**AN ANXIOUS DEMOCRATIC SPECTATOR.**  
Among the distant observers of the proceedings at Cincinnati there is none, except the Republican candidates themselves, who take so keen an interest in the result as Governor Tilden. What is done at Cincinnati will be the making or the marionette of his political fortunes. His hopes will rise and sink with the prospects of Mr. Blaine. Blaine's nomination would both insure his own and make it equivalent to an election. No other Republican candidate could bring Tilden's peculiar strength into such bold relief, for against Blaine the whole Democratic canvass from beginning to end would be concentrated on the reform issue, which is precisely where it is Governor Tilden's interest, as it has been his constant aim, to place it. Blaine's ugly letters would necessarily be the principal campaign documents on the Democratic side, and a Reform candidate would have to take to drive them home. Against such an opponent Tilden would carry New York by seventy thousand majority, and the party that wins New York will make a sure thing of the Presidency, as everybody concedes the strongest combination for beating Tilden is cooking for the first place on the Republican ticket, with a popular Western man for the Vice Presidency.—*N. Y. Herald*

**THRILLING SCENE AT BELMONT DRIVING PARK.**—The programme arranged for Reickner's California troupe yesterday afternoon was entirely different from that of the previous day. All the scenes on the avenue were entirely thrilling, and that of the hurdle races particularly so. In this five young ladies, Miss Annie Rich and the four Misses Cook—Julie, Belle, Mabel and Nellie—entered, and in dashing over the track the mustangs cleared the hurdle in fine style, but two of the animals got beyond the control of the equestriennes, and kept on an increased speed, running at the rate of one mile in 1.55. Miss Mabel Cook was thrown to the track, where she remained for some time, apparently unconscious. Miss Annie Rich succeeded in keeping herself on the mustang, but it was evident she could not control the animal. She was thrown to the track in front of the grand stand, but escaped serious injury. The scene of excitement which attended this thrilling event cannot be described. The two young ladies in a short time were assisted into a carriage and driven to the foot of the grand stand, where they gratefully acknowledged the plaudits of the audience.—*Philadelphia Record*

The Philadelphia Ledger remarks that the Exhibition, so far from increasing food prices in Philadelphia, has actually had the effect, by attracting larger supplies, of reducing them. The Commercial List gives a comparison of wholesale prices for some staple articles now compared with the quotations at the close of May last year, which shows the market decline. New York or Bradford county butter then was quoted at 29 and 31 cents a pound; now the figures range from 23 to 28 cents. Good quality Pennsylvania eggs, by the barrel, then brought 17 and 18 cents a dozen; now the rate is 12 and 13. Spring chickens, then 35 and 40 cents a pound, are now quoted at 19 and 20 cents.

**THE ESCAPED FENIANS—THE PURSUIT RAFFLED.**—A Sydney letter, dated the 4th ult., to the Alta California, professes to give the result of the pursuit after the Fenians who escaped on board an American whaler—a piece of intelligence which is lacking in the cable advices thus far received. The letter says: "An American whaler has rescued a gang of ten prisoners from Western Australia. The Colonial Government steamer Georgette, usually employed in carrying the mails to King George's Sound, was armed and dispatched after the vessel, and fell in with her. The captain of the whaler threatened to resist any attempt to board his ship, as the Georgette was not commissioned as a ship of war, and the Georgette returned to port without achieving the object of the expedition."

The new Sultan was married a few years ago to a beautiful Circassian slave, who was purchased for the sum of \$12,000. She was taken to Constantinople at a very early age, and was taught all the accomplishments that could be acquired in that metropolis. When she arrived at marriageable age she was reckoned to be the most beautiful and elegant lady in the Turkish empire. This lady has borne Mehmet Murad several children, and it is said that he has devoted much care and attention to their education. He is said not to be a fanatic, but rather disposed to be liberal in his views.

**THE SEASON AND THE CROPS.**—Our country friends are enthusiastic over the beauty of the growing crops. The weather is just what is required to develop in the fullest degree all growing things, the wheat, corn, grass and fruit. There are few bad fields of wheat, and never before was generally profuse of a better crop. It stands evenly and beautifully on the ground, and almost without a blemish. The corn is also making wonderful progress, and there has been very little replanting. The young clover, which has failed for years, forms a perfect matting on the ground. Upon the whole the season is an exceptionally fine one.—*Winchester Times*
