The Burning of the Steamer Southern Belle.

The burning of the steamer Southern Belle on the Mississippi river some days since, has heretofore been mentioned in the Gazette. Mr. Lawson, one of her passengers, reports that when about a mile above Plaquemine, a landing was effected and a lady got aboard. The boat broke up and was about midway when the cry of fire was given, and almost immediately thereafter the flames swept from the stern of the vessel with irresistible violence. With the alarm the Belle was headed for the bank, but despite the exertions of the officers to calm the passengers, some forty in number, the most confusion prevailed—terror that defies description seemed to seize them, and passengers and deck hands, seized with terror, jumped overboard, the shrieks of the drowning and piteous appeals for help sounding high above the sultry roar of the flame.

It seemed as if all which it was but a short time since the Belle graced against the bank, and fell with the passengers and crew about the shore. With those who gained a place of safety was Mr. Lawson, who states that as he ran for the stairs he saw two ladies—a stout lady and Miss Fannie O'Conner, of Baton Rouge—battling with the flames in the aft of the cabin. They strove with superhuman exertion to run the gauntlet of fire, but were driven back. It would have been madness to attempt to render them any assistance, as even then, from stem to stern, the Belle was a solid sheet of flame. The pilot, Mr. E. Hebert, a true hero, remained at his post until the last moment, amid the flames that encircled the pilot house and all most blinded by smoke, with death staring him in the face, until all that could had reached the shore. When he considered his own safety, and and beneath him was a sea of fire; escape by the usual route was impossible; a clear jump of fifty feet to the deck was the only alternative. He stood poised himself for the jump, calm and collected, a king in his glorious macho, and then down he went crashing, only to fall on deck mangled into death, it is thought, with his spine broken.

Ed. Lewis, a deck hand, says that he was asleep on a bale of cotton in the aft part of the vessel when startled by the fire, and strove to gain the bow. To do this he had to pass the burning cotton. Each by inch, goaded on by the smothering of the blaze as it lashed him toward his goal, he fought his way, until finally he reached and burst about his right hand, his hair singed from his head, and his right foot burnt to the bone, he reached the forward deck and jumped ashore. The fire originated just aft of the pilot house, through some unaccountable cause, although it is said that it was the work of some fiend, who chose that method of consummating his revenge.

Very little goes on in society that the ladies do not get hold of, and the latest gossip is that Governor Tilden has determined upon leading to the altar, soon after election, one of our most beautiful and accomplished townswomen. We only hope this is true, and that the elegant lady referred to will be called upon to do the honors of the White House. No lady in the land would fill the place with more dignity and grace.
