HERZEGOVINA.

Newspaper readers for the past three weeks have been puzzled by the daily cable dispatches bringing items of news in regard to the insurrection in Herzegovina, and those of them who have not taken the trouble to turn to their gazettes or read up on European history of recent times have probably paid little attention to it. Nevertheless, this revolt in that secluded province of Turkey is of some importance, for it is another outbreak of a spirit which constantly threatens the sovereignty of Turkey, and might, perhaps, bring on a general European war. Herzegovina is the easternmost province of Turkey, and around it are the principalities of which so little is known, and yet which contain a large and active population, and bear so small a share in the politics of Central Europe. The population is largely Christian, and this element is in perpetual insubordination to Turkish domination, manifested by such revolts as the present one, and the fierce contentions between the Turks and Christians that lately occurred in Montenegro. The principalities, by constant fretting against Turkish chains, have secured a partial independence, under, however, a sort of nominal subjection to the Sultan's Porte. The Herzegovinians have now declared for liberty, and the Turkish troops have marched to reduce them to subjection. The sympathy for them that is felt by the Christians of the principalities is shown by the fact that the Montenegrins are crossing the border to assist the insurgents, notwithstanding that the Prince is endeavoring to observe his obligations to Turkey by restraining them.

It is a principle in the politics of Western Europe that the integrity of Turkey must be preserved as a balance of power between the nations. It was this that more than twenty years ago England and France against Russia in the Crimean war. The policy of Russia has always been to make all the trouble with Turkey possible, and the disturbances and revolts in Montenegro and Herzegovina are attributed to Russian machinations, with a view of distracting and weakening the Turkish Empire, and possibly depriving it of two or three more provinces that embrace a considerable proportion of Christians of the Greek Church. Thus it is that there are possibilities of political movements of great importance, or even war in an insurrection on the part of a few thousand men in this isolated bit of the Turkish possessions. We may be sure that in all the Cabinets of Europe the movement is being closely watched, and that the great statesmen and diplomats are consulting eagerly and anxiously over it. Vast results sometimes arise from apparently insignificant causes, and the Herzegovinian affair may prove the truth of the saying, but it is more likely that the Turkish soldiers will bring the revolters back to subjection.—*Baltimore American.*

A GENTLEMAN.

It is almost a definition of a gentleman to say he is one who never injures a pain. This description is both refined and, as far as it goes accurate. He is mainly occupied in merely removing the obstacles which hinder the free and unembarrassed action of those about him; and he concurs with their movements rather than take the initiative himself. His benefits may be considered as parallel to what are called comforts or conveniences in arrangements of a personal nature; like an easy chair or a good fire, which do their part in dispelling cold and fatigue, though nature provides both means of rest and animal heat without them. The true gentleman in like manner carefully avoids whatever may cause a jar or a jolt in the minds of those with whom he is cast; all clashing of opinion, or collision of feeling, all restraint, or suspicion, or gloom, or resentment; his great concern being to make every one else at ease and at home. He has eyes on all his company; he is tender toward the bashful, gentle toward the distant, and merciful toward the absurd; he can recollect to whom he is speaking; he guards against unreasonable allusions or topics which may irritate; he is seldom prominent in conversation, and never worrisome. He makes light of favors while he does them, and seems to be receiving when he is conferring. He never speaks of himself except when compelled; never defends by a mere retort; he has no ears for slander, or gossip; he is scrupulous in imputing motives to those who interfere with him, and interprets everything for the best. He is never mean or little in his disputes; never takes unfair advantage; never mistakes personalities or sharp sayings for arguments, or insinuates evils which he dare not say out. From a long-sighted prudence he observes the maxim of the ancient sage, that we should ever conduct ourselves toward our enemy as if he were one day to be our friend. He has too much good sense to be affronted at insults; he is too well employed to remember injuries, and too indolent to bear malice. He is patient, forbearing and resigned, on philosophical principles; he submits to pain because it is inevitable, to bereavement because it is irreparable, and to death because it is his destiny.—*John Henry Newman.*

A free school system is indispensable to a free country, and should be sustained by an amendment of the law dividing the townships into school districts of proper size and electing three trustees for each district by the patrons of each school, who shall manage the schools without compensation and without county superintendents, saving all the school tax for the benefit of the children.
The commerce of the State should be secured as much as possible to our own cities.
Public and private credit should be sustained as much as possible by law.
Reputation of the State debt has been talked of in some quarters, and should be condemned by every honest man. It would be a crime and curse upon the State from which it would never recover.
Interest on money should be uniform throughout the State, and should be so fixed as to secure the money of the State for the business interests of the State.
The present rate of taxation is ample to carry on the government and pay off the State debt if wisely and economically applied.
