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A Letter of the Rev. J. W. Dunjee to his Colored Friends of the South.

[From the Richmond Whig.]
RICHMOND, VA., Sept. 12, 1876.
To my colored friends of Louisiana specially, and of the South generally:

So numerous are my letters from Louisiana and from all parts of the South, and from both races, that it would consume a large proportion of my time were I to attempt to answer them in detail. I must, then, briefly respond to them collectively and give the more important reasons that have prompted me to co-operate with the conservatives and democrats of my State and of the country in the support of the new measures and principles of the democratic party.

I claim no greater honesty or patriotism than influences others of my race who differ with me and who see proper to unite with the new whites of the South in their crusade against the great body of the whites of my section. I will not denounce them for so doing, for they are but acting upon the prejudices that have been instilled into them by selfish and corrupt leaders, until they verily believe in banding together and forming a color line, they are but performing their duty to their (I say) their race and their country. While, however, I concede to them honesty of purpose, I claim like integrity in following the dictates of my honest and deliberate judgment, and I feel perfectly well assured that the time is not distant when our race throughout the South will not hesitate to declare that the path I now point out to them is the only one that can lead to an abiding peace between the races, and that prosperity, happiness and contentment that must be the desire of all worthy the smiles of a beneficent Providence.

There never was a time when the fact was more clearly perceived and felt than the two races, the colored numbering 4,000,000 and the whites 8,000,000, have to live together within the limits of the sixteen Southern States; and that their highest moral, intellectual, and physical well-being depend on the fact that both shall harmonize in their respective spheres, so that each may attain the greatest progress, in these respects, to which their race is capable.

We believe, after ten years' experience, that this can best be attained by the colored people ceasing to antagonize the white race in their political campaigns, and manifesting that confidence politically to them which they daily manifest towards them in their business relations.

We see constantly that colored men trust most implicitly the whites in vital matters appertaining to their contracts for labor, by which they and their families are supported. Why, therefore, should we not equally trust them about our political matters, which are far inferior in their bearing on our well being?

If we answer candidly why this want of confidence in political matters, we must say, in our judgment, it is due to the fact that our political guides and associates, mostly from the North, have persistently instilled in the minds of the colored people the idea if the Democratic party obtain power that the amendments to the Federal Constitution and the guarantees of the States in behalf of freedom would be repealed, and that we would be put back into slavery. This has placed the colored people politically more in antagonism to the Southern whites and rendered their minds more susceptible to all forms of imposition at the hands of the carpet-bag element than all other causes combined. The experience, however, of conservative or democratic ascendancy in the last six or seven years in most of the Southern States, is causing the scales of prejudice and error to fall very rapidly from our eyes, and so far from placing our rights in jeopardy as we are rapidly learning that our personal security seems to be only assured to us where that party has control in the South.

We begin, further, to see that such a dire result as pulling four millions of people back into bondage is not even desired by the larger class of Southern whites, if they could accomplish it, and we begin, moreover, to learn that its accomplishment is utterly impossible, even if they desire it. In fact, the public sentiment of all civilized nations would be utterly hostile to it, if it should be desired by the Southern whites, backed up by Northern people.

In regard to the fourteenth amendment, which gives to the Southern States some thirteen or fourteen more members of Congress, and, by consequence, the same number in the electoral college, more than they would have without it; the Southern whites controlling this additional political power, would be less willing therefore to see it repealed than the Northern people themselves, for by means of this they may now add for all time to come determine the Presidential struggle, or continue their present ascendancy in the House of Representatives.

And as means for such an end, we know by the past that they will never willingly surrender it.

These views, and this experience is rapidly preparing the minds of the colored people, or at least the more intelligent of them, to aid the Southern whites to obtain control of the Southern States, and accounts for those immense majorities in the recent elections in the States of Alabama and Mississippi. And this fact is now being confronted with the fact that these civil and political rights, guaranteed by the Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth amendments, are much better respected in those States where the conservative or democratic party is in the ascendancy, than those where the republican party holds power.

In proof of this we point conspicuously to the State of Virginia, where the two races are moving on more harmoniously than the most devoted friends of the colored race could have anticipated ten years ago.

We have no hesitation in saying that the rights of the colored people, including their right to vote, are as well protected in Virginia to-day as they are in Massachusetts. And the provision made by the State for our education, while it is not all that we would desire, yet taking into consideration that nearly one half of her property was lost by the war, and a debt of more than \$30,000,000 resting on her, it is all we have a right to expect. But Virginia is no exception to this benign action on the colored people, where the whites have gotten possession of the State governments. Witness Arkansas, which, a few years since, under carpet-bag governments, was a theatre of strife and bloodshed. Now, under conservative rule, all is peace and quiet. How gladly would the

intelligent, law-abiding colored men of South Carolina and Louisiana exchange their government and rulers for such as those in Virginia and other States named.

If these be facts, and no one can truthfully deny them, why the officious zeal and energy now employed by Messrs. Morton, Chandler and Dix in our behalf? We neither ask or desire such protection as they are now proposing to extend us, and to the more intelligent colored people the question is constantly put, why all this zeal in behalf of our rights just before every Presidential election. This coincidence is very striking and suggestive.

I might point to evidence in abundance to refute the idea that the radicals or republicans in our midst are really our special friends. Certainly in seeking to excite the race prejudices they are not wise or discreet friends; but I must be pardoned if I distrust the unselfish interest professed for our race by those who manifest it alone about election times, when they are aspirants for some position of honor or emolument.

Were it not for the fear of extending this communication beyond all reasonable limits I would cite in extenso the operations of the Freedman's Bank, professing to be established in the interests and for the benefit of our race. It was actually but an instrument by which we could be more effectually robbed and plundered of our hard-earned earnings. The report of the Hon. B. B. Douglass, of this State, in the last Congress, in relation to the Freedman's Bank, if it could be read by every colored man in the land, would excite an indignation against the party that permitted this wholesale theft of the tens of thousands of dollars that the poor freedmen had deposited with a view to the purchase of homes that no language of mine can depict. But I must here close, trusting that the Great Master, who over rules everything to his own honor and glory, may make plain to us the pathway of duty.
