DEFERRED LOCAL ITEMS.

THE CONCERT.—The following notice of the late concert here is taken from the Washington Republican: "The Sextette of Washington, Mrs. Remington Fairbank, Miss Ida Millard, Miss Sallie Flynn and Messrs. Morsell, Simpson and Keon gave a concert at Sarepta Hall, Alexandria, on Wednesday night, Mr. J. R. Fairbank presiding at the pianoforte. A most appreciative audience, such as seldom gathers in Alexandria, attended, and the concert was quite a success. Miss Ida Millard, Mrs. Fairbank and Mr. Simpson were called to repeat by the enthusiastic applause of the auditors. It is the first time Miss Millard has sung solo in concert, and there was general admiration of her clear, sweet rendering of the "Day is Done." Miss M. was long a resident of Alexandria, and will be yet longer a favorite there."
NEW SLEEPING CAR.—Mr. C. E. Lucas, formerly Superintendent of the Southern Division Pullman Palace Car Company, resigned that position last November, and since that time has been getting up a style of sleeping cars of his own, one of which arrived here yesterday on its way South. It is named the Advance, and is so arranged that in the day time it is a regular passenger car, but in a few moments it can be changed and made a handsome and comfortable sleeper, well ventilated and supplied with every convenience. Three more will follow in a short time, and be placed upon Southern roads.

CHANGED SCHEDULE.—As will be seen by reference to the schedule of the Midland road, elsewhere in to-day's Gazette, the trains for Lynchburg will leave here at 8:25 a. m., and 7 p. m., and for Manassas at 4:45 p. m. Warrenton passengers arrive here on the evening train and leave on the morning and evening trains.

We acknowledge the receipt of an invitation, beautifully engraved, to attend the joint final celebration of the Washington, Philadelphia and Lee Literary Societies of Bethel Academy, on the 16th of June.

RECHABITES.—In the parade of the Rechabites, to take place in Washington on the first proximo, Alexandria will be represented by Virginia Tent.

County Radicals.

On Thursday night the Radicals of Washington District convened in the school house at Hall's Hill.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Vandenburg, who left five persons on the floor to nominate District officers.

Mr. Vandenburg was nominated for Supervisor, and Wm. Geary for Justice of the Peace.

Here the question arose as to whether a man who is not a citizen of the State can hold a State office.

Mr. Cunningham gave his decision to the effect that he could not; however the voters thought it best to test the matter.

Charles Payne and Samuel Titus were also nominated for the position of Justice of the Peace.

It here seemed exceedingly hard to find a person in the District who would accept the nomination for Constable. A number were named but it appeared that none of them could read. After a long and earnest inquiry Wm. Matthews was nominated.

Then came a hard trial to find some one for Overseer of the Poor, and the name of Caleb Birch was finally accepted.

The following named persons were then put in nomination for School Trustees: Lockwood, Cunningham and Castella.

A long talk was then indulged in with reference to the manner in which the present trustees have acted. Much law was discussed, and the power and limits of the Board were defined.

J. A. Seaton remained in his seat and made a speech eulogistic of the acts of the Republicans of Washington Township.

Vandenburg said that there were great irregularities in the accounts of the school funds.

Samuel Smith, Moses Jackson, J. C. Cunningham, Vandenburg and Robert Butcher were nominated as delegates to attend the County Convention on the 24th inst., to nominate candidates for County Clerk, Commonwealth's Attorney, County Treasurer and Commissioner of the Revenue.

C. Castella was nominated for Commissioner of Roads.

During the whole time the six had, from time to time, pleasant chats with reference to the various office holders.

The following persons were then appointed the Magisterial District Committee: Messrs. Vandenburg, Cunningham and Linsky.

The meeting was then addressed by John A. Seaton, who advocated a colored man for the position of County Clerk, in opposition to Mr. Payne, the present incumbent, who, he said, was not a Republican.

R. L. Mitchell then addressed the meeting, after which it adjourned.

How SAM WARD COOKS A HAM.—Mr. Sam. Ward, the prince of congressional lobbyists, has let out one of the secrets of his success in his questionable profession. That secret is his method of cooking a ham. His great weapon for attack upon Congressmen is a good dinner, and his ham is the crowning glory of the feast. And this is how he cooks it: "I soak it four days in water, changing it four times a day; then I boil it five hours in cider, with a wisp of new hay; then I baste it with brandy, sherry, or claret, according to the weather, and when they have tasted a slice of that ham, why they would pass anything I wanted in Congress."

The Lord Mayor of London having accepted the special invitation sent by the Lord Mayor of Dublin and corporation to visit the city and take part in the banquet which will be given to the American riflemen in June next, the visit will be made the occasion of a display of municipal courtesy between the corporations of London and Dublin. His lordship will make the visit in state, accompanied by his sword-bearer, chaplain, and other officers. This is probably the first visit of state paid by the Lord Mayor of London to Dublin within the memory of the present generation.
