FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.
The London Times, on the 3d of October, contained the following announcement by telegraph from Paris: "Several thousand persons have left Mecklenburg every autumn during the last few years for the United States, but this year the exodus has almost entirely ceased. The Hamburg steamers have considerably reduced their rates, but they obtain scarcely a dozen families from Mecklenburg as passengers. The explanation of this is that the young men find plenty of employment on the Grand Duke's domains, which occupy nearly half the duchy, and that the harvest has been of an abundance unparalleled for fifty years. Unfavorable reports, moreover, have come from America, and many emigrants are returning to their old homes."
Americans and other visitors to Paris in its former days, who remember what an attractive place the Garden of the Tuileries, open to all the world, then was, may not be quite pleased with the information that it has been almost determined to make a carriage-way right through its centre, on a line with the Rue de la Paix, over the bridge of Solferino to the Quay d'Orsay, on the river side of which is a newly constructed Rue de Solferino. The Garden of the Tuileries will be cut in two and made noisy and dusty by this severance, which will destroy one of the most pleasant and popular resorts of Paris, especially frequented by ladies and loungers, children and oddly-dressed provincial bonnets.

Not long since a young English lady, Mrs. Liskard, on her wedding tour, disappeared in a crevasse on Mont Blanc, before her husband's eyes, and was seen no more. Another, Mrs. Marshall, possessed with an insane desire to pluck with her own hands the edelweiss, a mountain flower which grows only at the greatest altitudes, slipped away from her husband, procured a couple of guides and started, with no other attendance, up the mountain. She, too, with one of her companions, perished in like manner. Yet, undeterred by these and countless other disasters of the same nature, we read that three young ladies have just accomplished the ascent of the Jurafrat.
Miracles are still being reported at Lourdes, which continues to be thronged with pilgrims. The Gazette de Midi states that a girl named Cavriac was carried to the shrine in a dying state, but had no sooner touched the holy water than she rose up perfectly well. Another girl, who had been dumb for seven years, commenced singing as soon as she reached the grotto. At Marseilles, moreover, the nuns have marched in procession to an altar in one of the churches which is dedicated to our Lady of Lourdes, to express their gratitude for the miraculous cure of one of their number, who had suffered for twenty months from an apparently incurable malady.

A new industry for women has been commenced in England by four ladies of standing in London. It is that of home decorative artists. They undertake the whole furnishing, upholstering, furniture, and all that tends to embellish the interior of a dwelling. They are said to be remarkably clever and very successful. They have served a regular apprenticeship, and acquired a thorough knowledge of the business. It would seem to be a business peculiarly fitted to the taste for and love of the beautiful inherent in women.
In 1873 there were 159 ships built on the Clyde, representing a tonnage of 251,846 tons. This year the number is expected to be 200. Of those enumerated 121 were large sea-going steamers, 10 were iron sailing ships, 6,000 wooden ships. One firm alone employed 10,000 men, and altogether there are more than 30,000 shipwrights in the neighborhood of Glasgow. The largest ship launched last year was the Iberia, of 4,820 tons, belonging to the Pacific Steam Navigation Co.

ANDY JOHNSON ON OLD AGE.—An dy John 800, in a recent speech, said: "My life since 1835 has been before the public, and is now a portion of the history of our country. I have written thirteen veto messages, four annual messages to Congress, and three to the State Legislature; and now if a man asks me what my 'platform' is, I would say that my platform is the constitution of my country; and if he wants another or broader platform he must make it as I am out of material. They say that I am ambitious; that I am old and ought to be quiet. In Greece they respect age, with its silver hair and flowing beard, but in our own country the little fellow who has just got out of swaddling clothes sneers at old age; and I am accused of violating the constitution by me who never read it. You know how the old song goes:
Whip him, skin him,
To the buzzards let him go,
Poor old horse, let him die."

According to the most recent calculations, the population of Japan amounts to 33,000,000. The country is divided into 717 districts, 12,000 towns and 76,000 villages, containing an aggregate of about 7,000,000 houses, and no less than 98,000 Buddhist temples. Among the population are included 29 princes and princesses, 1,300 nobles, 1,000,000 peasants (about half of whom are hired laborers), and about 800,000 merchants and shopkeepers. The number of cripples is estimated at about 100,000, and there are 6,364 prisoners in confinement throughout the country.

SUSPENSION OF A COAL AND IRON COMPANY.—The Virginia Consolidated Coal and Iron Company, whose mines are near Bloomington, has suspended operations. Their property was sold last week on account of the foreclosure of a mortgage of \$32,000. The entire property brought only \$20,000, and was bought by the trustees holding the mortgage. The closing up of this mine throws about seventy miners out of employment, to whom there is due two months pay, amounting to upwards of \$15,000. The loss falls very heavily on these men.

THE LEATHER INDUSTRIES OF RUSSIA embrace 2,471 manufactories, and employ 13,245 persons. The annual production amounts to about \$13,623,672. The cotton industries employ 67,347 persons, and the woolen industries employ 92,722 persons. The value of the productions of the former is \$53,794,093, and of the latter \$16,024,138.
