

COMMERCIAL.

The excitement consequent upon the Presidential election has had the effect of distracting attention from business affairs, and with the exception of the grain trade there has been a general calm. There is no pressing demand for money, and no difficulty in negotiating good paper. In New York the market is easy though firmer, and call loans are quoted at 4 1/2 per cent. State bonds are slightly firmer, and the enquiry is more frequent; sales of Virginia consols in Baltimore yesterday at 68 1/2, closing at 69.60 1/2 - an advance of 1/2. In New York yesterday Virginia bonds were strong; old and new 31 bid; \$2 1/2 ex matured consols sold at 68 1/2; the consolidated bonds were bid for at 79 1/2 against 78 Wednesday. Railroad securities are dull, and we have no transactions in local shares to note. We quote:

Corn is dull and declining, and prices have dropped off; 740 bushels sold at 35 and 40 for new, and 49 for old. Rye steady at 60. No sales of Oats reported. Country produce in demand and prices are advancing.

RICHMOND MARKET, Nov. 9.—The market is quiet, and prices have undergone but little change since our last report, the quotations being a shade better. Sales of Wheat at 125 to 147 for white and red. Sales of Corn at 45 to 60 for white. No sales of Oats reported; quotations 59 to 60. Nothing doing in Rye.

LYNCHBURG MARKET, Nov. 9.—The market is unchanged and quiet. Wheat dull at 115 to 125. Corn in fair demand at 25 to 35 for white, and 27 for yellow. Oats fairly active at 35 to 45 for spring, and 45 to 50 for winter. Rye 60 to 65.

FREDERICKSBURG MARKET, Nov. 9.—The market is dull, with 1 1/2 cents receipts. Wheat 115 to 125 for white and prime; Corn 45 to 55; Oats 35 to 40; Rye 60 to 65.

ALEXANDRIA CATTLE MARKET, Nov. 10.—Receipts of Cattle this week were light, and but limited transactions were made, the dealers and butchers staying home to vote. Cattle were sold at 10 to 12 1/2 per lb higher; feet of 34 to 40; to quality. Calves dull at 4 to 6. But few sheep and lambs were offered, and prices are nominal at 4 to 6 per lb for the former, and 3 to 4 1/2 per lb for the latter. Hogs dropping at 7 to 8 per 100 lbs. Cows and Calves 25 to 50.

NEW YORK CATTLE MARKET, Nov. 9.—Receipts—2174 head. The offerings included some very choice Steers, also a number of carcasses of common and medium grades. The supply was comparatively light, and the market was firmer, with a fraction advance on good stock. A few extra and fancy Steers were sold at 10 to 10 1/2 per lb dressed, and over 100 lbs. and some of the rougher, 8 to 9 and poorest dry Cows and Oxen were sold at 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 per lb dressed to the gross cut; but 8 to 10 per lb was the range for medium to strictly prime Steers, and prime Steers that averaged 1680 lbs alive were freely sold at 9 to 10 per lb dressed. Sheep and Lambs—Receipts, 1000 head. The demand was comparatively light and tried dull, with no improvement in prices. Common to good Sheep were sold at 3 1/2 to 4 per lb, prime and extra do at 4 1/2 to 5; and common to choice Lambs at 6 to 6 1/2 per lb, with one lot of uncommon sheep and Lambs sold at 6 to 8 1/2. Hogs—Receipts 544 head. The demand was fair for both live and dressed Hogs, and the market closed firm at 4 to 6 per pound for live Hogs, and 7 to 8 per lb for dressed. The sales were 6 to 11 1/2 Ohio Hogs, 201 lbs average, at 5 1/2 per lb; 170 do, 214 lbs, at 6 1/2, and 219 do., 216 lbs, at 6 1/2 per 100 lbs.

LOCAL NEWS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—War Department, Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, D. C., Nov. 10, 1876.—10:30 a. m.—For the Middle Atlantic States falling barometer, increasing northerly winds, stationary temperature and partly cloudy weather.

THE ELECTION NEWS.—The uncertainty prevailing during last night and this morning in regard to the result of the election, has kept alive the intense anxiety which has pervaded the entire community for the past three days. The closeness of the contest and the interests involved have of course added much to the craving for news on the part of everybody. One notable feature of the occasion has been the impudent manner of talking and acting assumed by the negroes, when returns favorable to Hayes were received. Several parties were all pushed off the sidewalks last night by gangs of negro women who paraded the streets, and were vastly more troublesome and insolent than the men. About dark the white radicals became very jubilant and while a select group were gathered in the post-office, one of them a high officer of the Government, became so excited that he had to get on the table and let off his superfluous patriotism. This morning the jury in a trespass case, which had been locked up in a jury room at the old court house, failing to agree on a verdict, got to discussing politics, and after a short time, became so uproarious and noisy that the sheriff had to go in and quiet them.

HUMORS OF THE ELECTION.—It is reported that one enthusiastic voter in the Third Ward, got hold of the wrong paper while rummaging his pockets on Tuesday, and voted the bill of sale of his horse. His dismay on making the discovery of his mistake was ludicrous. In Fairfax county apparently similar mistakes were made, various odd pieces of paper being found in the box. Two copies of an advertising poem of Mr. S. Blondheim, of this city, cut from the Gazette, were among the tickets voted. One voter in the Second Ward scratched out the name of Rev. E. P. Phelps, on the radical ticket and inserted that of Major J. W. Daniel. Still another one scratched all of the electors and voted simply for Hayes and Wheeler, which, of course, was no vote at all.

MURDER IN PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY.—The body of a man named Peter Lusby was found on the Marlboro' road, about half way between the District line and Forestville, on Wednesday morning, with three bullet holes in his breast. Most of Tuesday was spent by Lusby about the ponds in Forestville, and he was quite intoxicated during part of the day. In the afternoon he left the neighborhood comparatively sober. Lusby lived just on the edge of the District. At the time of his death he was under indictment in the District for an assault with intent to kill a colored man named Alfred Rowles in Uiointown, which affair occurred in 1875.

CARDINAL McCLOSKEY IN WASHINGTON.—Cardinal McCloskey will pay his first visit to Washington, since his elevation to the cardinalate, on the 22d inst., on which day he will perform the marriage ceremony between his niece, Miss Teresa Mullen and Hon. John Kelly of New York. The ceremony will probably be performed in St. Matthews's church.

Local Brevities.

A new postoffice is established at Oak Shade, Culpeper county, Va., on the route from Jefferson to Rixeville, with Daniel Collins as postmaster. The name of Bowanville, Fauquier county, Va., is changed to Rappahannock Station, S. L. Eubry being continued as postmaster. Jacob J. Lavender, of Paris, Va., is appointed assistant railway clerk on the route between Washington and Richmond, vice Jennings, resigned. The United States Steamboat Inspectors were in this city to-day and inspected the Maryland ferry boat Virginia. She was found to be in first rate condition, and her license renewed.

The files on the Washington ferry steamer, and on the office of the company in this city, were all displayed at half past to-day, in respect to the memory of Mr. John Lusby, whose funeral took place in Washington this morning.

Foreign News. PARIS, Nov. 10.—The Count of Chaudry has been appointed French delegate to the conference of the Powers on the Eastern question. It is expected that the conference will begin its session in about a fortnight. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 10.—The Porte has not yet replied to England's conference proposal.

Railroad Disaster. ST JOSEPH, MISSOURI, Nov. 10.—A westward bound passenger train on the Hannibal and St. Louis Railroad was thrown from the track near Brookfield yesterday morning. One car rolled twice and a half over and three others were turned on their sides. One man and an infant child are supposed to be fatally injured and about twenty other passengers were hurt several of them severely. The wounded were all taken to Brookfield.

The Petersburg & Weldon Railroad. NORFOLK, VA., Nov. 10.—The case of the Petersburg and Weldon railroad was called to-day in the U. S. Court before Judge Hughes and heard. The action for the appointment of a receiver was by request of complainant, continued until the third day of January next, to be heard at Alexandria.

The Franklin. NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—A Washington dispatch announces that Secretary Robeson yesterday ordered the steamer Powhatan to proceed from Norfolk in search of the Franklin, which is supposed to have been the disabled vessel seen by the bark Norma southeast of Sable Island. The Powhatan was to start early this morning.

Pardoned. NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—A Herald special from St. Louis says: The U. S. Marshal yesterday said he was notified that Grant signed the pardon of Wm. M. Rice, now confined in jail for alleged complicity in the whiskey frauds, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and that it is now on its way by mail to St. Louis.
