WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—War Department, Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, D. C., July 29, 1876.—10:30 a. m.—For the Middle States clear or fair weather during the day, with slight chances to temperature and barometer, and light southerly to westerly winds, followed to night by light rains in the Southern portion.

THE ORKNEY CENTENNIAL.—The proprietors of the Virginia Hotel at Orkney Springs this week gave their guests a series of diversions, or "centennial carnival and mischiefs," consisting of a medley of entertainments, including tableaux, tournaments, fireworks and a full dress ball, beginning on Tuesday and ending on Wednesday night.

THE GLYMONT MURDER.—The Port Tobacco Times, in publishing the offer of an additional reward for the detection of the negroes supposed to have murdered young Everett at Glymont, says: "It will be observed that the reward offered through Mr. Waring is not in the usual terms, for the arrest and conviction of the murderers, but is for the 'arrest and identification' of the two suspected tramps. So firm is the belief that the crime was committed by these men, that the people of the neighborhood are willing to pay \$250 for their arrest alone. We hope all this will have the effect of stimulating exertions, for if these men do thus perpetrate so foul a murder and escape with their spoils, it will but be an invitation for its repetition."

Her mother and two young brothers, who reside in New York, and a number of ladies and gentlemen were present. The name in religion of Miss Barry is Sister Mary Louis Gonzaga.

THE JEFFERSON BORDEN.—Among the arrivals of vessels here to-day was that of the schooner J. H. Borden, which attained considerable notoriety some months since, by the mutiny which occurred on board of her, involving the death of the two mates, and causing the captain and two men to navigate the vessel unaided for seven or eight days. The J. H. Borden is a fine-looking vessel of about 1100 tons, and is one of the largest trading in this port.

From Washington. SENATE. WASHINGTON, July 29, 1876.—The Senate was not in session to-day.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. In the House to-day, nothing of very special interest has been done.

The Senate bill providing for an extension of the time for the redemption of bonds held by the Government for direct taxes, until February, 1877, was passed.

The report of the naval investigating committee was then taken up and Mr. Danford (rad.) of Ohio, defended the Department.

He was followed by Mr. Garfield on the same side. Mr. Mills of Texas and others spoke in condemnation of the conduct of the Department.

French radicals. PARIS, July 29.—The French radical republican press have lately made a great attack upon the heads of the Jesuit College, alleging that they had fraudulently forwarded the students concerning the subjects of examination at the Polytechnic, hence the liberal suit which day before yesterday was decided in favor of M. Dupac the director of the college, and fifty five students. The affair has caused great excitement and has been the subject of parliamentary inquiry.
