CASH PLAN ADOPTED.

The postage law, which goes into operation last of January, 1875, requires prepayment on all newspapers sent through the mails beyond the limits of the counties in which they are published. We have, therefore, determined to adopt the CASH PLAN for all subscriptions. While avoiding the losses, tardy payments and expenses of collection incident to the credit system, we will be required to prepay the postage. The change determined upon will, therefore, prove beneficial to both subscribers and publisher. The former will be relieved of the postage tax whilst the latter will be enabled to simplify the operations of his business and to improve the facilities for conducting it.

No name will be entered unless the subscription is paid for in advance.

During the past few months every subscriber in arrears has been furnished, through the mails, with a statement of his account. Many have responded with remittances discharging their liabilities and paying in advance for the current year. We appeal urgently to those who have not made a similar response to do so without further delay, as the first of January, 1875, we will commence to discontinue the paper to those who have not paid in advance. JAMES LICK'S ESTATE.

The most remarkable auction sale of which history gives us any account was held on Tuesday last in San Francisco. A portion of the immense estate of James Lick, given to trustees for public uses, was sold for two millions of dollars. The residue was withdrawn for disposal at a future day. Time would appear hardly favorable for the sale of real estate, and yet a sufficient sum has already been realized to accomplish all the specific purposes contained in the extraordinary deed by which this public-spirited citizen bequeathed himself, a few months ago, from vast opulence to a position of simple ease.

James Lick is a native of Fredericksburg, Pennsylvania, who learned the trade of piano-making in Philadelphia in the early years of this century. Having a taste for adventure, which was with him not incompatible with great industry and thrift, he went to South America, where he passed several years engaged in any business which offered, sometimes making pianos, sometimes dealing in furs, but always getting ahead. When the Mexican war broke out he threw up his hands and sought his fortune among Americans on the Pacific Coast. Mr. Lick resolved to seek his fortune in El Dorado. His business in Peru was relentlessly sacrificed, and he started for San Francisco Bay with \$30,000 in cash, the avails of property worth twice that sum. There were very few of the early emigrants who had any such sum of money, and still fewer who had such a head-piece as was carried on the square shoulders of the Pennsylvania piano-maker. He bought a lot and a large abode house on the north-east corner of Montgomery and Jackson-sts., to keep his safe full of doubloons and, then began to look about him. He saw that a great town was sure to grow up on those sand hills, and he lost no time in selecting and buying the most eligible positions in the future city. This was in 1848, when there were only a straggling village there, and the prices which Mr. Lick paid were usually above the market of the time. He wanted only choice lots and secure titles. He kept his own counsel, and for years afterwards, when the vigorous young city was spreading out on every hand, there were many vacant lots and blocks occupying the best situations whose ownership was a mystery to every one except the quiet speculator.

He is now 78 years old, and does not choose to wait until his death shall throw his property into the hands of bustling corporations and grasping heirs. He therefore made a deed in July last giving his whole estate to seven trustees, Thomas H. Selby, D. O. Mills, Henry M. N. Webb, William Alvord, Geo. H. Jones, and James O. Jones, and July 1, 1850, he used and purposes thereof specified. These purposes are of a remarkable character. Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars are to be devoted to the construction on the borders of Lake Tahoe, or elsewhere in the State of California, to be open to all youths born in California. Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars are to be spent in building a monument designed to commemorate the history of California, and One Hundred and Fifty Thousand are to be devoted to a Bronze Monument to Francis Scott Key, author of the "Star Spangled Banner," probably the largest proportion of monumental glory to the amount of copy which provoked it of which we have any record. One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars are to be spent in building free baths for the San Franciscans, and One Hundred Thousand in establishing a Home for Old Ladies who have no means of support. These are the principal purposes of the trust, though there are numerous gifts of \$25,000 and \$10,000 to various charities. The family of Mr. Lick are scattered in various parts of the country.

He gives \$5,000 a piece for gravestones for those who are gone, and the same sum or less to those who survive—less than Fifty Thousand Dollars in all. After these purposes are accomplished the residue of his estate goes in equal portions to the California Academy of Sciences and the Society of California Pioneers, to be used in the erection of suitable buildings, and the purchase of libraries, scientific collections, apparatus, and other things useful to the advancement of science.

The trust embraces every inch of ground and every cent of money owned by Mr. Lick. He places himself on the list of his own beneficiaries, in a curious manner. He reserves for

himself the use and enjoyment during his life of his homestead property at San Jose, in Santa Clara county, which is to revert after his death to the same societies last mentioned; and he further charges that the trustees shall pay to him such sums of money as he may from day to day or from week to week demand of them, not, however, exceeding the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars in any one year." It is said that it required some persuasion to induce him to reserve so large a sum as this for his own use. Such in short is a sketch of the most extraordinary public bequest of our time. It differs widely from the Peabody benefactions in the fact that the California capitalists has reserved so little for himself, and has left almost nothing for his relatives. The trust, if wisely and luckily administered, may be made the means of great good, but this it is impossible for any one to foresee. No one can tell being a little nervous as to the disposition to be made of the \$350,000 devoted by monumental art. The trustees have it in their power to give the Pacific Coast two of the finest monuments in the world, or to cover the name of James Lick with ridicule more enduring than brass.—*N. Y. Tribune.*
