### TRAMPS.

All Winter long, in town and in country newspapers, there has been a complaint of vagabonds their number, their impudence, their unwholesome appetite, their loped and widowed raggedness. Numerous, too, are the municipalities, large and little, which maintain free lodgings and afford eleemosynary provest for these, partly upon some pompous of philanthropy and partly from some politic idea that during the opportunity of the night a loafer housed is less dangerous to a loafer at large—that his stomach moderately filled with food and protected from the cold is less likely to invade the unskilled and less likely to reappear in a public park than that having been tolerably refreshed in one hamlet he will move on to another. So, through the hard season, poverty has been rampant, and the nomadic beggars have idly wandered in squalid procession from Dan to Beersheba, and so back again. It is unnecessary to prove by statistics what is within every body's field of observation. There is hardly a back door in the Middle States which has not this Winter been darkened by some street Arab rather demanding than beseeching his breakfast. In Trenton, N. J., lately, 60 tramps were lodged on a single night. The highways between New York and Philadelphia have been populous with paupers, and so will continue to be, even though work may be had for the asking upon the farms. Laziness is invincible. Shiftlessness is very sweet to certain natures. Always we have with us those political economists, the beginning and end of whose doctrine is, that "the world owes them a living," and, "the debt a just one or otherwise, it is a debt which the world is obliged to pay." We may arrange a wretch for having paid "no visible means of support," but seeing him to prison only makes our means of supporting him visible; and if we can force him to work out ten per cent. of the cost of his keeping, we consider ourselves fortunate. We get nothing. The reporter of a West Chester, Penn., newspaper, a few evenings since, found fifty-two lodgers packed in the little station-house like herders in a tub—in the berths, on the floor, and on the benches. Fifty-two by no means traquent creatures slumbering in a space of about ten by twelve feet, with a red-hot stove in the centre. There must have been a plenty of carbonic acid gas there, and more smells than Coleridge counted in Colozne. Guess upon the scene, the reporter framed this query: "Why should the people of West Chester assist half a hundred vagabonds to pass comfortably their lazy lives?" He printed this in the next issue of his newspaper, but out of his infinite wisdom he vouchsafed no answer. He merely remarked: "The problem deserves discussion."

A man who has always had a roof over his head, and something upon his dish or in his mug when he chanced to be hungry or thirsty, whose pocket-book has never been utterly vacant, whose back never as tad as bare is no position to judge intelligently one who might write pauperism after his name, if he knew how to write at all. So he looks scornfully upon the solicitor of alms, just as he who has always been successful in trade regards the bankrupt. He rises the changes upon shiftless, thriftless, luckless; "some people," he says, "have no faculty," and in saying so utters a much graver truth than he has any notion of. It is exactly so. Some people have no faculty. Nothing which they undertake succeeds, even if they have force enough to undertake anything. If they set up a shop, nobody comes to buy of them, for good reason, probably, and so they eat their food in trade. If they hire a house, the rent money is never ready upon rent day. If they sow, it is never wisely, and they reap nothing; if they keep hocks and heards, it is for the murrain; if they make contracts, violation upon one side or the other is sure; their wives turn out scold and slatterns, their boys larcenous and their girls lewd. Add to these characters those who are still more peculiar in being under the blighting, pulsing enchantment of inherited laziness—of that disinclination to lift a leg or a finger, which may be a mere matter of temperament, but which this excellent world persists in regarding as a matter of morality. "He could if he would," we say indignantly, as if "would" and "could" were not often convertible terms. Nobody is lectured in the world ever make one such industrious? In vain we point out to him the busy bee and the industrious ant; in vain we recite to him the verses of Dr. Watts ("Tis the voice of the sugard, and in vain we inform him that those who will not work shall not eat. He knows better, and it would make no difference if he didn't. He ate yesterday without working; he will eat to-day without it; and let tomorrow take care of itself! He is simply lazy! It is a disease. It is a destiny. It is in his head, arms, legs, and dorsal muscles. It is a fatal complaint which will not kill.

If this view of our lazy friends is a cool, respectable people, with two coats and every thing pleasant about them, fancy when the tramp is sent away unrelieved that he suffers dreadful agonies of mind, the hot distress of despair! Go back to your breakfast, dear madam, with no self reproach. The beggar dismissed without even the smallest courtesy or the least crumb is not around the corner tearing up hair, beating his bosom, and calling upon his deity to relieve him. Nothing of the kind, we declare to you. He is simply weary of your stinkiness, and considering at which door he shall next apply. He is "out" in the least possible. He isn't saying, "O heaven! what will become of my dear wife? of my poor hungry children?" He is determining whether he will try your village a little longer or push on to the next. Be satisfied that he will not die of hunger. Heaven helps the helpless and lifts up the heavy. The honest which you unnecessarily feel for him, rest assured, is the best part of this little transaction. Keep your money for the really worthy, your bread for the needy widow, and your railing for her shivering children.—*New York Tribune.*


