A RECENT PARIS BANQUET.—The horse-
flesh eating society of Paris have held another
banquet, at which some sixty persons were
present, embracing Drouyn de L'Huys, together
with other distinguished gentlemen and a num-
ber of ladies. The dishes were made up of
horse mule and donkey flesh, done up in all
the varieties of style for which the French
are famous. The horse soups were pronounced
excellent, while horse sausages were equal to
the best from any other animal, and horse,
mule and ass tongues were compared with
those of ox and reindeer. Asses' liver has a
strong flavor, and is not recommended. Filets
de mulets were also a failure; but fraicadeux
d'ane was pronounced tender and juicy, with
a very agreeable flavor. Filets de cheval rotis
have a mixed flavor of venison and beef. Be-
sides these and other dainties, the tables were
liberally supplied with asses' milk and butter;
sard dressed with horse oil, considered equal
to the best salad oil in use.

At the close of the banquet speeches were
made by M. Deceaux, founder of the Comite
de la Viande de Cheval de Paris, who claimed
that horse flesh eating was an obsolete and not
a new custom, which it is now proposed to
revive for the benefit of the poor of all countries,
who, but for prejudice, would be dining daily off
good horse, mule, or ass flesh, now wastefully
thrown to the dogs. In conclusion, he an-
nounced that a medal and a purse of five hun-
dred francs will be given by the Society, to the
first person who will open, in London or New
York, a horse butcher's shop.—Wash. Chron.

HEALTHFULNESS OF THE JEWISH RACE.—
A contemporary states that according to statistics
gathered in France, Algeria and Prussia,
the Jewish race is remarkable for longevity
and immunity from disease. Its mean aver-
age duration of life exceeds that of Christian
races by about five years. This tenacity of life
is due to the inheritance of a sound physical
constitution and to the watchful care of the
mother over her offspring. These two causes
insure the Jews comparative security from the
maladies that decimate other races. Tschadi
states that the plague of 1346 did not affect the
Jews of any country. Frascati asserts that
they completely escaped from the epidemic of
typhus in 1505. Rau mentions that the same
immunity from typhus was observed at Lan-
guens in 1824. According to Ramazzini, they
were free from the intermittent fevers prevail-
ing at Rome in 1601. And, according to Degner,
they suffered nothing from the dysentery
that raged at Nimongue in 1736. It is said
by other authorities that the croup is extreme-
ly rare among Jewish children, and that they
have very little scrofula.

How far the extreme care exercised in see-
ing that animals used as food are free from
disease, and the abstinence from pork, may
produce exemption from scrofula is a question
worth considering. The Jews, however,
whether through secondary agencies or not,
are preserved by Providence from extinction.

THE FIRST REVOLUTION IN VIRGINIA.—
Apropos of centennial celebrations and ac-
counts of early resistance to British tyranny, W.
Noel Sainsbury, who is making an index of Vir-
ginia state papers contained in the Public Re-
cord office of Great Britain, writes to Colonel
McDonald, Secretary of State:
"The contents of this my sixth parcel em-
braces the period between 1625 and 1640, or
the governing portion of King Charles First's
reign—a period of the greatest importance in
Virginia history, and embracing the two dis-
tinct periods of government of Sir John Har-
vey. The hope that the Virginia company
would be restored seems, even as late as 1640,
not to have been quite blotted out of men's
minds, which, perhaps, the names of some of
those on the sub-committee for foreign planta-
tions helped to cherish. The first revolution in
Virginia took place in April, 1635, which re-
sulted in the forcible deposition of Governor
Harvey, the election of John West in his stead
and the sending of Sir John Harvey home to
England, which Captain Matthews hoped
would be acceptable to God, not displeasing to
his Majesty, and an assured happiness to this
colony. The King sent Harvey back to his gov-
ernment the following year. It was only for a
brief period, for the veteran Sir Francis Wyatt
was appointed Governor in January, 1639, for
the second time, after an absence of thirteen
years from the colony.

THERE WAS, it seems, a deep and abiding
religious feeling in the early colonists of Amer-
ica. Some gentle lyric, who has heard the com-
plaint of the religious press that the orators of
the Lexington celebration had not dwelt as they
ought to upon the pious fervor of the colonists,
has, in their aid, raked out of the New York
Weekly Mercury of 1776, a letter from a
Halifax correspondent, who narrated the
treatment received by a person who refused to
pay a debt for which he was attached, because
the writ was not stamped. It was at the time
of the stamp excitement, and the populace
were easily roused to patriotic indignation,
otherwise pious exhortation. Seizing the stamp
demanding sinner, a crowd placed him in their
midst, and then, in the interests of religion
and good morals, passed the following resolu-
tions:
"Vote 1, That this man is not a Christian;
"Vote 2, That he ought to be of some re-
ligion;
"Therefore, thirdly voted, That he be a Jew;
whereupon,
"Resolved, That he be circumcised."
The benighted creature was instantly con-
verted to Christianity, and with the fervor
of the times, waxed strong in king-hatred.
A reverence for the customs of Christianity
and the spirit of '76 never got into a man
to less time or abided longer.—Chicago Times.

A profanation of the marriage ceremony oc-
curred recently in San Francisco at one of the
low variety halls of the city. It was announced
a day or so since that the monotony of the
evening at one of these places would be varied
by a real wedding on the stage, by which the
bride and groom would be united. The ceremony
actually occurred, and at the conclusion of the
ceremony parties were called upon for an exhibi-
tion of skill, which they gave.

Japan has established postal savings banks,
