LOCAL NEWS.

RIVER NEWS.—Though the ice may melt a little during the day, that which is made during the succeeding night more than equals the loss, and so the river continues to rise over from shore to shore, and the ice blockade remains almost unbroken. The steamer Lady of the Lake, from Norfolk, arrived about half past ten this morning. She reports the ice as solid down as far as Budd's Ferry, and as floating and obstructing navigation as far down as Nanjumbo Reach. She also reports several other boats at Piney Point awaiting a thaw. The Philadelphia steamer George H. Stout, which left Quantico yesterday morning, became fastened in the ice at Fort Washington, where she remained until this morning, when she was released by the Lady of the Lake and reached here in the wake of that steamer. The Lady of the Lake also towed up the piny boat Virginia Lee, loaded with oysters, and took her on to Washington, for which city she left after landing her freight here. The Lady of the Lake stopped at Mathias' Point and Glymont on her way up. The tug boats Smith and Perry and Mary L. W. started up the river about noon to-day for oyster boats reported to be fastened in.

THE SHIP YARD.—The new chain head made in Baltimore for the marine railway in this city, and which was supposed to be perfect, while being tested, yesterday evening, split and became worthless. The pattern was sent for by telegram this morning, and a new one will be cast at Jamieson & Co.'s foundry to-night, lay in the sand to cool to-morrow, be bored out on Monday, and be ready to supply the place of the broken one on Tuesday next, when the tug boat Governor Curtin, now on the ways will be launched, and the steamer Keyport be hauled up. The tug boat Susie Molyneux now on the old ways will be shifted to blocks in another part of the yard next week. A large gang of workmen is now employed in getting the wood ready for the steamer Keyport, which will be towed from Prince Street dock to the ship yard for repairs next week.

DEATH OF A FORMER ALEXANDRIAN.—Captain John T. Nicholson, a well known seaman in both the Atlantic and Pacific ports, died in San Francisco a few days ago. Captain Nicholson was a native of Alexandria, Va., and for many years commanded vessels in the merchant service between the capes of Virginia and New Orleans. In 1850 he was the commanding officer of the steamer Philadelphia, of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's line, sailing between New York and Chagres. Subsequently he commanded the Unicorn, before going to the same company, on the Pacific side. In 1851 he had charge of the company's depot at Benicia. It was owing to the exertions and suggestions of Capt. Nicholson that the United States Shipping Commissioners act of 1872 was passed, he having first pointed out its necessity and frequently memorialized Congress in its favor. He was in poor health for a long time previous to his death.—N. Y. Herald.

GOOD EFFECTS OF THE BLACK FLAG.—Justice J. O. Kirby, of the adjoining township, in Fairfax county, reports that since he nailed the black flag to his gate post and announced his intention of shooting anybody seen on his premises after dark, he has enjoyed immunity from the thefts from which his neighbors continually suffer. He met a noted colored chicken thief on the road the other day, and upon telling him that he had been expecting a visit from him, was told that the chickens in that part of the country were so poor during this cold weather that they were not worth going after.

SPORT IN THE COMMERCIAL EXCHANGE.—Business was light at the meeting of the Commercial Exchange this morning, owing to the small receipts of grain, the back country being almost entirely drained of that kind of produce; and if business was dull sport was not, and the way some of the members ran around the tables in pursuit of the pigeons which had been lured into the room by scattering wheat on the window sills, was wonderful. The birds that were caught were given to the janitor, who declared his intention of making them the material for a pet pie.

POLICE REPORT.—The following cases have been reported at police headquarters since yesterday afternoon:

David Lomax, colored, for disorderly conduct on the street, was sent to the work house for thirty days. Julia Stegals, a colored woman said to be insane, by getting old brass from the Henry street depot, and for wrenching the knob from the front door of the dwelling house of Mr. Aeton, was locked up for examination. Justice J. O. Kirby, of Mount Vernon Township, Fairfax county, has sent to jail for court Wm. Lewis, charged with assaulting and coloring a loaded gun at Wm. Koapp, both colored men living on the West Grove estate on the southside of Hunting Creek. The police at the upper end of King street beat were called to a house between Henry and Fayette streets late last night, by the screams of its inmates, who supposed robbers were about, but the noise they heard was, upon examination, supposed to result from the cracking of a freezing pich roof in the immediate neighborhood. Three lodgers only applied for and were furnished with sleeping quarters at the station house last night. The applications for assistance at the station house continue to increase in numbers. They are all carefully examined before being granted, and many of them are found to be those of people who are able to provide for themselves and are too lazy to work.
