The Special Committee on Debt reported favorably. On motion, it was resolved that the Committee on Rooms, in conjunction with the Committee on Cottage Prayer meetings, shall take into consideration the expediency of erecting for the use of the St. Asaph street Sunday School Committee, a suitable building for their purposes, out of the available funds of the Association and report at the next meeting.

On motion it was resolved that the General Secretary be authorized to pay monthly, in advance out of the funds which he may have on hand, the room rent, to Mr. G. E. French, commencing on the 1st day of July, and account to the treasurer for the same.

The Association then adjourned after the usual religious exercises, and the benediction pronounced by the Rev. Mr. Odell.

THE CAT CASE.—It was stated in yesterday's Gazette that a warrant had been issued for the arrest of George Brown, charged with taking a dead eight-legged kitten from the premises of Mrs. Betsey West. The warrant was executed, and the case was tried this afternoon in the presence of a large crowd, by Justice Padgett, at his office in Market Alley. The only witness summoned was O. M. Patterson, who refusing to give evidence, was sent to jail for three days.

Mrs. West's statement was that Brown entered her premises and took away from beneath a piece of tin a dead kitten having eight legs, the value of which she estimated at \$50. Brown's statement was that he heard a strange sort of a kitten had been born at Mrs. West's, and that upon going there and finding the thing dead, he had taken it away and carried it down to the shooting gallery, the proprietors of which, he believed, had taken it to Washington. Judgment was given against defendant for costs and kitten, or the estimated value thereof, from which, however, it is said he will appeal upon the ground that the warrant calls the kitten a one two-headed kitten, while in fact it is only one head, but two bodies.

C. & O. CANAL.—The June meeting of the directors of the Chesapeake and Ohio canal was held at Annapolis yesterday. President Gorman's report shows that the coal tonnage for May was 114,566 tons, an increase of 8,905 tons over May, 1873. The gross revenue was \$69,454, an increase of \$6,741 over May 1873. This increase is attributed to increased facilities at Georgetown and to the improvements of the canal. The balance, after paying May expenses, \$19,000, available within the next ten days, is set down at \$44,349. This large balance, together with the accruing revenue, will enable the board to appropriate a sufficient sum to pay another coupon on the preferred construction bonds, and have a sufficient amount in the treasury to meet all ordinary demands. Mr. Gorman, therefore, recommends that \$50,988 be appropriated, and notice be given that the coupon on the preferred construction bonds, which matured January 1860, will be paid at the banking house of Alex. Brown & Sons, Baltimore, on the 31st.

SETTLERS.—The Virginia Midland Railroad Company has, during the current week, sold four tracts of land near Bristol Station, Prince William county, to settlers from Philadelphia; one to Charles Danvers, two to M. J. Murphy, and one to James Brown.

ABINGTON PARK.—The sale of the lots at Abington Park, the new town laid out on the land of Mr. Alexander Hunter, between this city and Washington, will take place to-morrow. The lots are of various sizes. The site has public grounds, large and small, wide and broad streets, a beautiful river near, and scenery of rare loveliness. Positions have been allotted to the future town hall, churches, and school houses. Small lots for those whose means permit only a small expenditure, are grouped in the vicinity of the public reservations, so that the largest number of persons can enjoy them whilst larger lots and more distant from the centre, and especially on the heights, can be bought by those who are disposed to create all the beauty around their homes which they may desire. The rectilinear and right angular system of town building has been abandoned, because it is not well adapted to a rolling country like Abington Park, and because gently curving lines are more agreeable to travel over, make shorter distances between important points, and will make the completed town more beautiful. Every part of the town has been laid out for convenience and beauty; much of the land is given to the public in avenues, green parks, roads and parks. All the tramps from this city on the A. & W. R. R. will stop there to load and take on passengers.

SALARY BILL.—Dr. J. B. Johnson and Mr. Moore, of the Board of Aldermen, and Mr. Hopkins, of the Common Council, of the Committee of Conference on the Salary bill, met last night and determined to report a bill containing the following provisions: Making the salary of the Mayor \$500, and the receipt of tax on the Corporation seal; the Auditor's \$800 and 2 per cent. on the licenses, which license shall issue, instead of the Mayor, as heretofore; Superintendent of Gas, \$700; Superintendent of Police, \$700 and the street warden; Clerk of Market, \$600; Collectors of Taxes 2 per cent. on amount collected; and they are required to call at the house of delinquents once every month during the last six months of the fiscal year; Chief Engineer of Fire Department, \$50; Commissioner of Revenue, \$300; Treasurer \$200; Clerk of Common Council, \$400; Messenger of Common Council \$150; Clerk of Board of Aldermen \$100; Messenger of Board of Aldermen \$200; Physicians to the Poor, \$100 each; Steward of offices, \$150; Clerk of Gas Works, \$700; Keeper of Town Clock, \$150; Keeper of Poor's House \$350; Corporation Attorney, \$50, and City Surveyor, \$100.

POLICE REPORT.—The following cases have been reported at police headquarters since yesterday: James Branch, colored, for whipping his wife, was fined and discharged by Alderman Janney, who presided at the Mayor's court this morning, Mayor Kemper being temporarily absent in Staunton.

Hugh Strider, for attempting to break into the ticket office at the depot of the W. & O. R. R., was committed to jail by Justice May for his appearance at the next term of the Corporation Court.

A woman giving her name as Annie Laurie, an inmate of the work house some months since, for disorderly conduct, was locked up for examination.

A member of the chain gang, a colored boy named C. H. Silby, alias Frenchy, for refusing to do duty, was locked up in the station house, but turned out again upon promising to go to work.

There were no lodgers at the station house last night.

STRIKE FOR LIBERTY.—Some excitement was created on King street, between Royal and Pitt, this morning, by an attempt to escape made by one of the chain gang, a colored man named C. H. Silby, alias Frenchy. He had just been released from the station house, in which he had been locked up for refusing to do duty on account of having no shoes, but having been furnished with a pair by the Superintendent of Police, was being put to work again, when he ran off, holding his ball and chain, which were detached from his leg, in his hand. His attempt, however, was frustrated by the watchmen, who, after a short scuffle, during which the prisoner was knocked down, held him until the arrival of the police, by whom he was rejailed to his command.

MOUNT VERNON.—President Grant and a large number of distinguished people will visit Mount Vernon on Saturday next upon the invitation of the Regent of the Ladies Mount Vernon Association. The steamer Lady of the Lake has been chartered to convey the visitors to and from the place. Col. Musby will be present, but accompanied by Col. Robt. Ashby, Mr. Boyd Smith and Mr. D. A. Windsor, of this city, will drive down in the carriage of the last named gentleman. The steamer Arrow will make her regular trip to Mount Vernon on that day for the accommodation of the public.

ARREST OF A YOUNG OLD OFFENDER.—Hugh Strider, a young man whose name was familiar in police reports a year or two ago, but who escaped from the chain gang, and has been absent from the city ever since, after a release from the jail in Washington, in which he was confined for a robbery in that city, was detected here yesterday afternoon attempting to break open the ticket office at the Fairfax street depot, and after a short chase, during which he essayed to scare his pursuers by pretending to draw a weapon, was arrested and committed to jail for court.

SANITARY REGULATIONS.—One "heated tem" has already passed and another, it is expected, will soon be upon us. The city is in a bad condition for its advent, and it behoves every resident of the city to pay strict attention to the regulations of the Board of Health, adopted at their last meeting, and published elsewhere in to-day's Gazette.

FROM WASHINGTON.

CONGRESS. WASHINGTON, June 17, 1874. The Senate, after the morning hour business, was engaged, to-day, with the Postal Appropriation bill.

The House of Representatives, after passing the bill to preserve the ballots and papers in Congressional elections, took up the Appropriation bill.

From New York. NEW YORK, June 17.—Harry Genet's property was sold yesterday to satisfy his bail bonds. The sale falls short of realizing the amount of bail by \$3,000 and a further levy will be made.

The strike of the hog butchers of the Jersey City abattoir has terminated, the company having reinstated the foreman, on account of whose discharge the butchers struck.

The strike of the bricklayers continues. At a meeting of a number of bosses yesterday \$4 per day was offered for ten hours' work, but was refused, the men saying the society discontenanced ten hours daily labor under any circumstances.

Foreign News. CALCUTTA, June 17.—The prospects for future crops are greatly improved by the copious rains now falling throughout the country.—Three hundred thousand persons are being fed by the government.

LONDON, June 17.—Advices from Algiers state that a body of Moorish insurgents invaded that city, but the French troops repelled them. Five of the insurgents were killed and a number injured.

LONDON, June 17, 12 30 p. m.—The weather throughout England to-day is wet, but favorable for the crops.

From Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, June 17.—Weston commenced his attempt to walk two hundred miles against time at noon to-day.

The Boston Fusiliers arrived in the Park about noon and were received by the State Fusiliers. They marched over the new Girard avenue bridge to be opened to the public on the 4th of July next, passed through the Park to the Green-street gate and then made a short parade to the Fusiliers' armory, where they were refreshed and completed their parade, ending at the Continental, where they are quartered.

West Point Graduates. NEW YORK, June 17.—The standings of the graduates of West Point were proclaimed at a dress parade last evening, and the general merit standing will be made public to-day. The last parade of the graduating class took place yesterday, and they gave a hop in the evening. The diplomas to the graduates will be awarded to-day at noon.

Discharged. ATLANTA, Ga., June 17.—The proprietors of the Herald state in their morning issue that they yesterday discharged their entire force of union printers because they demanded pay for the advertising matter set up in another office.

Rhode Island Senatorship. PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 17.—The Joint Convention for the election of U. S. Senator, to-day, after two ballots, the last of which resulted, Burnside, 43; Dixon, 26; Barstow, 16; scattering, 21; adjourned until to-morrow.

Suicide. BALTIMORE, June 17.—Mrs. Anne Need, aged 47, committed suicide by hanging this morning while laboring under temporary aberration of mind.

Drowned. CAPE MAY, June 17.—Mr. Dunn, of Camden, was drowned yesterday while bathing near the light-house.

Shipment of Spec'c. NEW YORK, June 17.—The steamship Cuba takes to-day \$750,000 in gold coin and \$200,000 in silver.

Navigation on the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal was suspended from Saturday until Monday by an obstruction at dam No. 6, where the boat Isaac Wilson of the Borden Coal Company ran aground and knocked the capping stone of a lock gate into the lock.

In consequence of the diminished travel on the Alexandria Canal, two lock tenders and all the repair gang except the boss, have been discharged.
