The Course of True Love.

Quite an excitement was created yesterday at the Charles Street Depot by the development of a family history, the denouncement of which embraced an elopement, secret marriage, flight, pursuit, capture and forgiveness. The whole history of the case was told to a representative of The American, who was on hand, as usual, taking notes of all that is of interest to the public at large, and saw the whole affair.

Mr. Bernard F. Roswell is a merchant and workman in the Western Reserve of Ohio. He makes his home near Youngstown, Macon county, and in the course of an active business life of forty years had amassed considerable wealth. His wife has been dead about sixteen years, and his family consisted of a son, now in the employ of the United States Corps of Engineers, and a daughter, seventeen years old, a graduate from Vassar College, Poughkeepsie, and as beautiful as the conceptions of a great artist.

Running on the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railroad was employed as a passenger conductor, Mr. Frank Pattison, a handsome young man with "a love of a mousethale," curly black hair, and eyes that were irritable. He met Miss Roswell on the train frequently and became acquainted with her, acquainted to friendship, and friendship to intimacy and intimacy to love. Roswell objected to the association of his daughter with a railroad conductor and forbade Pattison the house. Secret meetings were arranged between the eloped pair, but seeing no hope of receiving the consent of the obdurate parent, they determined to elope. Pattison quietly obtained leave of absence from the Macon of the road, and Miss Roswell obtained her father's permission to visit a friend in Canada, a neighboring town. She did not return, and the father, being with the gravest apprehensions, set out to seek her. She had not been to Canada at all, and hearing just at this time that Pattison had obtained leave of absence, his worst fears were realized, and he started in pursuit. In the meantime the fleeing couple had crossed the country to Egan Valley, where they took the main stem of the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railroad. Their train was halted and the one upon which Mr. Roswell was following, overtook them just outside of Allegheny, and the two trains consolidated and were taken into Pittsburg. In some mysterious way both parties escaped each other, until just as the train on the Pennsylvania Road was about to pull out from the depot Pattison saw his father-in-law boarding the same train, and without waiting for bag or baggage the lovers slipped out of the car at the other end and saw the train which bore their pursuer speed eastward.

The secret was too warm to stand any longer, and marriage was determined on at once. The Rev. Dr. Grimes performed the ceremony, and the couple took the train to the Centennial to enjoy their wedding trip. Pattison, having received a letter certifying to his name and position, did not go to the formality of buying tickets, but introduced himself to the several train conductors he met, who not only checked his hat and passed free his wife, but showered upon him all manner of civility.

The party reached Philadelphia, spent a few days, and yesterday morning took the limited express for Washington, intending to go home over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. That railroad letter was remembered by the conductors who had read it, and to one of those conductors Roswell had come and received information about the route Pattison would probably pursue, and so he watched all the trains through the Charles Street Station.

Yesterday when the limited express rolled in he was there, and in the window of a Pullman car sat his daughter, glowing and happy in her new relations. She raised the window, and placidly smiling on the old gentleman, said: "How do you do, pa?" and Pattison and she came up the car and met the parent at the steps. The father's face and anger melted before the joy of seeing his daughter again, and unable to control himself he opened his arms and folded her to his heart, when she gave way to sobs, while a crowd of curious spectators looked on.

The train pulled out and left them there. Mr. Pattison spoke not a word, and in a manly way explained his situation, and his father-in-law took him by the hand and forgave all.

The united party came to Guy's Hotel, and having dined, took the six o'clock express over the Northern Central road for their Western home. Peace, happiness and good fortune go with them.—Baltimore American.
