LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—War Department Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, D. C., May 10, 1876.—10:30 a. m.—In the Middle States high followed by falling barometer, winds backing to southwest and southeast, slowly rising temperature, clear or cloudy weather.

COLUMBIA S. F. E. Co.—A regular meeting of the Columbia Steam Fire Engine Company was held last night, D. A. Windsor, esq., president, in the chair.

In the absence of the secretary Mr. Thomas Leadwater was chosen secretary pro tem. The resignation of Mr. R. W. Wheat as recording secretary of the company was received and unanimously laid upon the table.

(On motion, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted: Resolved The Columbia S. F. E. Co. fully appreciate the valuable services rendered by Mr. E. S. Leadwater as Chief Engineer of the Fire Department during the past five years, and feeling sure that his place cannot well be supplied by any other, does earnestly request that gentleman to allow his name to be used as a candidate for re-election to his office, either before the people or the City Council, as the case may be.

Resolved That these resolutions be published in the city papers, and a copy of the same be forwarded to Mr. Leadwater.

The meeting then adjourned.

EPISCOPAL COUNCIL.—The approaching Diocesan Council will probably be the largest ever held in the diocese. Last Friday two hundred and sixty-eight names had been sent in, with more to be heard from. But as the Southern Churchmen says there will be room for all and a hearty welcome to all. All delegates have been notified where they are to remain until Alexandria; it will be impossible for the committee to meet them on their arrival, as trains and boats come into Alexandria every half hour. Should there be any difficulty, however, let the delegates enter the Masonic House coach, drive there, and report to Major Green. The following delegates have been elected from Richmond: Peter C. Warwick, A. Y. Stokes, Major John H. Claiborne, E. B. Addison, James Shields, John L. Williams, Mr. Poindexter and Don P. Halsey.

THE NEW ARROW.—Commodore Frank Hulings announces the resumption of her Mount Vernon daily trips by the steamer Arrow, which has just returned from Baltimore vastly improved in everything but her name. The latter was not considered susceptible of improvement. The Arrow has been practically rebuilt and entirely refurnished, regardless of expense, and now appears in her gay Centennial costume. When it is added that the Commodore will personally tread her deck in command as of yore, aided and assisted in the entertainment of his guests by Captain Blake, the legion of sight-seers and pleasure-hunters will hesitate long before they pass the Arrow by for other means transportation down the Potomac to the "American Mecca."—Washington Republican.

FISH REPORT.—The receipts at Fishtown continue to decrease, and it is feared that the run of fish is nearly over. Under the influence of the small receipts prices of all kinds of fish remain high. Since yesterday's report there have been received 5,000 shad, 120,000 herrings and a number of turbot. Shad sold from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per hundred, herrings from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per thousand, and turbot \$1.50 a piece.

The Port Tobacco Independent, says: We understand that for the past few days the upper fisheries have been doing much better in the catch of herring, but shad are remarkably scarce. At Chappaman's, on Monday, the day's catch amounted to over one hundred thousand herring, which were sold at \$10 per thousand.

BASE BALL.—The base ball season is now fairly opened and nearly every day there are matches between some of the various clubs in the city or vicinity. There are several clubs among the young men of the city, besides the school clubs at the Episcopal High School and at St. John's Academy. Yesterday afternoon a number of persons went out to Seminary Hill to witness a match game between the High School Club and the Social Club of Georgetown, but, after playing three innings, the pitcher of the Socials was so badly disabled, by being struck with the ball, that the game had to be discontinued. Another game between the Independents of this city and the High School Club will take place on the grounds of the latter, next Wednesday.

CAUCUS.—A caucus of some twenty-five or thirty persons was held last night at the residence of one of the prominent candidates, for the purpose of organizing what is termed a "People's or Independent" party. It was determined to nominate a committee to the Conservative Committee, at their meeting, to-night, to allow all persons to vote at the primary election for a portion of the officers, provided such voters pledge themselves to support the nominees of the Conservative party for those officers alone, leaving them free to vote as they pleased for all the rest of the officers. The proposed "People's Ticket" has not yet been perfected, but, it is understood, that it will be presented in a few days.

FALLS CHURCH.—At the celebration of the Union Sunday-school at Falls Church, last Sunday, a large audience, from the surrounding country, and from Washington and this city, was present. The singing was under the leadership of Mr. E. D. Harrington, with Miss Grace Hogan as organist. Mr. Merrifield gave an account of the school during the last year, and Mr. Ferry, acting Vice President of the United States, delivered an interesting address. Prof. Chickering, R. V. Boyer, formerly of this city, and Rev. Mr. Odell also delivered addresses.

DISORDERLY.—Considerable disturbance was created on Vinegar Hill this morning by a party of drunken negro fishermen, from Capt. Jerry Ruff's fishing shore, at Sandy Bay. They were very noisy and disorderly, and upon the police being sent for, had to Fishtown. They took off in a run across the lake back of the W. & O. depot, but were finally overtaken by the officers and brought to the station house, where the Mayor filed each of them and sent them on board a vessel, bound for their fishing shore.

POLICE REPORT.—Since last report the following cases have been tried: Cephas Thompson, Oscar Bennett, Howard Jones, John Mas and George Stewart, all colored, for being drunk and disorderly on the street, were fined and discharged.

George Swansbury, drunk on the street, was locked up for examination.

Three lodgers were accommodated at the station house last night.

REVIVAL.—Rev. Mr. Waugh, of the M. E. Church, South, preached at the revival services in the M. E. Church last night. Rev. Mr. Diwidie also took part in the services. A large congregation was present, and much interest was manifested, several persons asking for prayers. The services will be continued to-night, when Rev. W. C. Webb will preach. Service will commence at 8 o'clock, sharp.

CIRCUIT COURTS.—The Circuit Court for Alexandria county, Judge James Keith to preside, will commence at the old Court House next Monday. The Circuit Court for the city, to be held by the same Judge, will commence on Monday, the 22d inst.

CANDIDATES MEETING.—The Conservative Committee will hold a meeting at the office of the late Board of Public Works to-night, when they will meet all the candidates who propose to run at the coming primary election. The object of this meeting is to make the necessary arrangements for conducting that election.

EXCURSION PARTY.—Quite a large party of ladies and gentlemen, under the lead of Messrs R. C. Lee and J. H. F. Wile, made an excursion to Mar-hall Hall to-day on the steam tug Comet. They were accompanied by a portion of the Alexandria band, and proposed to spend the day in dancing and fishing.

HEALTH REGULATIONS. At a meeting of the Board of Health, held at the Auditor's office, on Monday evening, May 8th, it was resolved to call the attention of the citizens to the fact that both owners and occupants of houses are liable to fine for permitting or committing nuisances upon their premises. The following sections of the law are published for the information of all concerned: "Section 4. Every owner or occupier of a lot on which any necessary nois or shall be hereafter erected shall constantly keep such necessary in good order, and not suffer it to become a nuisance, under a penalty of one dollar for every day that shall remain in that state after notice in writing and reasonable time for remedy be given by the Superintendent of Police."

"Section 7. No person or persons shall discharge, cast or cause to flow into or upon any of the streets, lanes or alleys or other parts of the city any kitchen offal (liquid or solid) but shall deposit the same in some suitable vessel, there to be kept up till called for and removed in the manner hereinafter provided. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Poor to cause all such offal to be called for, collected and removed four times a week in the months of May, June, July, August and September, and twice a week during the remainder of the year for the use and benefit of the Alms House. Any person or persons, his or their servant, who shall neglect or refuse to comply with this section shall be fined and pay not less than one nor more than five (5) dollars, to be recovered as other fines and forfeitures are now recovered. It shall be the duty of the Board of Health, Superintendent of Police and Police Constables to cause the provisions of this section to be strictly complied with and enforced."

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 11, 1876.—The investigation into the six y-four thousand dollar railroad bond affair, in which Mr. Blaine is accused of being implicated, will be commenced before a sub-committee of the House Judiciary Committee early next week. Gen. Hunt, of Virginia, is chairman of the sub-committee, and will conduct the examination.

A good deal of merriment has been caused here by the announcement that after his address at the opening of the Centennial, yesterday, Gen. Grant was so "fatigued" that he could not hold a reception. Some people can bottle up their fatigue on such occasions.

Visitors to Philadelphia who have returned to this city, report a great crowd at the Centennial grounds, yesterday, but that seeing any thing but the crowd, or hearing anything but the "buzz," was impossible. So far as the crowd is concerned the opening was a success—otherwise not. The buildings are not complete, the articles for exhibition not in place, and a month hence much more pleasure and profit can be derived from a visit.

Several parties from Alexandria, taking advantage of the delightful weather, are here to-day sight seeing.

Congress reassembles to-morrow, but it is not likely that anything of interest will be done before Monday. In the House it will be private bill day, but unless there is a larger attendance than is anticipated, but few bills will pass.

The hall of the House is in a perturbed condition, and unless the repairs in progress are pushed faster than they are being, it is doubtful whether they will be completed in time for a session to-morrow, in which event an adjournment until Monday will have to take place.

Parties lately arriving here from Richmond give rather discouraging accounts of the political situation in that city, and report a good deal of dissatisfaction among the Conservatives, especially with reference to the late nominations for city officers. Mr. Carrington, the nominee for Mayor, will, it is thought, have serious opposition. A majority of the delegates elected to the State Convention in Richmond favor the election of Gen. Bradley T. Johnson to the St. Louis Convention.

The few politicians now in the city are much divided in sentiment in reference to the nominee of the Democratic party for President, but the names most prominent are Tilden and Hendricks.

Foreign News.

LONDON, May 11.—2 p. m.—The Straps with the Prince of Wales on board together with the Royal Yacht Osborne and the steam frigate Raleigh, passed Hurst Castle at 11:50 o'clock this morning. The yacht Alberca, on board of which was the Princess of Wales and the Royal children, met the Prince in the Solent and all the vessels proceeded to Portsmouth where a landing will be effected and a public reception tendered to the Prince.

LONDON, May 11.—The daily Telegraph in an editorial, says: "If we are not mistaken, the English Ambassador at Constantinople has informed the Government that the situation is becoming a violent outbreak of which Christians will become the victims, may occur at any moment throughout Turkey and even in Constantinople. We would not be surprised therefore, if the English Mediterranean squadron were ordered immediately to Bes kir Bay at the mouth of the Hellespont the same as on the eve of the Crimean war. A special dispatch to the Post from Berlin, says: It is understood that Count Andrassy, the Austrian Premier, has expressed views strongly adverse to Austrian armed intervention in the Turkish complications.

LONDON, May 11.—Lord Derby sent on Saturday last, an answer to Secretary Fish's letter of March 31, in regard to the Winslow case.

LONDON, May 11.—The Post says that Prince Alexander Auerberg and Count Leopold Kalour, fought a duel at Prague on Friday last. The Prince was shot in the chest, and his wound is considered dangerous.

PARIS, May 11.—M. DeMaity, Radical, has been elected Deputy from Ule de la Reunion. At the opening of yesterday's session of the Chamber of Deputies, a Versailles bookseller named Rastoum cried out from the gallery: "In the name of God and John of Arc, let us let the fourth, down with the Gambettists and Orleansists." He was arrested amid considerable confusion, the majority, however, consider the episode as a freak of insanity. On appearing before the Questor Rastoum said "I have fulfilled my duty; you can do what you like with me." He was released.

General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 11.—Bishop Haven presided at the opening of the Conference this morning. Bishop Harris announced the committee on the John Street Church, New York, and to nominate trustees to fill vacancies in the Board of Trustees of the M. E. Church, E. O. Haven, of the committee to which was referred the report of the bishop's pastoral address, approving the address, and recommending that it be read in the churches on Sunday, July 23. The report was received and ordered to be printed in the Daily Christian Advocate.

The Molly Maguire Trials.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., May 11.—The Court-house continues the centre of attraction, and is, this morning, thronged with people anxious to hear the evidence in the Molly Maguire trial. This morning McCannon, a police officer, who was on duty with Yost, when the latter was shot, testified in regard to the immediate pursuit of the murderers in the dark. The Court announced that it had decided to hold the sessions from 7 to 12 o'clock, then take a recess for an hour, meeting again from 1 to 6 for the purpose of proceeding with the trial of Monley and McAlister, charged with the murder of Wren and Sanger. A jury will be empanelled during the recess.

Centennial Notes.

PHILADELPHIA, May 11.—The attendance at the exhibition to-day is estimated at from 25,000 to 30,000 up to one o'clock. Many of the distinguished guests who were at the opening yesterday are visiting the exhibition to-day. Several foreign ministers, including those of England and Chili, are now on the grounds, and there are many Congressmen, army and navy officers, and nearly all the State Governors and other dignitaries who attended yesterday. The weather is delightful with the exception of a high wind, which raises a great deal of dust.

Political.

DES MOINES, IOWA, May 11.—The State Greenback Convention met here yesterday there were thirty-five delegates present. The usual greenback platform was adopted, and delegates were elected to the National Convention at Indianapolis. Resolutions were adopted directing the new State Convention to call another State Convention, not later than the 15th of August, to nominate a State ticket.

The Chinese.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—A dispatch from Victoria, B. C., says a resolution passed the house without debate declaring it expedient that the government take steps to prevent the province from being overrun by Chinese to the injury of the white population.
