**HAND TO HAND.**  
The Washington correspondent of the Pittsburg Leader says:

A spirited narrative of a duel between two rival lieutenants of the opposite armies during the late war, that has been going the press rounds, brings me to the recollection and recording of a hand to hand encounter that occurred at Warrenton, Va., in the last year of the struggle, between a very near and dear friend of mine and an opponent, in which, by the fate of war and the good luck of my friend, a brave soldier lost his life, coming within an ace of putting out the light of another.  
It was Christmas Eve, 1864, a party of the Black Horse cavalry, of Virginia, were reconnoitering about Warrenton—a pretty little village within forty miles due west of Washington. My friend was, on account of birth and associations, in the Confederate army, and his name to this day is known throughout eastern Virginia as identified with deeds of daring and bravery. This command of Black-horse was composed almost entirely of the young planters and gentlemen of Virginia, men who were born, so to speak, on horseback, and ready to ride to Old Nick at any moment. Indeed, one of the prime causes of the South's holding out was due to the fact that there is a military spirit existent among its people to be found nowhere else. It arose from the indolence of wealth and the indolence of poverty, combined with the sparse population over a large territory, which causes men to be about in open-air pursuits and in all physical operations left on their own self-reliance almost altogether. The same spirit that made the Moss troopers of England and Scotland all that they were in old days was natural among the men of the south and inextinguishable. They were not put to the necessity of indulging in it by new experience. The style of fighting of the Black-horse was very much in the same line as that of the old troopers—of dashes, sallies and forays.

Chasseur, I call him so, for he is a journalist now, and usually writes over that synonyme, was a soldier in the Black-horse. He is a sort of man designed by nature for military life and wears the look of a soldier to his face. Tallish, spare, broad-shouldered, and muscularly wiry rather than athletic, his prominent, clean-cut features, devoid of beard as a woman's, and his long, dark hair, evidence that years of American generations have given the original Scotch source of his blood an Indian tinge, and in him we see, as among the descendants of the first Northern pilgrims, unmistakable proof that the influence of our climate gradually tends to aboriginalize our features.

A body of the Black-horse was sent out to reconnoiter about Warrenton. It was on Christmas eve, and Chasseur, in search of Christmas festivities, had been separated from his party and entered a farm-house on the main road a bit, leaving his horse tied near the fence. He was dressed in Confederate gray, concealed by a large United States army blue ulster, with which a great portion of the Southern cavalry had furnished themselves for the sake of disguise, at times, and principally because they hadn't, for the greater part, any overcoats of their own.

He had not been in the house but a few minutes when one of the young ladies rushed in with terror on her face and curled paper in her hair: "I don't know whether you are North or South," she cried, "but if you are a Confederate for God's sake fly, for a company of Yankees are riding toward the house."

He looked from the window and saw nine blue coats on horses coming by a side cut toward the house. There was no place of concealment in the domestic mansion, so he had nothing to do but to run for it. The woods were about a hundred yards in front of the establishment with two fences intervening. His horse was out of the question, inasmuch as to attempt to get at it was to be shot. So trusting to luck and his legs Chasseur rushed for the woods. The first thing he did was to cross one fence; the second was to fall into a blind ditch, nearly breaking his neck in the last operation, and rising to escape narrowly being shot by the cavalry, who were now about the house, and some of them endeavoring to cover him with their carbines. As he neared the second fence he saw on the other side of it, a piece to his right, one of the Union soldiers on horseback riding to cut him off, either supposing him to be unarmed, and as he was to all appearances, the newcomers having found his pistols and carbine on his horse near the gate, or else moved by the soldierly spirit of letting the best man win, the cavalrymen held back and left the two to settle the subject of capture or escape between themselves. In a moment the rail fence alone separated the two men. The cavalryman steadied his horse, raised his carbine and pointed it toward the Confederate's breast, demanding him to surrender. He was a tall, handsome fellow, with ruddy cheeks and a long, dark mustache, that gave him an air of fierce comeliness that was striking as it was military.

Chasseur gasped out a defiance as he tugged at his revolver at his hip. "Kill the dashed rebel and come along, Rowsey; we've got no time to spare," cried the cavalryman.

The thin lips of the carbine seemed to grow as wide-mouthed as the bore of a cannon as it glared murderously at Chasseur, who just tore out his revolver as the cavalryman pulled the trigger of his weapon. It seemed a century between the crook of his finger and the fall of his hammer. The sky and the winter fields, made dank and oozy by recent rains, appeared rushing together to aid the bullet, and crush out the life of the Virginian, but the same rain that had sponged the ground had dampened the cap of the carbine, and when the hammer fell it was with a clear, spring-like click that told the danger was over.

With one hand reached out on the horse's rein, and his revolver pointed at the Unionist's breast, Chasseur called to him to surrender and dismount or he would fire.

"Fire and—d—d!" shouted the cavalryman, slipping off the horse and grappling at the Confederate.

Several of the cavalrymen were now halted at the further fence with their carbines in their hands but feared to fire, as their comrade was as much a target to their enemy. Chasseur, with touch-and-go for life and death before him, fired. The tall trooper opened and closed

his eyes, blinked once or twice with a blank, strange astonishment on his face, stood stark and straight upright for a few seconds as if irresolute of action, and snook slowly on his knees, then prostrate to the ground. His foe-man sealed the fence, was on his enemy's horse in a moment, and without a hair turned by the bullets of the cavalrymen gained the shelter of the woods.

Awed by the death of their commander, (the fallen man was a non-commissioned officer, and their immediate chief,) and scared by the ruse resorted to by their enemy who lustily rode toward them, calling loud and lustily to the "black horse, here are the enemy, the Charge!" The small band scattered off at a rapid gallop, leaving the body of their comrade and the horse of the confederate behind them.

Chasseur, from the painless manner in which his assailant had fallen and the quiet style in which he lay upon the ground, had not supposed him seriously injured. But when he rode up to him and called on him to rise up, there was no answer. He turned him over and there was the blank, waxen face, the staring eyes, the blanched waxen face, the fallen jaw, and clotted blood that oozed from his arm and left breast proclaimed that his last fight was over and only one other bugle blast would ever awaken him again. The bullet had passed through the biceps of the left arm and pressed through the heart. The suddenness of the shock annihilated all pain in its vivid deadliness.

This party belonged to the main body of Merritt's raid; they had left their command contrary to express orders to remain, and sortied about the country for burning and raiding purposes. But whoever they were, Rowsey—that was the name they called their leader by—was as brave a soldier as ever Pennsylvania sent into the war, and to the Pennsylvania and Illinois troops peculiarly is awarded the palm as due to their displaying a courage superior to all the others by the southern army. It may be that this may meet the attention of some one connected in some way with the deceased. If so I should like to hear from him, as a fine cavalry sabre and spurs belonging to Rowsey are in the possession of his follow-combatant that I would be pleased to have returned to the friends or relations of so gallant, but unfortunate, a soldier.
