**GAMBLING AT SARATOGA.**  
SARATOGA, Aug. 14.—Yesterday Senator  
Morrill, of Maine, and Speaker Blaine were  
walking by "The States," apparently in a deep  
conversation. Several journalists watched them  
as they passed, and thinking the third term was  
the subject of discussion, one journalist remark-  
ed to Sam Cox:

"I'd like to know what those politicians are  
talking about. I'd give five dollars to know."  
"You would?" said Mr. Cox. "Then I'll ask  
'em." Then turning around, he caught Blaine  
by the sleeve and told him what the journalist  
had said.

"Well," said Speaker Blaine, "I was telling  
a dog story."  
"What was it?" No concealment now," said  
Mr. Cox.  
"Well," said Blaine, "Col. E. S. Sanford,  
of Brooklyn, and I were travelling down South.  
The feed had been bad for a day or two, when  
one day at a railroad station we had a big plate  
of hash, Col. Sanford stuck his knife into it  
and looked at it kinder curiously, when the  
landlord remarked:

"You needn't be afraid of that thar dish  
stranger, 's long's bull pup is worth more than  
logs."  
"Now, what were you talking about Lot?"  
asked Mr. Cox, looking at Senator Morrill.  
"Lot was telling how he went into John  
Morrissey's gambling place last night," said  
Mr. Blaine, laughing. "He said he had  
wanted to go for a long time," continued  
Mr. Blaine, "but was afraid to go. By and  
by Henry Wilson said: 'Why, Lot, why  
don't you go?' It won't hurt you just to look  
'n."

"So I went last night," said Senator Mor-  
rill, joining in; "went and saw the whole  
thing."  
"Well, what did you see, senator?" I  
asked.  
"First," commenced the senator, taking a  
chair, "we entered a big reception-room about  
20 by 35, carpeted with thick, downy tapestry.  
Here there were a great crowd of well-dressed  
people talking in groups, and smoking and  
drinking. John Morrissey stood in the room  
receiving people, but I walked by unobserved.  
Then we passed through large folding-doors  
into a wing-room filled with gambling tables."

"What were they playing?"  
"I don't know. I can't tell one game from  
another; but some one told me that one man  
was dealing Faro, a man was rolling roulette,  
two men were running tables when they played  
rouge et noir, and two men dealt cards in a  
game they called trente et quatre. Crowds of  
eager men huddled around the tables, and  
large sums of money were lost and won. The  
betters did not look like professionals. They  
were well-dressed gentlemen whom I see  
every day promenading by elegant ladies,—  
I was surprised to see how freely and with  
what little concern many gentlemen  
mixed in the scene, and even gambled heavily,  
who would have shrunk from entering an  
ordinary gambling house. Custom has made,  
Morrissey's place a kind of 'free-and-easy,'  
where almost every guest in Saratoga goes  
once, and where many moral people consider it  
proper to spend their time. Little by little  
their prejudices have been worn away, until  
they hardly appreciate that they are in a gam-  
bling den." Then the senator drew a long sigh.

"Did you try John Morrissey's cooking, sen-  
ator?" I asked.  
"No. We went in and saw a great many peo-  
ple eating game and drinking wine, and saw  
some young gentlemen intoxicated with cham-  
pagne. That filled me with indignation, and I  
left, and I never want to see another gambling  
place again."


"Did they gamble heavily?"  
"Why, yes. They said one man lost \$3,000,  
another man \$1,500, and they said a night or  
two ago a man lost \$10,000; so that's a good  
deal of money, don't you think so?"  
I told the senator I did.—*Cor. New York

the precincts of our houses, and at this mo-  
ment one, bolder than his comrades, is trying to  
devour a newspaper by my side. The sound pro-  
duced by his efforts is similar to that of a  
wood rasp vigorously applied. The doors and  
windows are closed to keep the intruders out.  
It is even unpleasant to be out doors, to have  
them circle in myriads about your head and  
feet, and hear the incessant humming. At  
night they cease their travels, but do not fail  
to satisfy their voracious appetite. Their gen-  
eral actions and attitudes in the endeavor to  
satisfy their hunger forcibly reminds one of a  
lot of partially starved swine at their first meal  
after a long fast. It is amusing to watch  
them while on an ear of corn or a luscious  
apple, while it is undergoing a change under  
their masticating powers."
