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Signal for Tilden.
The publication of a letter in yesterday morning's Herald signed by Gen. Franz Sigel, in which he indicated very clearly and very positively that he would support Samuel J. Tilden for the Presidency, caused a tremendous sensation throughout the city, and more particularly among the Germans, who with our American-born citizens, have looked upon the distinguished artilleryman as the very Cypriote of republicanism. Many of our most influential German citizens, however, did not hesitate in a hearty manner when spoken to to endorse the views set forth by Gen. Sigel in his now famous letter.

The Herald reporter having found Gen. Sigel, that gentleman, in his usual matter of fact and quiet manner, proceeded to state his views on the cause of his departure from the republicanism fold.

"I asked you, Gen. Sigel, to ascertain the reason why you have written the letter stating that you will support Mr. Tilden for the Presidency, and why you are to abide by the platform of the Democratic Convention at St. Louis?"

Gen. Sigel—"It is not a personal matter; it is a political matter. I have no ill feeling against the members of the republican party, because I have been very well treated by them since the war. But I think that this is another reform movement, as there was one like it in 1871, in which Gov. Tilden was instrumental in bringing about the reversion of public opinion, which in its turn brought about the downfall of Tweed and his followers—not Tweed and his party, for he had no party or principles, but merely a lot of ruffians who followed him for chieftain. These men Gov. Tilden was instrumental in putting down. I think the financial policy of the administration for years has been a policy of vampirism, to draw from the blood of the people as much money as could be gotten possibly. While it is true that we have paid of \$700,000,000 of the public debt of \$1,200,000,000, which leaves a debt of \$500,000,000. I think if you pay off \$700,000,000 and contract a debt of \$1,200,000,000 that it is not progress, but, instead of that, it is a step backward."

"Well, General, do you think that there will be a change in the administration at this election?"

Gen. Sigel—"I think that the business interests of the country demand a change, as is indicated by the letter of Tilden, and a change in the policy of the general government in the treatment of the South, which of course would, or will, have an influence on the financial condition of the whole country. The responsibility for the good conduct of the Southern people must be thrown on the Southern States themselves, and I have no doubt that they will get along better alone than under the guardianship of the general government, because in the natural condition of things they have more interest in the colored people than we have. And this is because they are compelled to live with them, and the future of the South, its welfare and its prosperity, depend just as much on the colored people as those essential to do on the whites themselves. This does not interfere with their affairs, and in particular in regard to the colored people, must naturally irritate the white people and create artificial antagonism between the two races which should not exist, and which could not probably exist if it were not for that interference."

General, I want to ask you what is your opinion as to the action the German people in the United States will take in the coming canvass?"

Gen. Sigel [very slowly and very positively]—"I believe that the majority of the German people of America will favor the election of Governor Tilden to the Presidency, not because they know much of Governor Tilden or his interests or policy, but because they are determined to have a change of administration. The German citizens in the United States have always been democrats by instinct, but they have acted as republicans because they hated slavery. They are not prohibitionists or protectionists. I, of course, mean prohibition in a commercial sense. Neither are they absolutely in favor of free trade, because that is impossible under present circumstances, but they are for a reduction of the great number of articles now paying duty, and for a greater equalization in the duties on different articles, because prohibition of this kind produces monopolies. The Germans also do not believe in our system of internal taxation, because it throws the bulk of the taxes on a few branches of business and makes taxes thus specific exorbitant. This seems to the Germans very unjust and even outrageous."

"General," asked the reporter, "what is the number of German voters in the United States, as near as you can estimate?"

"I think," said the old veteran, as if calculating, "about 550,000 to 600,000. This is about the number of those who are of the German speaking race, of German parents and who in view of their own German aims or German prohibitions, and I think the majority of these voters will be thrown for Tilden. Of course the number might be increased by those who would come naturally in contact with the Germans or who might be influenced by them in their business. The Germans are a very peculiar kind of people, you must recollect; if they have an opinion they go for it. As to Carl Schurz, I can't say what his following will be. I know that the German people make up their minds, as they will in this contest, they will follow their own opinions and not the opinions or professions of their leaders. Further more, the Germans always follow their own interests—I mean their material interests—and I know that they are very skeptical as to politics and politicians. They do not think politicians to be true worthy, as I understand them. There are many leading Germans, who have declared for Tilden, Frederick Hauserok, in the West, is a man of very great talents. He is not known so much in the East. Hauserok was a warm supporter of Abraham Lincoln when he ran for the Presidency. Hauserok is ardent in his support of Mr. Tilden. Ex-Governor Kuerer, of Illinois, was for Lincoln warmly. He is now for Tilden. He was formerly also on Fremont's staff. Judge Stallo, of Cincinnati, one of the most honest of men, was for Lincoln. He is a man of powerful influence. Judge Stallo is now for Tilden. Ruemele, of

Olio, is also a man of great influence, and he is now supporting Tilden among our German people. Again I assert that the German people want a revival of trade, they want peace, they want a change, they don't trust this administration, and this thing has to be ended—this system of keeping up antagonisms between the two races, black and white, in the South. It must be ended once for all in this coming election."

"Do you think, General Sigel, that the country will be safe in the hands of Governor Tilden if he should be elected President of the United States?"

General Sigel—"Why, certainly. There are objections made by a great many good and well-meaning men to Governor Tilden's election, with the idea that there would be a danger to the nation in the concentration of so much of the nation's power in the hands of the chief of the democratic party. Well, are not the army and navy loyal, and the United States judiciary down South appointed for life or during good behavior, and are they not loyal to the government? I should think that they were, and I think that the army and navy is much more loyal now to the government than it was previous to the war. And then certain people are afraid that disturbances would arise in the Southern States after the election of Mr. Tilden. I do not believe that Mr. Tilden would permit such disturbances, and if he did they would be put down. It will be in the interest of a democratic government, with Governor Tilden at its head, to avoid and prevent all such causes of discontent, because, in case of any really serious trouble at the South, and any neglect in the administration of the government to crush such disturbances, and a rebellion were threatened, the American people would risk like one man and meet the danger. I myself would exist as a volunteer again, if God so willed, before there is no such thing as a president, with Governor Tilden as President. The people, the army and navy and the judiciary are loyal, and these are guarantees enough for safety.—New York Herald.
