Hayti.

The main features of the late revolution in Hayti have heretofore been published in the Gazette. The following amplified particulars were given to the New York Herald by a merchant of that city, who has just returned from Hayti, and was an eye witness to most of the tragedies enacted. He says: For some time past the government was very unpopular with the masses owing to the arbitrary conduct of Vice President Rameau. The President, an old and feeble man, delegated nearly all the power to the Vice President. The latter ruled the people with a rod of iron, and the slightest expression by any of the inhabitants of dissatisfaction was the signal for either imprisonment or death. The dungeons of Port au Prince were full of prisoners who had dared to say something which had displeased Rameau, and executions were of daily occurrence. The debts of the government were also accumulating rapidly, and the people ground down with taxes and levies for money. On Good Friday, April 14, the popular storm commenced to assume formidable proportions. The troops deserted and joined with the populace, and a hasty council of the President, Vice President and officers was held all through the night and the result was that Vice President Rameau was early in the morning procured a schooner and was about transferring the contents of the Treasury on board her to be taken to Gonaives when the storm burst and the whole people flew to arms. Rameau hastily retreated to the palace, where the President also was. By this time even the palace guards had joined the people, and the condition of Domingue and Rameau was very precarious. The American Consul, Mr. Bassett and the British Consul, Major Stewart, were communicated with, and repaired to the palace to try and prevent blood being shed. They clearly demonstrated to the President that his government was at an end and that he should at once take measures to leave the country and conciliate the now furious revolutionists or a massacre would ensue.

At this time, about two o'clock on Saturday afternoon, 15th of April, the revolutionary army, fully 8,000 strong, under command of General Laroque, was about thirty-five miles from Port-au-Prince. The President proposed that the American and British Consuls should go and the American and British Consuls should go and propose an armistice of twenty-four hours and that he would resign at the end of that time. They carried the proposal to General Laroque and he agreed to the armistice. He then left his army where it was, with orders to come on by easy marches, and with two of his officers, rode rapidly to Port-au-Prince. He arrived in the city early on Sunday morning and found the mob perfectly wild and furious. Everything was confusion and there was no one to restrain the blood-thirsty passions of the people, now thoroughly aroused. They charged General Laroque with having designs on the Presidency himself, and with a fierce yell of rage and with all the frenzy which actuated the Communists to such deeds of violence and blood in Paris they surrounded his house. The doors were soon battered in and a search made for the General. They discovered him hid away in a closet, and in a few moments he was a corpse. They flung his body into the streets and danced over it and most barbarously mutilated it.

General Laroque did not sell his life dearly, as he had only a single barreled pistol, with which he killed one of his assassins, but the French Consul saw that the French Consul reasoned with the mob and quieted them a little. Then the two Consuls went to the palace and offered President Domingue and his wife and Vice President Rameau and his wife the protection of the Consulate building. The government willingly accepted the proffered assistance, and the whole party with the French Consul on one side and the Spanish Consul on the other, started to walk to the French Consulate. The revolutionists met them in the streets and followed them, their passions every moment waxing fiercer. Suddenly they became unmanageable, and the son of Monsieur Pierre, rushing up to Vice President Rameau, shot him dead on the spot.

Fortunately for the party they were near the Consulate and were soon within its friendly shelter. Several other shots were fired by the mob at them, and President Domingue received a terrible wound in the thigh, which may terminate fatally, as he is an old and feeble man. The body of the Vice President was kicked about the streets of the city for two days and mutilated beyond all recognition, after which it was thrown into a hole outside the city and covered up with stones. All the other Ministers of the government, or any one who held office under Domingue, took refuge speedily in the Consulate buildings, and were left unmolested. After being two days guarded in the French Consulate the deposed President got on a schooner, and was taken to St. Thomas, where he now is. A military provisional committee was then organized, with General Canal at its head, and partial order was restored. The popular vengeance appeared to be satisfied by the assassination of the Vice President and General Laroque and the flight of President Domingue.
