LOCAL NEWS.

ROUND HILL CAMP MEETING.—The circle at the Round Hill camp meeting is a large one and elegantly arranged, capable of accommodating 6,000 or 8,000 persons. Some of the most substantial farmers of Loudoun county have tents, and are whole-souled, hospitable gentlemen, extending invitations to many strangers to dine with them, although there are ample accommodations at several large boarding tents. The following are the names of the ministers present: Rev. Nelson Head, presiding elder; S. R. Jones, preacher in charge; J. H. Boyd, associate of the Hillsboro' circuit; Rev. Leonidas Roser, of the Virginia conference; Rev. L. H. Greenhaw, of Hamilton Grove circuit; Rev. J. C. Hamner, of Baltimore, Rev. Mr. Boteler, of Washington, D. C., and Rev. Mr. Waugh of this city. The meeting will close on Friday next.

A FITTED THIEF.—A colored woman named Mary Lee, committed to jail day before yesterday for robbing Daphne Douglas, also colored, was attacked by fits soon after her commitment, and has had one after another with slight intermissions ever since. In one of her most violent spasms, during which she had to be held, her attendants were surprised at the size of her fetter limbs, and upon an examination it was found that large numbers of pieces of children's clothing had been pinned around them. The clothing was new, delicate and costly, and was so effectually concealed that but for the fits it would have remained undiscovered. The clothing she wore was also of the finest material and made in the most elaborate style, and doubtless was also stolen.

A BOAT CASE.—The Washington Republican says a very interesting case touching the law of hiring was heard before Justice William Marston yesterday. It appears that a party of four young men hired a sail-boat from John Decker at the Seventh-street wharf, to go to Marshall Hall, which having done, on their return to Washington they allege that the boat sprang a leak, and they put in to Alexandria, Va. It was shown in evidence that the boat was sound when hired, and that it was left in a very unsafe place at Alexandria, through which it became greatly damaged. The suit is for \$40. The case excited some interest among owners of boats for hire. The decision of the justice was reserved.

POLICE REPORT.—The following cases have been reported at police headquarters since yesterday afternoon: Wm. Lewis Diggs, a colored barber, living near the foundry, for disorderly conduct and abusing his family, was fined and discharged. John Pena, for disorderly conduct at Fish-town, was dismissed upon the payment of costs as the charge was withdrawn by his father, who made the complaint.

THE ATTACHMENTS.—The attachment sued out in the Corporation Court of this city, yesterday, against Ottman's deposits in the Germania Bank and his stock in the Marine Railway, to secure the government, was by Col. M. D. Ball, who was specially employed by the Treasury Department for the purpose. Mr. Hoxie's attachment was served out in the U. S. Court, but Col. Ball's had precedence.

BY TELEGRAPH.

Foreign News. COPENHAGEN, Aug. 11.—Hans Christian Anderson was buried to-day. The King attended the funeral. The whole nation mourns his death, and affecting tributes to his memory have been received from abroad. LONDON, Aug. 11.—The Dundee Relief Committee have given assistance to over 7,000 strikers. The masters and workmen continue firm, and all attempts at compromise have so far failed. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 11.—The Governor of Bosnia was yesterday instructed by telegraph to send all the available troops in that province against the insurgents in Herzegovina immediately. Two battalions have been dispatched from this city to the scene of the insurrection and others will follow.

Losses by the Floods. CINCINNATI, Aug. 11.—The Gazette has received special dispatches from one hundred and forty county seats where the late flood occurred, and the prospects are much better than expected. Wheat and oats have suffered; of the former two-thirds of the crop will be saved, and of the latter less than half can be saved. Of corn there will be more than the average crop owing to the increase of acreage. Potatoes will yield largely, although some few farmers complain of the rot; at most points the yield will be over the average. The hay crop will not fall short of the average in quantity, but the quality is not so good as usual.

The Mississippi. MEMPHIS, Aug. 11.—The situation on the river to-day is very critical. From six o'clock last evening to ten o'clock this morning the river rose over one and a half inches and is now within less than a half of an inch of the spring flood. Between ten and twelve o'clock last night a violent wind and rain storm from the South swept over the city, and this morning another from the northwest crossed the river a few miles below the city.

Death of ex-Governor Graham. SARATOGA, N. Y., Aug. 11.—Ex-Governor William A. Graham, of North Carolina, died of organic disease of the heart at Congress Hall, this morning, at six o'clock. He came here about three weeks since, and had been confined to his room four days.

Probable Murder. NASHUA, N. H., Aug. 11.—R. N. Wallingford, Deputy Sheriff for Hillsborough county, at Milford, was found shot through the side this morning near the fair grounds. The opinions differ as to the cause of his death, but it was probably a murder.

Accident. DENVER, COL., Aug. 11.—By an accident on the Denver and South Park Railroad yesterday, James Smith, a Western Union telegraph repairer, was killed. Mrs. Jno. Lane and daughter of Denver, were fatally injured, and a number of other persons were severely hurt.

Reformed Episcopal Church. NEWBURGH, Aug. 11.—Bishop Cummins at a meeting here on Monday evening preliminary to organizing a Reformed Episcopal Church, said there were now fifty ministers and forty congregations of that church in the U. S. and Canada.

Absconded. NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—A St. Louis dispatch says John A. Joyce, late Internal Revenue agent there, against whom a number of indictments are pending for complicity in the whiskey ring frauds, has absconded. He was under \$15,000 bonds.

Failure. NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—A dispatch dated London to-day says: Shaw & Thompson, largely engaged in the iron trade, have failed. Their liabilities are estimated at £120,000 sterling, while it is not believed that their assets will net more than £50,000 sterling.

Convention. NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—The Republican State Central Committee met this morning in private session at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, Gov. Morgan presiding. After some discussion it was resolved to call a State Convention at Saratoga on the 8th of next month.

Financial. NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—The Post's financial article says: The Stock Exchange markets are, if possible, even less active than yesterday. To-day's steamer take out \$430,000 in specie of which \$350,000, was in gold coin money.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

The Equity Court of Washington has refused the injunction applied for by the Potomac Steamboat Company to restrain the Upper Steamboat Company, which owns the steamer Mary Washington, from building a wharf on the Potomac at the foot of M street, Washington, under an argument of three days, in which the whole river-wharf question was revived.

The row-boat race at Georgetown, yesterday afternoon, was interrupted by the rough water. One of the boats, containing Messrs Blair and Trumbull, was swamped, and its occupants were saved by the Analostan barge. It is thought that had the race been completed, the boat, rowed by Mr. Lamb and Miss Blau, would have won the prize.

Fishtown presented an unusually dull appearance this morning. No watermelons had arrived, and but two or three sturgeon were lying in the fish houses. The single restaurant remaining open there was void of even loungers, and the place wore the aspect of a deserted village.

Frequent complaints have been made lately of the nightly disturbances that occur among the colored people who assemble at the Gate Pump, corner of Washington and Franklin sts., and the police have been directed to pay special attention to that locality, and arrest all those engaged in the disorderly proceedings referred to.

At Williamsport, on Friday last, says the Hagerstown News, the steersman of the canal-boat Exchange, struck a colored man named Dennis Tyler, employed on another boat, a blow on the head with a spreader, inflicting a serious wound. Tyler's assistant was arrested on Friday evening and taken to the Hagerstown jail.

As will be seen by reference to a notice elsewhere in to-day's Gazette, the Conservatives of the city, will meet in their respective Wards on the night of Wednesday, the 25th inst., for the purpose of electing delegates to the Senatorial and County Conventions, to be held here, on the 31st inst.

While the Maryland ferry-boat, Virginia, was lying in her slip, on the opposite side of the river, this morning, the engineer, Capt. Griffin, refused to obey the orders of the Commander, Capt. Smith, and being struck by the latter, mutilated, and attacked the Commander violently.

Rev. Dr. McKim has returned from his visit to the church in New York, to the rectorship of which he has lately been called, and will preach in Christ Church next Sunday as usual. He is as yet undecided with regard to the acceptance of his late call.

The colored Old Fellows of this city, anticipated making an excursion to York, Pennsylvania, yesterday, and collected at the depot in large numbers, and were sadly disappointed at the non-arrival of the train that was to have carried them.

It is understood that a company, composed of business men of Washington city, are negotiating for the purchase of ten acres of the Swallow Hill farm, between this city and Washington, for the purpose of establishing thereon an iron furnace.

It was reported at police headquarters last night that two men were attempting to steal horses from the stable of Mr. F. A. Reid, on Union street, but when Policeman Hepburn reached there, the thieves, if any were at all—had stolen away.

Mr. George E. Price received to-day a fine lot of fish, fresh from the waters of the Chesapeake—including nearly all varieties of salt-water fish, and will have some of them for sale at his beach, in the market, to-morrow.

The only business transacted in the Corporation Court yesterday afternoon, after the closing of the Gazette's report of its proceedings, was the appointment of K. Keuper committee of Daniel Watkins, lately pronounced a lunatic.

Mr. James Byrnes, who lives just beyond West End, shot at two boys, who were robbing his peach trees, last night, and scared them so badly that, in their anxiety to get out of his lot, they knocked down the gate.

The steam canal boat that arrived here this morning was boarded last night, at Georgetown, by unknown thieves and robbed of a gold watch, one hundred dollars in money, and several suits of clothing.

Mr. I. C. O'Neal, late Delegate to the Legislature from this city, has at his disposal a beneficial scholarship in the Medical College of Louisville, Ky.

The tug-boat, W. J. Booth, left here to-day for Crisfield, where she will be employed for sometime in towing the mud screws of a dredging machine at work there.

A called meeting of the Board of Aldermen will be held to-night for the purpose of concurring with the action of the Common Council last night.

Several persons left here to-day for Broad Creek Church, on the opposite side of the river, to attend the Convention now in progress there.

There was another fine shower of rain this morning, and the weather since has been deluged.

Quite a large number of Alexandrians were present at the Schutzenfest, in Washington, last night.
