LOCAL NEWS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—War Department, Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, D. C., Nov. 9, 1876, 10:30 a. m.—For the Middle States northerly winds, stationary temperatures, rising barometer and clear or partly cloudy weather.

THE ELECTION NEWS.—Last night again large crowds were collected at all the points of interest looking for election news. When the reports of Hayes' election came in, the radicals were very much elated, the negroes being especially delighted and giving vent to their joy in shouts and yells all over town. When, however, the contradictory reports came there was a change of feeling and they quieted down considerably. This morning again the excitement was intense and both parties apparently confident of success. Numerous contradictory reports were put in circulation on the streets, among them, one to the effect that Mr. S. C. Neale had received a dispatch from Gov. Tilden, acknowledging his defeat, and giving up the contest, which report Mr. Neale desires to contradict emphatically. The interest of everybody continues unabated, and the Gazette office has been besieged all day by anxious enquirers after news.

COMPLIMENTARY.—The Academy Journal, after commenting quite severely on the impolite conduct of certain B. & P. railroad officials north of Washington, on their late trip to the Centennial, says:

"In pleasant contrast with the above we acknowledge our obligations to Commodore Keenan, of the W. & A. R. R., and Mr. Sharp, Master of Transportation of the B. & P. R. R., at Washington. On our arrival at that city the former introduced our Principal to the latter, who, without solicitation, put us on the train before the gates were open, so that we could sit together and thus insured us comfortable accommodations all the way to Philadelphia. We think a little search for a few more such officials would pay the authorities of the road. When there is competition, people usually go by the route on which they find gentlemen in charge of them, and they advise their friends to do the same. Politeness don't cost much, but it pays—our railroads as well as in dry goods stores."

The same paper says that an attempt was made to land the man here, and comments severely on the refusal to allow such landing, notwithstanding the fact that the schooner was loaded in Georgetown.

The table, which was set by Mr. Henry Herber, was fairly loaded with good things, and the company passed a most enjoyable evening. Numerous toasts were drunk, and the festivities were kept up until a late hour.

AFFRAY.—A fight, growing out of a political discussion, took place on Sixth street, in Washington, yesterday, between Captain W. J. Geary of this county and E. P. Smith of that city. Smith had Geary arrested and the case was to have been tried at the Police Court today.

A prominent radical, who lives a short distance from this city, received, this morning, through the mail, a large official envelope, containing a ticket for Salt River, a towel and a pocketkerchief. Being a good natured man, he enjoys the joke, which he is satisfied was played by some of his city friends.

Mr. Pierpont had, at the market, this morning, one of the largest slaughtered hogs ever seen in this city. It was raised by Mr. Al. Clark of Harrison of Cameron Mills, and weighed, when dressed, 585 pounds.

Mr. R. S. Kearney, of Fairfax county, a clerk in one of the departments at Washington, having voted the democratic ticket, was removed from office yesterday.

The meeting of the Potomac Fruit Growers' Association to have been held Tuesday was postponed on account of the members having gone home to vote.

The union prayer meeting will be held in the M. E. Church, South, to-night, at half past seven o'clock.

BY TELEGRAPH.

The Attempted Outrage.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—A special to the Times from Chicago says: "An inquiry into the facts of the attempted theft of Abraham Lincoln's body, at Springfield, show that prior to the time that Mr. Elmer Washburne was invited to resign his position as the head of the Secret Service bureau by the President: he had obtained information from Detective Tyrrell, of the Secret Service in Chicago, that there was an attempt to be made to remove the remains of Abraham Lincoln from the monument at Springfield. The most extraordinary part of this disclosure was the agency the friends of old Ben Boyd, the notorious counterfeiter, now serving a ten years' term in the Illinois penitentiary, had in the proposed scheme of villainy. Ben Boyd was captured by Elmer Washburne some time ago, and a gang of counterfeiters such as seldom obtain a name in the State was broken up. Boyd, through the agency of his friends and his own wealth, has for some time past been trying to liberate himself from prison. The scheme was to carry off the remains of Mr. Lincoln, secure them, and keep them until President Grant should be compelled to give Boyd his freedom, conditioned on the restoration of the remains to their former resting place. The information thus obtained was conveyed to Leonard Sweet, esq., and Colonel Robert Lincoln, both of this city, and steps were taken to frustrate the plan. Mr. Sweet stated to-day that while many people might think this desecration of the tomb of Mr. Lincoln a mere job, "put up" by parties for selfish interests, they were greatly mistaken. He believed there was a well concerted plan on the part of these desperate men to secure possession of these remains."
