Railroads and Their Troubles.

When the Atlantic, Mississippi and Ohio road was placed in the hands of receivers we felt assured that only the beginning of the end had been seen, and so we were prepared to credit the recent rumor of proceedings against the Orange road which afterwards proved untrue. We were thus inclined because it was understood that the preliminary measures for such a proceeding were taken some time since and the act was only instituted for fear of its influence upon the public mind until General Mahone could be ousted from his position.

Now the time has come and the proceedings have been instituted against the Washington City, Virginia Midland and Great Southern Railroad Company, looking to the appointment of receivers, and a subsequent foreclosure. It is also said that similar proceedings are to be taken against another Virginia railroad, whose financial embarrassment has been long known.

As to the name of this latter road we have our surmises, but prefer to withhold them since the expression of such a suspicion would be a grievous wrong. Anyhow, two Virginia Railroad Presidents are to walk the plank, for Judge Bond does not allow such men to be receivers under his court; nor would their retention in power suit the plans of the two great powers, who are about to divide between themselves the spoils of our Virginia railroads. The efforts of Scott and Garrett for the past ten years, are reaching fruition, and the public will see that the fruition comprehends what we have often foretold, the complete submission of our railroads to the schemes and plans of these two magnates.

With Mahone out of the way, as they firmly hope, the only obstacle has been removed from their pathway and disguise is no longer necessary. We predict, as likely to happen this winter, that Barbour's road will formerly pass to the Baltimore & Ohio Company, that the Danville road will be opened, operated, as it is now owned, by the Pennsylvania Company, and that a charter for a competing road from Quantico to Richmond, thus bridging the State, will be asked for and most probably granted. Meanwhile attempts will be made to force a sale of the A. M. & O. Road, the Virginia and Tennessee Division of which will in that event, fall into Garrett's hands and then Scott will build the Valley road, which he has recently leased down to Salem. In that event it will be found that not Richmond only, but Lynchburg, Petersburg and Norfolk as well, will be "pretermitted with respect to railroads."

"THE 'REBELS' DID IT ALL."—Many comic things occur at a nominating convention, but probably nothing so comic occurred at Cincinnati as the uproarious applause which greeted Senator Logan's announcement that the late exposures of corruption at Washington were the commencement of a "revolution" by the ex rebels, consisting in "the assassination of the private character of every leading republican to the land." We noticed that Mr. Blaine was disposed to take the same view of the matter in his discourse in the House of Representatives, and seemed to maintain that the presence of "two rebel Generals" on the sub-committee had some mysterious connection with the existence of his own letters to Mr. Fisher and with his operations in Little Rock and Fort Smith and Northern Pacific stock and bonds. Now, all this may be most excellent fooling, but it is still fooling. The people of the United States may be occasionally simple-minded, but they are not idiots, and it would take an enormous amount of eloquence to persuade them that it was the "rebels" who got Mr. Blaine into his railroad operations, or Mr. Belmont into his post-trader business, or Mr. Robeson into his Cattell relations, or Babcock into his Sanborn business, or McDougal in office, or hired Jayne. The "rebels" must laugh comically when they hear that they are at the bottom of the various "investments" of our leading statesmen.—*The Nation.*

Senators have their little idiosyncrasies like other mortals. A Washington correspondent says that Senator Thurman uses a red baadana handkerchief, and blows the loudest nose in America. On one occasion Senator Jones, of Nevada, who early in life had been brakeman on a railroad, dropped to sleep at his desk. Senator Thurman, whose seat is near the bonanza statesman, solemnly waved his baadana and gave his nose a terrible snort. The sleeping Senator sprang to his feet and seizing his desk began twisting it with all his might. He afterward explained that he thought Thurman's blow was the engine whistling "down brakes," and the red handkerchief a signal of distress, hence his wrenching of the desk.—*Washington Telegram.*

The Emperor of Brazil furnishes an example of energy and industry which some of the young gentlemen of our acquaintance would do well to follow. On Saturday he visited the Key stone forge, in Philadelphia, and taking of his coat, rolled up his sleeves and started the machinery.
