Warrenton.
Warrenton is the same old village of great expectations unrealized that it always was, and stands precisely where it stood fifty years ago, and so will continue to stand until, Enoch-like, on account of the virtue of its inhabitants, it is raised bodily to heaven as a substitute for material decay and death. It stands where it stood, and it stands it well and patiently.

Warrenton is much like the word of God, neither time nor years change it—neither does the art of man improve it. As it was in the beginning, it is now and ever shall be. Except in this essential, however incidental, it is not all divine nor a paraker of divinity.
I was in hopes that the air from the mountains would clean out a touch of hay-fever that was choking me up, but was disappointed. The mountain air must have taken an early train for Italy, for the same untrammeled play of abundant atmosphere, well warmed up, found over among the hills of Virginia that I left behind down among the dusty distances of Washington.

The ride over the Virginia Midland road is pleasant and clean, the route running through delightful scenery for those fond of the flat school of landscape architecture. The cars are the most comfortable in the world.
The busy metropolis of Alexandria was in an aggravated state of excitement over an unprecedented and wonderful event. My fellow traveler, Aleck Hunter, had shot an ancient setter dog a few days before and advertised for another and younger animal. At every street corner of the beautiful suburb the visitor met with the mournful cadences from the lips of the melancholy inhabitants, "Aleck has shot his dog." The entire city experienced a personal loss in the death of the canine, and while he lay waiting away on the zephyrs to the land that is fairer than day, old people who had known him in childhood, who had been to caress him in the twilight of life, and loved him as only the old love, could smell him after they went to bed, they said. He went down to his grave full of honor and years and full, and it cost Aleck fifty cents to have him toted off and buried, but he paid it without a murmur, and putting away the decaying memory from the gaze of a cold world, advertised for a fresh beast.

Alexandria must have been settled by descendants of Canaan, who begat the Jerubite and the Amorite, and the Girasite, to judge from the abundance of quadrupeds coming under the analogical application of that biblical character, to be found in its midst. Every man in the village seemed possessed of a devil or a dog that he wanted to sell, and from every side and quarter they sprung out upon us as we passed, dragging unhappy looking animals after them and trying to force purchases. A man with a dog for sale can discount a life insurance agent without drawing breath. To escape the importuning dealers in live stock, my friend purchased a meek eyed pointer dog with a fine mouth for food, web feet and a rope around its neck, which ought by the eternal constitution of proprieties to have been around the neck of the darky that sold it. We then went to Warrenton. Warrenton is one of the quaintest, pleassest and most aristocratic villages in Virginia. It sits among a thousand hills with no cattle on them. It is dull by day but as brilliant by night as a summer resort, with "German" succeeding "German" and continuing the succession.
One would have a dull business, however, in hunting for items about this place. The only time since the war that it was effervescently lively was this time a year back, when the great North American camp meeting was held at the Sulphur Springs in the vicinity, and religion was shouted, as a Bashan bull bellows through the woods. That camp meeting was a venture, a speculative venture, wherein worship was arranged for with the idea that it would in its results pan out brave duets to its originators. Aleck started it, and was vigorously aided by several other newspaper men in this city. The great difficulty to be obviated was to get preachers. Last September was very hot during the first half, and the gospel was the byways for ministers without regard to sect, age, or mental capacity. We would have failed utterly but for the assistance loaned by the author of those "Meditations Among the Churches of Washington," published four years ago in the Capital, whose wide acquaintance with the clergy of Washington, in and out of the departments, was invaluable. Finally, through vast exertions and the bald-headed young men of the Christian Association, we scooped in a dozen preachers, say and regularly ordained; it made no difference to us, provided they wore white chokers and talked gospel, and with these and Doctor J. P. Newman—that was a genuine high toned camp meeting, the gambling privilege alone sold for \$150—heading the list, to add dignity, the affair started.

People came from Richmond to see it. The German restaurant keeper in Warrenton purchased six additional kegs of beer, and would have made money by it had not some miscreant or miscreants stolen three out of the wagon on the way to the springs. There over was so much cheap beer and religion about Warrenton before since the country was discovered. I don't know that there were many conversions, but there was lots of fun. It was far ahead of the minstrels. It required several days to get things in shape, and of course in the beginning there was not an extensive nor a methodized expression of devotion, but they were just working the points down to a fine edge and much promise began to exhibit itself, when a sudden and unforeseen occurrence—bringing into vivid contrast the rival influences of religion and local institutions—took place. As the large audience was warming up under the fervid exhortation of an extorter on a horsehead a courier rode rapidly down from Warrenton and announced the startling fact to the young men in the outside circle that "a big thing was going on up there." The champion poker players of Raupier county were pitted in a game of poker, on which the fate of all Virginia seemed to pivot.

The news traveled around quickly, and two by two the men dropped out of the congregation and picked off over the irregular road from the springs to the town on horseback, in vehicles of all classes and characters. It was appalling to see how many fell from the grace of the camp meeting into the snares of the card playing. The camp meeting was soon deserted

of everything possessed of life except the ministers and the old women. In fact, a few of the former slipped on linen dusters over their clerical black and drove up to be in at the end of the great poker game. The claimants for honor among cards—the participants in the championship test—were found seated about a table in a prominent lawyer's office, all engrossed in the game. The crowd swelled about the windows and massed in the room. The game went on into the twilight, the lamps were lit and still it progressed. The devil peered from Warrenton at the angels at the springs, and offered to discount the Bible with playing cards anywhere in Virginia at any time. How it would have terminated no one knows, but between drinks and waiting for the results all hands became victims of superinduced excitement. The table was knocked over, the lamps shattered, and, amid darkness and tumult, confusion and the nasty odor of champagne and Warrenton whiskey, the game was broken up, and to this day no one knows who is the champion poker player of Warrenton. But the camp meeting was killed.—*Bentley, in the Washington Capital.*
