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ANCIENT RUINS IN ARIZONA.

A letter to the St. Louis Republican gives the following interesting account of some ruins recently discovered in Arizona: A careful examination of some extensive ruins, found some miles east of Florence, on the Gila river, has been made. Lieutenant Ward was the first explorer who came upon the desolate remains of a once imposing architectural pile. It has been deserted perhaps for more than a thousand years, and has been crumbling away in the wilderness. The Apache even never pitched his tent upon the spot so thickly strewn with fragments of the work of a perished race. The principal ruin is a parallelogram fortification, 600 feet in width by 1,600 feet in length. The walls, which were built of stone, have long been overthrown, and are overgrown by trees and vines. In many places a mere ridge indicates the line of the wall, the stones having disappeared beneath the surface. Within the inclosed area are the remains of a greater structure, 200 feet by 260 feet, constructed of roughly-hewn stones. In some places the walls remain almost perfect to a height of some twelve feet above the surface. On the east side of the grand case there are two openings of an oval shape which doubtless served the purpose of windows. On the inner sides of the wall of the palace, for such it doubtless was, there are very perfectly distinct tracings of the image of the sun. There are two towers, at the southeast and southwest corners of the great inclosures, still standing, one of which is twenty-six and the other one hundred feet high. As the broken tops and amount of debris near their base indicate, a few copper ornaments, some small golden ornaments, one being an image of the sun with a perforation in the middle—and some stone utensils, and two rudely carved stone vases, much like those found at Zupetaro and Copan, in Central America, are all the works of art yet discovered. No excavations have been made as yet to determine fully the extent and character of these ruins. The ruins are situated in a small plain, elevated nearly two hundred feet above the bed of the Gila. Just west of the walls of the fortification there is a beautiful stream of water having its source by the mountains, which crosses the plain, and by a series of cataraets fall into the Gila about two miles below. The fragments of pottery and polished stone reveal a condition of civilization among the builders of these ruins analogous to that of the ancient Peruvians, Central American and Mexican nations. The country in the vicinity of this buried palace is particularly wild, and unusually desolate. No clue to the builders of this great fortified palace with its towers and moat, has been, or is likely ever to be discovered. One thing, however is apparent, that this whole country was once peopled by a race having a higher grade of civilization than is found among any of the native tribes of the later ages. But whether this race were the ancestors of the Pimos, or some extinct people, is not and cannot certainly be known. The ruins on the Gila are another uncovered Palenque, another Copan, an Atlan exposed at last to bewilder and confound. It is understood that these extensive ruins will be thoroughly explored within the present year.

OLD LOVE REKINDLED.
The wedding was that of Mr. Conger, member of Congress from Michigan, with Mrs. Sibley, widow of Major Sibley, United States army. She was Miss Humphries, daughter of Judge Humphries of the Supreme Court of the State of Ohio, and twenty-seven years ago was affianced to Mr. Conger, then a handsome, blooming youth. They quarreled and parted. In six months the quarrel was forgotten, and they were again engaged. Miss Humphries was pretty, and a flirt. Her flirting propensities did not please Mr. Conger, and he remonstrated with her. Being a high-spirited girl, she again and finally broke the engagement, telling him she would never marry him. He left the State. She married and he married. Major Sibley lived twelve years. There were no children, and at his death she went abroad. Mrs. Conger lived a few years, and left three children. In October, weary of European life, Mrs. Sibley determined to return to her home in Cincinnati. Arriving in New York, it occurred to her to come to Washington for a few weeks. Oh, woman, how mysterious are thy ways! One day, time hanging heavily on her hands, she wandered (?) to Congress, of course, never dreaming that in this august body sat her affinity! An hour passed; the debates were prosy and tedious. So, gathering her wraps about her, she prepared to leave the gallery, when there was a tap on her shoulder. Turning, who did she behold but the lover of her youth!

After the commonplace greeting in an agitated voice, she made the inquiry: "I suppose some family are with you?" "Did you not know that my wife was dead?" With tragic start she averred she did not. They chatted some time, and, on leaving, she said: "I am at the Arlington, will you come and see me?" and then in a low voice replied Conger, "I will come if you will take back what you said twenty-five years ago." "I will," she answered, and she smiled.

The engagement was very brief, and the happy twain were united last Saturday morning at 11 o'clock. The bride wore a pearl-colored satin brocade with diamond ornaments, and looked very well, albeit she could not look sentimentally, for she is not very young, and weighs about one hundred and ninety-five pounds.—*Cincinnati Commercial.*
