GOLD MINING IN VIRGINIA.
BY M. H. STOWE, SUPERINTENDENT OF THE
ELLIS GOLD MINE.
[From the Richmond Whig.]

During the past eight years I have made several hundred assays of gold and other ores of this State, with the view of ascertaining their value, and the processes best adapted to working them successfully, and I propose to give to the public, through the columns of your valuable journal, in a series of papers, some of the results of my experience. I wish, also, to present some facts and suggestions in regard to mining matters, both interesting and important to mine owners and others who feel an interest in the development of the gold fields of the Atlantic slope.

I have often been solicited to give more publicity to my experience in regard to the gold mines of Virginia, but until recently I did not feel quite satisfied to do so, for I had not worked the ores on so large a scale as I had wished. Since the erection of the new ten-stamp mill at the testing of several hundred tons of ore, under my personal superintendence, I can speak more positively on the subject as I am in possession of additional valuable facts.

In the interval above alluded to I visited many of the gold, copper, and other mines of Virginia, and became acquainted with their condition and the processes formerly adopted for the treatment of the ores. I also spent one year in Colorado for the purpose of treating the refractory auriferous sulphurets of that Territory by the chlorination process, in which my operations were very successful on the large scale, the first lot of twenty tons giving 9 1/2 per cent of the fire assay.

While in Colorado, I made a large number of assays of gold, silver, copper and lead ores of that Territory, as well as from Montana, Utah, Nevada, California, Arizona and New Mexico, and I am thus enabled to compare, to some extent, the gold ores west of the Rocky Mountains with those east of the Appalachian chain.

THE VIRGINIA GOLD FIELDS.
It ought to be generally known that Virginia has extensive and varied mineral resources. Her gold fields extend the entire length of the State, having a breadth in some places of forty miles. The general direction of the lodes is nearly or quite parallel to the Blue Ridge, and said to be northeast by southwest 25 degrees. The gold mines are thought by many to be in the mountains, but this is not the case. With a few exceptions, the distance is from forty to sixty miles from the mountains to where any mines have been worked.

The geological formation of the gold fields of this State, so far as ascertained, consists of mica and talcose slates, with contiguous formations of granite, syenite, and steatite. Most of the auriferous lodes in Virginia contain sulphurets of iron and copper, with traces of galena and tellurium inclosed in quartz, the sulphurets of iron predominating largely over the others.

Not all sulphurets of iron and copper contain gold, but there can be no question that we must depend upon these for most of the gold we obtain. These sulphurets are found more abundantly below water level than above. In some gold bearing veins, however, there are scarcely any sulphurets at all, but it is presumed that they will be found at greater depths.

The usual methods of amalgamation do not extract all of the gold contained in these sulphurets, and some other process must be resorted to to obtain it. So far

THE CHLORINATION PROCESS
has proven to be the best for a close and economical examination of the precious metal. I know by many tests what can be done, for I have treated from one ounce to four tons of sulphurets at a time, and I have found that they can be worked on a large scale as successfully as on a small one.

As a supplemental process to amalgamation, I believe it the best that is made public. I will not now describe the two processes in detail, but shall do so in a future paper, only adding that neither one of the processes can be made to do everything in saving gold. Chlorination saves what escapes amalgamation. The latter process saves the coarser particles of gold, while the former saves the finer ores. In fact, the finer the particles of the precious metal the better it is for chlorination.

My experience with the gold ores of the State has proven satisfactorily to my mind: 1st. That where they are abundant they can be made profitable. 2d. That the modern methods of amalgamation for free gold, and chlorination for sulphurets are the most effective and economical. 3d. That the Virginia gold ores yield just as readily to the processes referred to as the ores found west of the Rocky Mountains. As a rule, the ores here are much less refractory than those of Colorado.

These are my conclusions from the large number of tests I have made of Virginia and other ores, and the working test at the Ellis Gold Mine. I also conclude that if mining operations are conducted with the same skill here as in California, the profits from our mines would be as great, in proportion to the outlay.

DEEPER MINING NECESSARY.

To get an abundance of ore we must resort to deeper mining than has hitherto been done. Not many of the mines of this State have gone deeper than 100 feet. At the Eagle Mine, in Stafford county, they have gone 150 feet. From all I can learn this is the greatest depth ever attained in a Virginia gold mine. They generally stop sinking when water is struck, which is about 30 feet from the surface. Had work been stopped on the Comstock lode at a depth of 100 feet the "Big Bonanza" would never have been struck, and the richest mine in the world have been idle, doing no one any good.

The "Big Bonanza" was struck at about 1,400 feet from the surface. In some places it is 250 feet wide, and is very rich. The Consolidated Virginia Mine embraces a part of the bonanza, and is now giving a daily yield of 600 tons of ore, and they are now extracting at the rate of \$150,000 per year, or nearly as much as the whole State of Nevada produced in 1869.

The Hale and Norcross Mine is 2,100 feet deep, the Savage is 2,200, and the Imperial Empire is 2,000. There are other mines on the Comstock lode which range from 1,000 feet to 1,800. At those seemingly great depths the mines are paying better than ever, though

attended with greater expense in hoisting, pumping and timbering.
We can never know the immense wealth of our auriferous lodes here unless we go to a depth of 2,000 feet. We do not know how many

beneath our feet that may rival that one of the Comstock lode. Much, however, may be learned at less depth, and I propose to go down 500 feet at the Ellis Mine within a year. I would be too glad only to get orders from my company to go 1,000 feet.

What we greatly need just now in Virginia is a more general diffusion of proper information in regard to the mineral resources of the State. That "knowledge is power" is a maxim matters just as much as in any other branch of business, the history of the past compels us to admit. In my next paper, to be prepared soon, I will propose a method for a better acquaintance and dissemination of a knowledge of our vast mineral treasures than has hitherto been done, and I believe it will be favorably received.
