Shall Mob-Law Rule in Manassas.
This question has been very pertinently asked by many of our citizens lately, caused by an attempt to intimidate the lawful authorities of the town by indignation meetings, taunts and insults. The most disgraceful part of this programme is that its leader is a minister of the Gospel, Rev. C. King, pastor of the Methodist Church in this place, aided and abetted by a "Christian statesman," Geo. C. Round. At a hearing before the Mayor on last Friday evening, the 10th inst., in a case where a citizen had twice obstructed a street of the town by building fences across it, and had been arrested by order of the Mayor, this minister of the Gospel appeared, and during the hearing of the case acted in such a disorderly manner that he was threatened with removal from the court room by the officer, with others, who, by his manner, had been encouraged to disturb the proceedings. After the case had been disposed of this reverend gentleman left with the court crowd and within a few yards of the court room door stopped and in an excited manner called on those before him to exhibit their commendation and denunciation of the Mayor for his action and decision, and this between the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock at night.

There were probably fifty persons present, two-thirds of whom were colored, upon whom the Rev. Charles King called. The Mayor, passing at the time and believing that the peace was about to be broken, if it was not already, ordered the arrest of Mr. King, which was done, and he was taken back to the court-room. Here he became very violent, and the language used towards the Mayor proved to those present that the preacher was as fully capable of acting the bully as he was of wearing the livery of Heaven. During the hearing of the case Geo. C. Round, who in each case had shown a disposition to give the Mayor all the trouble he could in dispelling of them, although all the time disclaiming to be acting as counsel for the parties, while King was insulting and abusing the Mayor, stated distinctly that he endorsed what Mr. King had done, and that he ordered what he had a right to denounce the Mayor for his decision. Round repeated the same language twice next day in the street to the Mayor, delighting him to arrest him, and calling in a loud voice on citizens of the town to witness what he said. His arrest was ordered and he was fined for disorderly conduct, and by his own request the fine was made sufficiently large that he might appeal to a higher court. The Mayor has been condemned that he did not do his duty and send both King and Round to jail for contempt.

To report such disgraceful proceedings is a very painful duty to us, but, when men in high places step down and lower themselves and the dignity of their calling by open resistance to law, and defy and denounce and in the most villainous manner abuse those whose duty it is to enforce it, they deserve to be exposed.—*Manassas Gazette.*
