from slate" at 55 cents. On the 25th, "breakfast and lost napkins \$15" is added to the bill. The suit is brought by L. G. Hine, but will not come on for trial before next fall. —Letter from Washington.

THE GREAT NAVAL DRILL.—Fifteen of our best naval vessels are now in rendezvous at Key West and are to have a naval drill at the Dry Tortugas, and, as our correspondent at that place observes, the exercises will consist of sailing in squadron, deploying in order of battle and other marine evolutions. Landing in surf boats, lowering drill in boats and on shore will be carried on; the marine corps will be exercised in battalion drill, and the mysteries of portages, as discovered and taught at Newport, will receive due attention, as we are informed that "a large schooner has just arrived from the North bringing an assorted cargo of the very latest patterns of torpedoes." "Away, all hands!" is a command which has seldom been heard from the horse block since the dark hours of the last war, but will be sounded from the decks of our few remaining frigates while the batteries are supposed to be engaging the enemy; and at the very moment when the boarders—pike, pistol and cutlass in hand—are secreted behind the bulwarks and hammock nettings, the proper appliances will be fitted to prevent the enemy's boarders from executing a counter movement. All of these exercises will simply prove the value and efficiency of rival systems; for rival systems exist on the sea; and, as they also exist on shore, target firing—a feature in warfare to which Captain Lee called attention in his exhaustive treatise on "Manning the Navy"—will be practised by all the assembled batteries, and we are convinced, in a manner which will show that our naval ordnance, such as it is, is well handled by our gunners, whether they be officers or men. Fuses, the charging of shells, great-gun exercise, the internal police of a man of war, fleet tactics, signals and the steam engine of our naval service will be thoroughly tested. —N. Y. Herald.

CHEAP TRANSPORTATION.—An adjourned meeting of the members of the House of Representatives in favor of cheap transportation took place Saturday night at the Capitol. The attendance was small, those most prominent at the first meeting being absent. Representative Stone, of Missouri, presented a preamble, setting forth, among other things that the Towboat Association of New Orleans, being opposed to the improvement of the South Pass Channel, compelled Captain Howell, of the United States Engineers to abandon his work by placing obstructions in his way, the Association receiving its income from tugboat and lighting vessels; and the United States agent has no power to oppose the hindering course of the Association; therefore

Resolved, That the Senate and House of Representatives in Congress assembled, be requested, and to protect public works of river and harbor improvements to the end that private individuals and corporations may not destroy such works without incurring suitable penalties, and also appropriate a sum not less than \$150,000 to continue the work of improving the mouth of the Mississippi river during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1875.

After conference, it was voted as the unanimous sense of the meeting that Representative Stone, on Monday, bring this subject before the House. After amending the first part of the resolution in the form of instructions to the proper committee to consider and take action on the subject, the meeting adjourned for three weeks. —Letter from Washington.

WHAT IS THE MATTER NOW?—The New York Tribune of Saturday says: "There were laid before us yesterday certain startling documents, gravely affecting high officials. The publication of them seems to us a clear duty; but we are unwilling to permit our columns to be used in promulgating papers that must bring such discredit upon the American name while there is the remotest possibility of our being able to establish their lack of authenticity. We have therefore set on foot a thorough investigation that will soon determine the matter, while meantime, and for this special reason, we reserve the documents themselves, and all expression of opinion concerning the conduct of the officials involved."
